

French Reds Ban Likely

PARIS (UPI) — The French government was under strong pressure today to outlaw the Communist Party.

Interior Minister Emile Pelletier hinted at a move to ban the largest Red party in Western Europe after the unsuccessful attempt on the life of Information Minister Jacques Soustelle by Algerian terrorists Monday.

Pelletier accused the Communists of aiding the Algerian nationalist movement and charged the Communist newspaper Humanite and the morning newspaper Liberation were guilty of "collusion" with the nationalists who want independence from France.

Rightwing political leaders prepared to renew demands the party, which won one-fourth of the votes in the last parliamentary election in 1956, be outlawed. The attack on Soustelle and new violence that exploded during the night were part of a terror campaign by the Algerians to defeat Premier Charles de Gaulle's second - man constitution in the Sept. 28 referendum. It makes no provision for Algerian independence.

The Communists fear the new constitution will permit the government to outlaw their party.

Soustelle, an advocate of stiff repressive measures against the Algerian rebels when he was governor - general, was cut on the face by flying glass when Algerian gunmen opened fire on his limousine in downtown Paris. Two of the attackers were caught after one of them shot and killed a passerby. One of the Algerians and four passersby were wounded in the gunplay.

Soviet Union Warns Japan

TOKYO (AP) — The Soviet Union today warned Japan against letting the United States use its bases here for "aggression" against Red China.

A Soviet note cited press reports of the American forces' open use of Japanese territory for their provocative aggression "in the Formosa Strait area."

"If these press reports are based on facts," the note said, "Japan will be involved in American aggressive acts against the People's Republic of China whether Japan likes it or not."

The note played on Japanese fears that this country might be open to reprisal attacks should the United States use its bases here to reinforce its troops in any shooting war with Communist China over the Nationalist-held offshore islands.

A Japanese text of the note was handed to newsmen at a news conference at the Soviet Embassy.

The note said: "We expect the Japanese government to appraise the situation coolly and to take adequate measures to prevent American forces' use of Japanese territory for aggressive acts."

The Japanese Foreign Office confirmed receipt of the note. A spokesman said, "We cannot comment on it right now, but we will issue a statement."

CANNON BALL JOLTS
ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (AP) — John E. Carre, 15, was knocked off his motor scooter by a cannon ball. He was jolted but wasn't seriously hurt. The cannon ball was rolled down a bridge—a few hundred yards from the country's oldest masonry fort — by four youths who fled in an automobile.

Penney Store Has New Boss

New manager of the Klamath Falls J. C. Penney Store is Fran Hales who arrived here last week-end from Astoria where he was manager of the Penney store for six years. He fills the vacancy created here by the recent death of C. S. Elliot.

Born at Ogden, Utah, Hales started his merchandising career with the J. C. Penney Company in 1933 in his home town. He was advanced through various departments to the position of assistant manager which he held for eight years until his transfer in 1950.

At that time he was named as manager of the Caldwell, Idaho, Penney store.

During his two years in Idaho, Hales completely remodeled the Penney store and was then moved to Astoria as manager where he undertook and completed another remodeling job which was finished in 1956.

He succeeded at Astoria by a Klamath Falls man, Lowell Paup, who started with the Penney organization here and has more recently been manager of the Ross Tacoma store.

"I have never inherited a finer organization than I have at the Klamath Falls store," Hales declared after his first staff meeting here. "The force is really top-notch. Bob Harvey has done a marvelous job in handling the store during this transition period. He remains, of course, as my assistant."

Hales indicated that no personnel changes are planned.

Mr. and Mrs. Hales have two sons on active duty with the Air Force and one daughter, Charlotte, at home with them. She is enrolled as a freshman at Klamath Union High School.

U.S. Pins Its Talk Hopes On Cool, Quiet Diplomat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is pinning its hopes for negotiating with belligerent Red China on a cool, quiet diplomat who saw Hitler rise and Stalin fall.

Jacob D. Beam, at 50, is riding the crest of a steady, unspectacular career that somehow always takes him back to Eastern Europe.

Beam has been U.S. ambassador to Communist Poland for the past year. He is meeting in Warsaw with Red China's ambassador there, Wang Ping-nan. They held their first session yesterday on ways to end the Formosa crisis. They get together again next Thursday.

Two men could hardly look less alike. Wang is short and round and balding. His face is fixed in a perpetual pout. Beam is 6 feet 3, gangly and crew-cut, a gentle-faced, professional man.

Beam comes by the Ivy look naturally. He was born March 24, 1908, at Princeton, N.J. His father taught at the university and he was graduated from it in 1929.

"A thorough professional" is the consensus at the State Department.

From mid-1953 until mid-1957, when he went to Warsaw, Beam served in policy planning and the Bureau of European Affairs at the department.

He always seemed among the last to get away from his desk at night. Respectably, droop-shouldered yet walking with a bounce, he looked like a onetime basketball player with a flair for classical literature.

Beam cut his diplomatic eye-teeth at the League of Nations. His first post was Geneva, Switzerland, where he reported on activities of the League during 1931-34.

Barge Eases Shin's Load

PORTLAND (AP) — A tanker finally made it to Portland's upper harbor area Monday after a few hours aground in the Willamette River.

The tanker W.H. Berg was en route to the Portland General Electric Co. diesel power generating plant to unload 77,500 barrels of oil. Rivermen said the tanker was drawing 29 feet of water, and the channel depth went to 28½ feet on low tide.

A barge took on 7,000 gallons of the tanker's oil, and that lightened the tanker enough to allow it to go on upstream, the first tanker to move that far up in the Portland Harbor.

It docked between the Hawthorne and the Ross Island bridges.

Gypsies Hit By Red Paper

BUDAPEST (AP) — Communist propagandists are fond of pointing to race problems in the United States and elsewhere as due to capitalist corruption. Now it seems that Communist Hungary has its own race problem — the Gypsies.

The official party daily Nepszabadsag has taken up the question: "Many Gypsies in Bekes County (southeast Hungary) have already broken away or are about to break away from the old fate of their race."

Tables, closets, beds, clean sheets are no longer missing from their homes and several have radios. A few families even have books on their shelves.

"But most still live at the edge of the villages, in huts. These huts are only a few yards long, and often 8 or 10 people sleep in them, on straw, under a single blanket."

Their public health situation is not satisfactory. In courtyards only a few yards square the manure is piled in heaps and draws masses of flies. Most children do not attend school.

"The peasants of the village have a strong aversion to the Gypsies. . . . They know the Gypsy does not steal from his neighbor. Still, they threaten to sell their own land rather than have a Gypsy next door. They want the Gypsies to stay at the edge of the village."

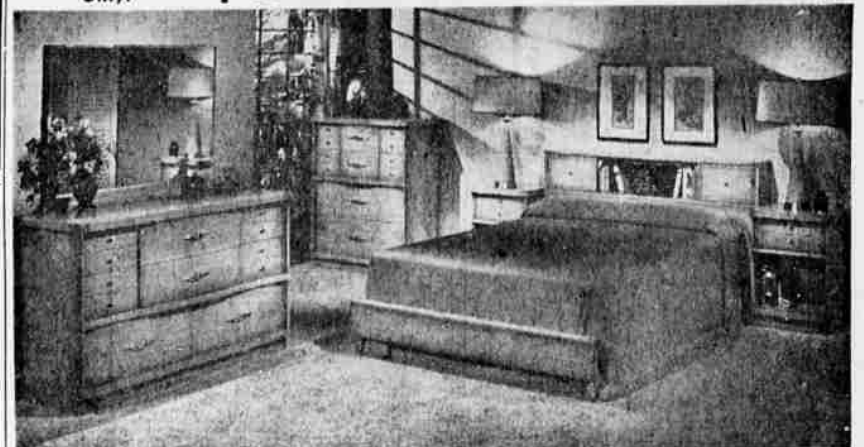
"The Council chairman knows that giving land at the edge of the village for a new and more modern Gypsy quarter with better houses is in opposition with our principles, since it does not lead to equality but to segregation. Still, he gives way to the pressure of the village-loaded with prejudice—and regards this as the best solution."

"If the Gypsies see," concludes the article, "that not only do prejudices disappear but that they get sincere and effective support for their progress, their love of work will grow and they will more easily accustom themselves to the new way of life."
