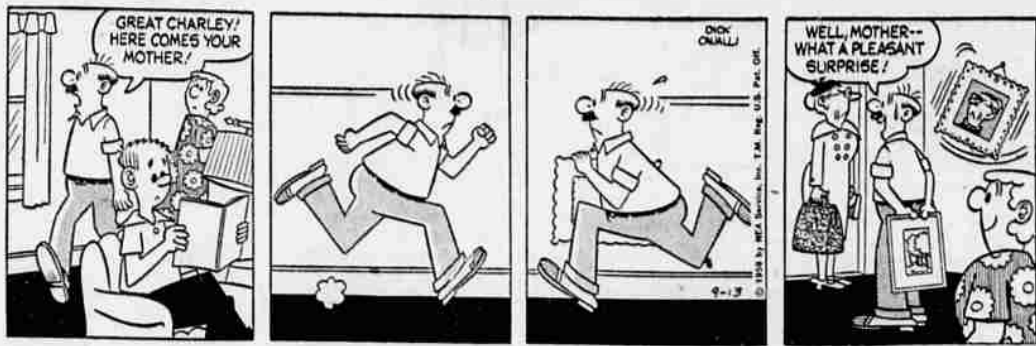

Scott Valley Cattleman Wins Man Of Year Honor

MONTAGUE—Clarence Dudley, cattleman from Scott Valley, was named as "Siskiyou Cattleman of the Year," at the annual cattle tour held recently. The announcement was made by Sedg Nelson, farm adviser of the Agricultural Extension Service office at Yreka. Ed Hart of Little Shasta, president of the Siskiyou County Cattleman's Association, presented Dudley with a miniature Stetson hat and gift order for a large hat, the traditional award for the honor, before a group of over 100 cattlemen at Pleasant Park near Etna.

Dudley has been a breeder of registered Hereford cattle in Noyes Valley, located between Gazelle and Callahan, for 13 years. A commercial herd of Herefords is also included in the operations. Officers and directors of the Siskiyou County Cattleman's Association select the cattleman of the year on the basis of improvement in quality of cattle, on feed development and on civic activities. He must also be a bonafide cattleman and a member of the association.

Previous cattlemen honored were Nerva Hayden, Etna, 1955; A. B. Hoy, Weed, 1956; and the late James B. Rohrer of Little Shasta, 1957.

The annual cattle tour, sponsored by the farm adviser's office in cooperation with the cattleman's association, consisted of demonstrations in the morning at the Charles Peckham and Glenn Barnes ranches near Etna, with a potluck luncheon served by the Cow Belles at Pleasant Park, followed by talks from visiting guests.

At the Peckham ranch, Farm Adviser Sedg Nelson discussed a group of steers that are being fattened on irrigated pasture with a supplement of five pounds of barley, per head, per day. It was shown that this was a profitable type of operation for ranches that are not adapted to a cow and calf set up. In order to select only the best gaining and grading cattle to utilize the high price feed, Nelson said that the steers are weighed and graded individually during the winter period. Further tests will be made to see if there is a correlation between winter gains and grades and fattening ability so that the money making steers can be predicted.

Dr. P. G. Enge, extension veterinarian from the University of California at Davis, demonstrated the use of tranquilizers in cattle operations. Enge pointed out that shrinkage tests have shown no advantage for tranquilized cattle. However, he said that there is a use for tranquilizers to calm newly weaned calves or cattle going to strange surroundings.

School Board Finishes Toil

The board of School District 2 (Klamath Union High School) met Thursday night to complete business which had been left over from Monday's meeting.

The board accepted the bid of Brostherous Construction Company for remodeling the KUHS basement. The bids from Brostherous and Thompson and Georgeson, with basic figures of \$22,300 and \$25,941, respectively, had been considered during the three-day period of adjournment.

The board named George Flitcraft and John Voith to set up specifications for a school bus; this action was taken after a discussion of present bus overcrowding.

Other actions of the board included: Approving the establishment of overflow classes in typing, wood-working and biology, which will meet at 7:30 in the morning.

Establishment of a pay scale for substitute teachers: \$19.50 per day for those with bachelor degrees, \$21.10 for masters. (These figures are arrived at by dividing the minimum salaries of \$3,700 and \$4,000, respectively, by 190—the number of teaching days.)

Authorization was given to Helen Hoffman to accept an invitation to join a committee which is evaluating foreign language textbooks for the State Textbook Commission.

Authorization was given Marie Johnson, dean of girls, to attend the state conference of deans next month at Oceanlake.

Dr. Enge showed the ranchers present a group of six bulls that had been tested for fertility the night before. These bulls, selected at random, varied from 15 to 80 per cent fertile. Enge showed that it is impossible to tell which bulls are good breeders by just looking at them. He suggested that bulls below 60 per cent fertile be culled.

O. K. Kendall and F. A. Andrews, local veterinarians, announced that they would purchase the equipment needed for testing bulls and that this service will be available to Siskiyou County ranchers this fall.

Following the potluck luncheon, guest speakers concluded the afternoon session. Logan Morton, chief of Bureau of Livestock Identification, warned that there would be no duplicate brands in the state after 1959. Priority would be given to the oldest registered brand in case of duplication. Morton also stated that there have been more convictions for rustling this year than in the past five years combined.

Another guest speaker was Bob Johnson of Sanger, president of the California Cattleman's Association, who discussed the threat of meat imports into the U.S. Imports have doubled in 1958 and more cooperation is needed with the government on controlling tariffs and tonnage to coincide with our own beef production.

Brunell Christiansen, first vice president of the California Cattleman's Association from Likely, told about the beef research program that is underway. All segments of the industry will be working together to produce beef that is in demand by the public. The California Cattleman's Association and the University of California are cooperating on a progeny testing program to locate bulls that tend to produce the type of beef that is most economical and acceptable to the public.

Ed Dick, secretary of the California Cattleman's Association, announced that the membership of the association has increased statewide, and that Siskiyou County is at an all time high. Dick also told how the University of California is cooperating with the cattle industry on economic research. A complete study of the industry is underway from producer to consumer. The effect of integration will also be analyzed.

Don Mace, state veterinarian, concluded the program with a resume of the brucellosis situation. Officers for the Siskiyou County Cattleman's Association for next year will be Ed Hart of Little Shasta, president, and assistant state director; Wayne Ralston of Grenada, secretary; Blair Smith of Gazelle, state director.

The board of directors will consist of Jiggs Kuck of Montague; Malcolm Hayden of Etna; Gene Selby of Quartz Valley; Lou Hessig of Beswick; and Del Brito of Gazelle. Brito is replacing Jack Wilson of Edgewood, who has been a director for many years.

SIGN TRADE PACT — VIENNA (UPI) — Communist Czechoslovakia and Tunisia have signed their first trade agreement since Tunisia gained independence from France, a Radio Prague broadcast reported Saturday.

The first average set up in 1897 included 12 stocks—American Cotton Oil, American Spirits Mfg., American Sugar, American Tobacco, Chicago Gas, General Electric, Laclede Gas, National Lead, Pacific Mail, Standard Rope & Twine, Tennessee Coal & Iron, and U. S. Leather preferred.

A long series of substitutions continually changed the components. On July 31, 1914 they were Amalgamated Copper, American Car & Foundry, American Sugar, Central Leather, General Electric,

WOODLANE, Calif. (AP) — Federal Judge Samuel Driver of Pasco, Wash., died Friday in Woodland Clinic from injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile Sept. 5.

The 66-year-old jurist was crossing an arterial highway from his parked car to look at a corn field.

His widow, a son, and a daughter survive.

Driver started his law career with a 30-month job for a Seattle legal firm. He soon, however, got \$65 with another firm in Waterville, Wash., before he went into the Army as an infantry private in the 91st Division at the start of the First World War.

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Judge Driver was named Chief Justice of the Washington State Supreme Court in December 1945. In April 1946, he was appointed U.S. District Judge of Eastern Washington.

Dow-Jones Stock Figures Stands Out In Mart Talk

NEW YORK (UPI)—One figure stands out in Wall Street talk these days—the Dow-Jones industrial average.

That average along with most of the other market measurements has been cussed, discussed and coddled according to the whims of the critics and adherents of the Dow theory.

Wall Street tries from time to time to switch into other averages or indexes but somehow the tradition swings it back to the Dow, the basis of a theory of markets developed way back when stocks were quoted in percentage of par rather than in dollars and cents.

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As chairman of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, Smathers said he deprecates the "emotional armaments race between the North and South" touched off by the U. S. Supreme Court's decision outlawing segregation in the schools.

"We have seen passion, force and anger substituted for reason and restraint in Little Rock, Ark., in Harrisburg, Pa., in Springfield, Ill., and more recently even in far away London, this unrestrained ferocity which seems to be taking over is a contract for disaster."

Smathers said in making an appeal to reason he realized his action "sets me down naked as a target for firebrands from both sides."

"But I feel an appeal to moderation should not yet be considered a criminal act," he continued. "If reason and moderation cannot bring about here in the cold war between integration and segregation—if the future does indeed belong to the extremists—then the Democratic party as we know it, in my judgment is doomed."

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Extension Agent Asks Soil Test

LAKEVIEW — A good soil test may help to explain why production may not have been up to expectations this year, says Oris Rudd, Lake County extension agent. If taken right away, the soil test data can be interpreted while yields and crop results are still fresh at hand.

Three recent soil tests from the Westside area indicated that the soils tested were becoming acid in reaction. Two fields were acid enough to require one ton of lime per acre to correct acidity to the point where crops will perform satisfactorily.

It should be kept in mind, says Rudd, that if any one element is lacking, top production will not be attained. This applies to soil reaction as well as fertility elements.

Soil testing information and cartons for shipping samples are available at the Lake County agent's office.

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
