Quemoy Isle News Blackout Tightened By Nationalists

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Nationalists tightened the news blackout on the Quemoy islands today while working on new attempts to crack the Communist artillery blockade.

New speedup methods of unloading Nationalist planes and ships at Quemoy and the parachuting of supplies to smaller islands near Quemoy were reported. More effective ways to get supplies through the curtain of shells are being sought, Premier Chen Cheng told Parliament.

Four members of Parliament spearheaded a strong clamor in Taipei against the U.S.-Chinese Communist talks which began in Warsaw Monday and recessed until Thursday.

The talks are intended to ease Formosa Strait tension, possibly bringing an end to the bombardment of the Quemoy which began Aug. 23. But the four prominent legislators said the talks might adversely affect the morale of nationalist troops and civilians.

"How can America seek peace with the Communists when the objective of international communism is to conquer the world?" a statement by the four said. It followed numerous similar statements of Nationalist leaders urging the United States support for military action against Red China.

So far the United States has limited itself to essentially defensive operations while bringing in a nuclear-armed striking force just in case.

The hottest plane in the U.S. air arsenal, the F104 Starfighter, has begun to fly over Formosa as part of the U.S. protective force should fighting spread beyond the offshore islands.

The American Taiwan (Formosa) Defense Command also said Marine Air Group 11, which came here for joint U.S.-Nationalist amphibious maneuvers, has been assigned to defend naval vessels. These presumably include the U.S. 7th Fleet warships escorting Nationalist supply ships to within three miles of Quemoy.

Both U.S. and Nationalist planes escorted eight Nationalist cargo

planes which parachuted supplies to Little Quemoy, two miles from the main outpost, Sunday. They probably went along with four cargo planes Monday also. Both American and Nationalist sources denied reports of dogfights with Chinese jet fighters during the air drops.

The drops on Little Quemoy were perfectly executed, said three newsmen who flew back from Quemoy today. They said they had heard drops were made on Quemoy itself last week.

Fish Waters Plan Closing

SEATTLE (AP) — Normal weekend closure of North Puget Sound and San Juan Island waters to commercial salmon fishing will again go into effect Friday, the Washington State Fisheries Department said Monday.

Fishermen had been allowed to fish the last two weekends to give them a chance to catch their share of this year's Adams River sockeye run. Officials said American fishermen still have not landed as many fish as the Canadians fishing in Johnstone Strait and convention waters controlled by the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission.

The weekend closure, the department explained, is needed to allow escapement of 1½ million sockeye up the Salmon River for spawning.

'Save Holland' Queen Urges

THE HAGUE (AP) — Queen Juliana of the Netherlands today urged her subjects to save so Holland can maintain her competitive position in international markets.

Addressing members of the States-General, the upper and lower houses of Parliament, the Queen in her annual Speech From the Throne said:

"A high level of savings for the prosperity of our people, now and in the future, is urgently required" for a balanced economy and full employment.

She said, "The developments in Indonesia have imposed particular burdens on the national economy and the national budget."

Indonesia has seized many large Dutch enterprises in the former Dutch colony.

The 1959 budget shows a deficit of 1,300,000,000 guilders (\$47 million dollars), double of last year's.

The Queen warned that a stable wage level was required in the coming year, and that tax increases would have to be maintained.

Flash Floods Plague Texas; Rain Blamed For Accident

Flash floods poured over the Midland-Odessa, Tex., area Monday night and along sections of the Rio Grande River following downpours of more than two inches.

The rain ranged along the edge of a cool Canadian air mass stretching from the Upper Great Lakes to Texas and hitting hardest in the Texas panhandle.

More than two inches of rain swept Midland in a brief period, sending floodwaters coursing through the streets. The high water was blamed for the derailment

of 15 cars of a Texas and Pacific freight train east of Odessa, Tex. No one was injured.

The rain-gorged Rio Grande raged over its banks to a depth of eight feet, flooding 200 acres of cotton land near Presidio, Tex., and closing the International Bridge leading to Mexico.

Other heavy rains along the storm front included nearly 2 inches at Kansas City, Mo., and about 1 inch at Peoria, Ill.

A small and unusual pocket of cold air pushed across Eastern Colorado during the night, lowering temperatures into the 30s and sprinkling Colorado Springs with light snow.

Colorado Springs also reported 33-inch of rain as moderate to heavy precipitation accompanied the isolated cold air mass.

Overnight readings ranged from the 40s over the Northern Plains to the 50s in the Central Plains.

Warmer air covered the Ohio Valley and the East with temperatures dropping no lower than 72 as far north as Lebanon, N.H., early today.

Showers were predicted for the entire Eastern Seaboard and the Gulf Coast today, and extending west through the Ohio Valley and Southern Plains.

Cooler weather was expected in the Upper Great Lakes and Upper Mississippi Valley. A few afternoon showers were seen for the Rockies, but generally fair weather was expected to prevail west of the divide except for a few showers along the North Pacific Coast.

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UN Recognition Red Aim, Think Many Asian Experts

TOKYO (UPI) — Many top Asian experts believe the Chinese Communists want United Nations recognition so badly they are almost hysterical and likely to do something desperate because their desire has been frustrated.

There even are those who think the Chinese Reds—despite Peking's constant denials—are anxious to win U.S. recognition.

A large number of students of Asian affairs share the belief that the Chinese Communists whipped up the current Formosa crisis primarily to get the stalled U.S.-Communist China talks going again.

If this was the case, the Communists have managed to "shoot" their way to at least one conference table for the Americans and Chinese Communists reopened negotiations in Warsaw Monday.

Few people think the Chinese Communists are going to be satisfied with the Warsaw level talks. They are going to want more. What they really want, many believe, is to be accepted as equals by the rest of the world.

"In his old age, Mao Tse-tung wants respectability," a Western diplomat observed when discussing the China problem.

He pointed out that the Chinese never have considered themselves inferior to anybody. He said some statements by the Chinese Communist press and radio indicate they are practically hysterical on the subject of recognition—not only diplomatic recognition but also recognition as being equal, important and a major power.

A Japanese industrialist observed the other evening that the Chinese Communists may be trying to throw their weight around because they do not have real knowledge of world affairs, especially the strength of the United States.

"Sometimes," he said, "the Chinese Communist leaders sound like the Japanese militarists who lost Japan to the biggest defeat in her history."

There still are some observers in Asia who believe that Russia may be encouraging the Chinese Reds on one hand while giving Peking bad advice on the other.

They contend Russia does not really want Communist China to be accepted. They contend this would be against Russia's interests just as it is—for it makes it easier for Russia to hold the China mainland in the Red camp.

It is their theory—shared by many—that Communist China might lean a bit away from Russia and might lean a bit more toward the West if Red China once got to associating on a large scale with other people and began getting ideas from other sources.

On the other side of the argument, there are those who believe the free nations would be selling many of their allies—and some neutrals—down the river if they made a deal with the Chinese Communists who still wear the

label of "aggressor" which was pinned on them by the United Nations.

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
