Her attorney said today that she is representing the petite mother of two, resenting the petite mother of two, said he planned to "get the ball rolling" shortly toward a divorce action, depending on talks with Fisher's attorney.

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Wage Terms Delay Pilots

SEATTLE (AP)—Pilots have been directed by their national association not to fly West Coast Airline's new P27 turboprop planes until a wage agreement is reached.

The Air Line Pilots Assn. instructed members to strike if the company takes any action against them for refusing to fly the P27s.

West Coast, which serves 44 cities in Washington, Oregon and Idaho, had planned to put the turboprops into operation Sept. 28. The firm has been training pilots in the new planes while contract negotiations continued, but the association directive ruled out even these flights.

"I'm hopeful that an agreement can be reached soon," James Hale of Seattle, head of the WCA pilots' association, said Saturday.

The old contract between the pilots and West Coast expired in January. The pilots are seeking higher pay for flying the turboprops and a salary scale more in line with that on national trunk lines, Hale said.



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Youths Dead In Explosion

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP)—A small building jammed with four tons of blasting powder and dynamite blew up near this southern Utah community Saturday night.

Two youths thought to have been rabbit hunting in the area were blown to bits.

The building was used to store explosives made for the Southern Powder Co. of Millard, Utah. It had thick walls and a steel door with only two points of possible entry—the keyhole of the door and vents in the roof.

Al Cline, an agent for Southern Powder, said the only way the explosion could have been set off was by a sharp blow, as from a bullet.

Officials said they thought the boys had fired through the keyhole because their remains and guns were found in the same direction from the blast as parts of the door.

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Noose Claims Portland Girl

The freak accident Sunday took the life of Darlene Sheriff, 12, after she struck her head inside a noose in a rope that hung from a beam and dangled within three feet of the floor of a shed.

Darlene was at play with other youngsters. They said they ran outside when they heard a dog fight start. When they came back, the girl was unconscious, her legs stretched on the floor but her neck in the noose.

Police said the noose still was loose and that the girl seemingly could have lifted her head up out of it with ease. Even a struggle might have brought the rope down, they said.

A sheriff's deputy said a single nail held the rope, and he yanked it free with a jerk of his hand.

The girl died in the shed at the home of her stepfather, Arthur Sheriff, 14705 SE Main St.

A highway collision Sunday near Hillsboro killed the 5-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy E. Jekke, Hillsboro. The parents went to a hospital with injuries not determined at once. Their two other children had only minor injuries.

Another collision Saturday near Harrisburg killed J. Daniel Given, 33, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Fanchuan Hsu, 37, Pasadena, Calif.

Injured were her husband and their two children, a 5-month-old boy and a 19-month-old girl. The husband was en route to Portland to become a science instructor at Portland State College.

Father Flier Dies In Crash

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A father who took his two children joyriding in a plane yesterday was killed when it stalled and crashed two blocks from their home.

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
