Girl Who Speaks Her Mind Is High School President

VAN BUREN, Ark. (AP)—Jessie Angelina Evans, president of the student council at integration-troubled Van Buren High School, is a girl who speaks her mind.

When 45 white boys dropped out of classes and boycotted the school because 13 Negroes were enrolled, she took immediate action.

Rallying other student leaders, 15-year-old Jessie Angelina—who prefers to be called "Angie"—sought to maintain calm inside the 635-pupil school.

Officials of Van Buren High credit her group with doing much to keep down tension among white pupils who tried to ignore jeering boycotters outside.

A soft-spoken youngster with serious gray eyes, Angie's attitude on integration is that "Negroes have a right to attend a school just as much as anybody."

She went on record with that philosophy at a school board meeting this week after the voluntary withdrawal of the Negro students.

As angry segregationist parents at the meeting shouted objections, the spirited brunette put the question that to her was perhaps the basic point in the whole controversy: "Have you thought what you make those Negro children feel like, running them out of school?"

While members of the school board sat in silence, she told how the student council had polled 180 white pupils at Van Buren High and found that only 45 were against integration.

Looking at the group of parents, supporters of the boycott, she asked: "If we don't object, why should anyone else?"

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Evans, left it to Angie to decide where she stood on integration.

"Then they supported my decision," she said.

Angie's father operates a grocery store and a radio-television repair service. She has an older brother and sister, both married.

A native of Van Buren, Angie has never attended school anywhere else.

Angie regularly attends one of Van Buren's Methodist churches, where she sings in the choir. She

is keenly interested in youth activities at the church.

She wants to attend college and become a social worker.

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Lumber Firm Slates Move

LAKEVIEW — Announcement of the moving of the Oregon Windor Company from Prineville to Lakeview has been made here by Bob Feldman, a vice president of the Lakeview Lumber Products Company. Both operations are owned by the Feldman Wood Products Company of New York City.

The shutdown of operations at Prineville is scheduled for November 14, following which machinery and equipment will be moved to Lakeview, and work will begin as soon as possible.

The Oregon Windor Company now employs 35 men and most of these are expected to move here. This will bring the total payroll of the company here to 175 men. The production at the Prineville operation is 12 to 15 cars of moulding a month and the same rate is expected to be continued here. D. M. Leonard will continue as superintendent of the Oregon Windor plant. John E. McDonald is general manager of the Lakeview Lumber Products Company.

The move is part of a long range plan of expansion and production increase planned by the company for this area. In addition to a new moulding building and dry shed already constructed here, Feldman stated that they will construct a new dry sorting chain, smoke room and grinding room. Lakeview Lumber Products has its own logging operation, sawmill, shuck operation and cut-stock plant.

Forest Supervisor Joe Thornton and other personnel of the Modoc National Forest wish to thank all the people who assisted in any way with the suppression of the Parker Creek Fire of August 31. Local people were especially cooperative which is greatly appreciated.

Mapping of the burn and damage appraisal work is now being done. Due to numerous unburned areas within the final control line, the total burned area will probably be under our original estimate of 1,200 acres.

Plans are now underway for aerial reseeding to grass. The purpose of this is to help prevent soil erosion and establish forage plants.

Plans are also underway to start tree planting this fall in the most suitable areas of the burn.
