



Wandering Jet Stream Causes Freak Weather

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Resort owners east of the Rockies who have been tearing their hair over this summer's terrible weather can take some consolation from the plight of the fuel oil salesmen in the Arctic.

Northern Canada and the whole Arctic have been having just as freakishly warm weather recently as the eastern three-quarters of the U.S. has had strange weather in the way of excess rain, cold, storms and floods.

The U.S. Weather Bureau says there is probably some connection between these unusual conditions. But they won't say just what it is, because, they modestly admit, they don't know.

To make this summer's strange weather picture even more cloudy a new upper atmosphere phenomenon near the North Pole has just been discovered. Scientists who have been firing high-altitude rockets up there as part of the International Geophysical Year program have discovered hitherto unknown masses of warm air at altitudes above 100 miles.

This, too, is undoubtedly a piece in the big bad weather puzzle. Weather Bureau experts admit. But the fact that they don't know yet whether the IGY discovery is normal or peculiar to this year complicates efforts to fit it into the overall bad weather confusion.

Weather Bureau experts, however, are positive about one set of facts. A spokesman explains: "For the past several months over the general area of the U.S. east of the Rocky Mountains precipitation has been considerably above normal, with some areas such as Washington, D.C., getting two to three times more rain than average in July. This has included more than average cloudiness, temperatures lower than average, storms and floods in Kansas, Nebraska, Illinois and West Virginia."

A few, isolated areas in the East and Midwest have had near-normal weather with about average rainfall. But these spots are freaks of chance, too, it is claimed.

Weather Bureau experts are not entirely in the clouds about one cause of the country's summer weather snafu. They know that the transcontinental jet stream has been splitting and meandering down as far south as over Illinois and Kentucky instead of sticking to its normal path just over the Canadian border.

The jet stream is a river of cold air which races across the North American continent from west to east at an altitude between 20 and 40 thousand feet. It originates somewhere near Japan and blows across half of the world at speeds of up to 300 miles an hour.

But beyond establishing these facts about the jet stream, information about it becomes purely speculative. Movements of Arctic air, temperatures of the oceans

and possible sun spots may influence the jet stream's origin and path.

Anyway, when this jet stream starts ducking below the Great Lakes area weather trouble really starts. In the summer it collides with the prevailing warm, moist air which normally flows from the south to the north from the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean.

Thus when the icy jet stream smacks into the gentle, moist masses of air lazily rolling up from the south, rain clouds and storms result. The fact that the meanderings of the jet stream have been far ranging and the stream has been frequently split, has caused the widespread bad weather over the U.S. this year.

Weather Bureau experts are reluctant to admit it because it is so speculative, but there is a possible silver lining to this whole dark weather cloud. If the jet stream continues to snake across the U.S. south of its normal Canadian-burder route the chances of a bad hurricane season over the eastern part of the U.S. this fall are lessened.

When the jet stream moves abnormally north the possibility of tropical hurricanes hitting the U.S. increases. This is what happened during 1954-55 when the East Coast was struck by numerous devastating hurricanes. When the jet stream is south of normal it tends to blow the hurricanes away from the U.S. over the Atlantic.

Send Missile Unit To Pacific

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department said today an Army Nike-Hercules battalion is being assigned to service in the Pacific area. It may be going to Formosa, but there was no confirmation.

The unit is the 2nd Missile Battalion of the 71st Artillery Regiment, now stationed at Ft. Bliss, Tex.

The Nike-Hercules has a reported range of about 75 miles and can carry an atomic warhead.

Accident Injury Complaint Dismissed By Dorris Court

DORRIS—A \$40,000 personal injury suit filed by Dorris Constable Archie Brimmer on behalf of his minor son went to trial Wednesday in superior court and concluded Friday. The jury composed of eight women and four men, after a short deliberation, found in favor of the defendant, a Catholic priest, the Rev. Daniel Cullinan of Chico.

Judge James M. Allen, at the request of Yreka attorney Michael Hennessey, representing the diocese of Sacramento, granted a motion for dismissal of the case Wednesday.

day against the bishop and diocese, named as co-defendants in the initial complaint.

Three Dorris constables had charged that his son Richard, seven years of age, was struck down at 7 p.m. on January 31, 1956, in Dorris by a car driven by the priest.

Harris Messner of Yreka, Brimmer's attorney, said the boy had started a basketball game with his older brother and two friends and had crossed Highway 97 when he decided to return to his parents' cafe located on the east side of the road.

The attorney explained in detail how the injured boy was taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital in an unconscious condition, remaining there for a long course of treatment.

Burt Wines, Oakland attorney representing Father Cullinan, declared the accident to be "without any fault on the part of Father Cullinan." He said the priest had "slowed down to the legal limit of 25 miles per hour upon entering town" and immediately stopped to render aid after hitting the boy.

Wines also asserted that Father Cullinan was not on duty for the church at the time of the accident. The statement was upheld by the court with the dismissal of the case against the diocese.

Dr. Arthur Compton, a Klamath Falls bone specialist, was on the witness stand for almost two hours in behalf of the plaintiff. The physician confirmed that the boy was unconscious from a blow on the head, and had a broken leg when he arrived at the hospital, and described the complications which he said had led to additional surgical operations on the boy's leg.

Dorris Chief of Police Byard Kelly was one of the witnesses for the plaintiff. Mrs. Archie Brimmer and her partner in a Dorris variety store, Lois Heirsch, also testified.

More Marines Coming Home

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Two more U. S. Marine battalions are leaving Lebanon and are going home.

The U. S. Navy announced most of the 2,012 men of the 1st and 2nd battalions of the 8th Marine Regiment would go on shipboard today. Working parties began loading equipment yesterday.

Their departure will leave one Marine battalion of about 1,600 men and 8,000 Army men in Lebanon as the rearguard of a force that began landing here July 15.

One Marine battalion, withdrawn in August on the eve of an emergency U. N. General Assembly session on the Middle East, remained with the U. S. 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean.

But a Navy spokesman said the 1st and 2nd battalions will be sent back to the United States. They are being pulled out on the eve of the regular U. N. General Assembly session in New York.

Nearly 15,000 Marines and soldiers were ordered here at the request of President Camille Chamoun, who charged that the United Arab Republic was endangering Lebanon's independence.

The emergency U. N. session instructed Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld to make practical arrangements to facilitate withdrawal of the troops. He has announced no agreement by Arab countries on stationing a U. N. police force, observer force or representatives in the Middle East to watch out for infiltration and subversion.

But it is generally expected that Lebanon's President-elect Fuad Chehab will ask the American troops to leave soon after he takes office Sept. 24.

Conditions have been gradually returning to normal since Chehab's election. Rebel leaders announced that starting today stores in the business section of Beirut could stay open until 1 p.m. without danger of being bombed for violating a rebel strike order. The rebels called the strike May 10, but eased up a week ago by allowing stores to open up until 11 a.m.

The Navy announced Marines Mate J.C. Joseph A. Domotta of Philadelphia was slightly wounded Saturday night by a bullet while he was watching a movie aboard a destroyer 1,000 yards off Beirut.

Cmdr. Robert Pond of San Francisco said he believed a sniper fired the shot. It was the third bullet forced here.

Cattle Program Slated Thursday

YREKA — According to an announcement made by Sedg Nelson, farm adviser of the Agricultural Extension Service at Yreka, the farm adviser's office of Siskiyou County will hold a series of demonstrations for cattlemen of Butte Valley on the Maggie Criss and Sons Ranch near Macdonel, scheduled to take place from 1:30 to 4 p.m. on Thursday, September 18. Invitations have been extended to all persons interested to attend.

The program will consist of a demonstration on how to implant and use stilbesterol by Sedg Nelson. Dr. P. C. Enge and Reub Albough, both of the University of California Extension Service at Davis, will be present to demonstrate the effect of tranquilizers on cattle and discuss the use of this new drug in cattle production.

Farm Adviser Nelson will follow with a demonstration on cattle grading as has been used by the university for over 15 years. These grades are used at the Red Bluff sale and in records of performance where breeding cattle need to be rated on conformation, quality and size.

The final demonstration will be fertility testing of bulls, put on by Enge and Albough. This service will soon be available to cattle producers on their ranches and is very important for efficient production.

Arnold and Delmar Criss will assist in furnishing the cattle for demonstration purposes and corral facilities.

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—John Eli told police that he became confused by circle drives at Municipal Airport yesterday and suddenly noticed a plane trying to crowd him off the road.

The pilot of a DC 6 passenger airliner, starting to take off, slowed his plane just in time to avoid hitting Eli's auto on a runway. The plane came so close to the car that the pilot noted its license number and radioed it to the control tower.

Eli was hooked at city jail on a charge of drunken driving.

Hold Ex-Convict On Gun Charge

Raymond Hoover, charged with being a convict in possession of a concealed weapon, was bound over to the Klamath County Grand Jury at a preliminary hearing in district court Monday.

Hoover, 26, of 1937 Wantland Avenue, was arrested by city police on a downtown street early August 30. Officer Floyd Pierce said he ordered occupants to leave Hoover's car and then removed a .38 caliber revolver from the seat.

Attorney Glenn D. Ramirez, representing Hoover, maintained that the state could not prove the gun belonged to Hoover. Deputy District Attorney O. A. Gonsky argued that it was not necessary for the gun to be in Hoover's personal possession to make an arrest on the charge.

Judge D. E. Van Vactor ruled that evidence was sufficient to hold Hoover to the grand jury.

Brown Accuses Knowland Of Dealing With Fascists

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Attorney General Edmund G. Brown has accused Sen. William F. Knowland of having been caught "doing business with elements that would not stop at imposing a Fascist dictatorship over the American people."

Brown, Democratic candidate for governor, leveled this charge as the result of a report by the New York Times that rich Republicans are financing the distribution in California of a pamphlet attacking Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers Union.

Object of the pamphlet, according to the report, is to help the candidacy of Knowland, who is retiring from the Senate to run as Republican candidate for governor.

According to the report, Mrs. Helen Knowland, the senator's wife, endorsed the pamphlet and distributed "about 300" copies. She said she stopped when her husband noticed the pamphlets did not have a union label.

Knowland discounted the charge as a "red herring."

"These wild charges are a desperate effort to draw a red herring across the path and obscure the fact of Brown's domination by labor bosses, his failure to handle the crime problem or meet other issues confronting the people of California," Knowland said in a prepared statement.

He charged Brown was supported by "labor bosses" and that they were raising money both nationally and locally in his opponent's behalf "in an attempt to take over California the same way they have Michigan."
