Guide Dogs For Blind Trained By 4-H Youths

MONTAGUE — A recently inaugurated program for 4-H members of Siskiyou County is the raising of puppies for Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc. Three girls, Jan Carter and Connie Earnest of the Gazelle 4-H Club, and Margaret Callick, Crag-View 4-H Club, are each raising puppies and have had them about two months.

The girls have been working under the guidance of Charles Drummond, Grenada rancher, who is charged with directing the guide dog program in Siskiyou County.

Clarence J. Pfaffenberger, vice president of the Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., of San Rafael, California, who is in charge of research and puppy placement, states that this is a fully recognized 4-H program. Any 4-H child interested in participating in the program may obtain literature, prepared by Pfaffenberger, edited by 4-H specialists and printed by the University of California which gives full information relative to the raising of puppies for guide dogs.

There is no money provided for this service. Each 4-H member must pay all food and hospital expenses should it be needed. The average cost is \$7 per month. Most puppies are placed in 4-H homes for nine months, from 12 weeks to 12 months of age. Children desirous of participating in the program, but are financially unable to do so, are often financed by individuals, service clubs, grange or similar organizations.

The result of the nine months of inseparable companionship of the child and dog will give the child the feeling of having performed a worthwhile deed.

Guide Dogs For The Blind, Inc. was established in 1942 by a group of San Francisco women to serve the blinded veterans returning home on the West Coast from World War II. At the time, there was no accredited school in existence in the West to train dogs as guides and educate the blind to use them. The founders determined that guide dogs, trained to meet the most exacting standards, should be given without cost to blind servicemen and women. Later, the free service included civilian applicants who gave promise of attaining economic independence.

A non-profit organization was incorporated and the training school

established, first in Los Gatos then moved in 1947 to a new plant two miles north of San Rafael, west of Highway 101. The 11 acre tract consists of a training school, kennels and administration buildings. It is entirely free of debt. The school operates under License No. 1 from the California State Board of Guide Dogs for the Blind. The highly coveted "Seal of Good Practice" was five times awarded to the American Association of Workers for the Blind.

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
