Jury Finds Man Guilty

Wendell Jack Eggsman was found guilty of assault and battery late Tuesday by a circuit court jury which had heard two days of testimony on an original charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The seven-man, five-woman jury returned its verdict at 4:20 p.m., after deliberating for three and one-half hours. Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg set Friday, September 19, for Eggsman's sentencing.

In final arguments before the jury Tuesday, District Attorney Arthur A. Beddoe recounted events leading to the March 31 fight between Eggsman and Jack Campagna near Chiloquin.

Holding the jagged neck of a wine jug, with which Eggsman was accused of attacking Campagna, Beddoe observed: "This is a nasty little item."

Kenneth Puckett, representing Eggsman, reminded the jury that testimony showed Campagna had charged Eggsman with a part-full quart beer bottle in his hand. In his self defense argument, he described Campagna as a 6-foot, 250-pound man considerably larger than the defendant.

After hearing a charge from Judge Vandenberg, who cited possible verdicts of guilty or innocent of assault with a dangerous weapon, or guilty of assault and battery, the jury retired at 11:25 a.m. The jury was given a luncheon recess for an hour and a quarter, and at 4:20 Foreman Peggy Fouch of Klamath Falls reported the verdict.

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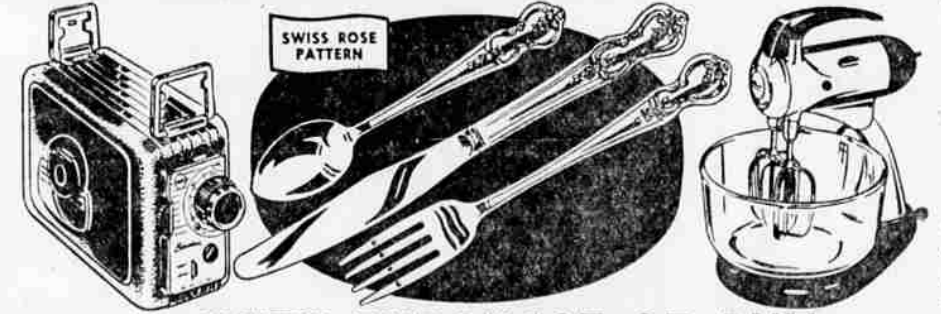
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
