

Assistant Ranger Named By Rogue River Foresters

The new assistant district ranger of the Klamath District of the Rogue River National Forest is Doug Shaw, who has been transferred here from the Ashland District of the same forest. Shaw replaces Vern E. Smith, who has been named assistant district ranger of the Lake Arrowhead District of San Bernardino National Forest. Announcement of the transfer was made Wednesday by D. K. Frewing, district ranger of the Klamath District.

Shaw received his education at the University of Minnesota, spent four years in the Navy, and came to Rogue River National Forest in July, 1953. He spent two years in

the Union Creek District, going from there to the Ashland District. His work has been mainly in timber management and fire control. In his new position as assistant district ranger he will be combining all phases of coordinated timber management.

A member of the Society of American Foresters, Shaw is a former officer of the Lions clubs of Prospect and Ashland. He and his wife, Bess, and their 5-year-old daughter, Sandy, have taken a home on the Ashland Highway, near Keno.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith, with their three children, will reside at Skyforest, California.

New Recreation Location Explained To County Court

The potential use of Gerber Reservoir as a recreation spot, with boat docking and launching facilities, camp and picnic grounds, and concessions, was illustrated to the county court Wednesday.

Don Gray, manager of the Klamath Federal Reclamation Project, outlined the lake's potential in a frank appeal to interest "some public group or agency in maintaining and improving the reservoir for recreational use."

Gray said the lake already is being used for fishing, boating and some camping and picnicking. He said the area was visited by 1,862 cars during its April through September season last year, and was visited by 1,600 cars so far this year.

Gray said water users of the Tule Lake and Langell Valley irrigation districts paid expenses of the lake, and were interested in seeing it further developed as a recreation site by an agency or group that would share recreation expenses.

He said the area, now served by a new county road, had the potential of becoming a state park, and that he had made a similar proposal to the state. That proposal is pending.

The court asked Gray to review his recommendations in a letter, upon which it could act.

The court also approved the nominations of four Klamath County students for Oregon State College scholarships to be awarded in names of each representative to the State Legislature, plus the court itself.

Winners, the same students named by a court-appointed nominating committee, were Norma Jean Lyon, Box 5, Olney; Richard A. Day, 2540 Vine Street, Klamath Falls; Roger Dokken, Malin, and Dennis Runge, 2220 Lindley Way, Klamath Falls.

In response to numerous complaints, the court also requested the State Highway Commission to investigate hazardous conditions along U.S. Highway 97 between Algoma and Modoc Point, a stretch of the highway where numerous accidents have occurred when the surface was wet or frosty.

Yreka Union Out On Strike

YREKA, Calif. (UPI)—The AFL-CIO Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union was on strike today against the J.F. Sharp Lumber Company in a dispute over welfare benefits.

The strike began Wednesday after negotiations with the Pine Industrial Relations Committee stalled on the question of whether a welfare plan would apply on an area or an individual basis.

Earlier, management had offered a wage increase higher than the 7½-cent hourly increase reached in Portland Tuesday among employers and two lumber unions.

A union spokesman said Northern California mill workers were more concerned about welfare coverage for their entire area than in wage increases.

The child was treated for a fractured skull and brain concussion both at Klamath Valley Hospital and at Sacred Heart Hospital, Medford.

He is in Hillside Hospital recovering from a back injury and shock which resulted from Tuesday's accident in which Mr. and Mrs. Otto S. Habedank, Malta, Montana, died. Teeters was driving the county gravel truck in front of which Habedank drove off a county road onto Highway 39.

Lumber Company Suffers Blaze

Fire struck the Home Lumber and Supply Company, 2384 South Sixth Street, Wednesday afternoon, and resulted in the loss of lumber estimated at 15,000 feet by W. V. Meade, secretary-treasurer of the company.

The city fire department answered a 3:27 p.m. call to the lumber yard with two trucks; one more truck was provided by the South Suburban Fire Department. Firemen soon brought the blaze under control, but the loss of the lumber, which was still smoldering Thursday morning, and of a tool shed, was inevitable.

The blaze started as the result of a grass fire of undetermined origin, which began on a lot behind the yard.

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
