WASHINGTON (AP) — A surprise and a heartwarming story of a helping hand have been brought back by two Pacific Northwest farm youths, who spent nearly six months visiting farm areas in foreign countries.

The story was told Wednesday by Ralph R. Morse, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan D. Morse of Manson, Wash., and the surprise was with Jodie Glen Eggers Jr., son of Mrs. Ruth C. Eggers of Mollala, Ore.

Both were among a group of former 4-H Club members, now returning from their trips abroad.

Morse's experience came on a Costa Rican farm. He told of a barefoot native farmer, who walked into the San Isidro Del General office of Service Technical Inter-American Cooperation.

Supreme Court Opponents Hit By Attorney General

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Rogers says opponents of the Supreme Court's decisions against school segregation are causing confusion by questioning its powers.

In a speech yesterday, Rogers said the high court's authority to interpret the Constitution and to function as the final arbiter in constitutional controversies was set forth by the Founding Fathers and reaffirmed by an early Congress.

"Various notions," he said, "have been circulated by persons opposed to the school decisions that a decision of the Supreme Court of the United States interpreting the Constitution is something less than an authoritative expression of the law."

"This is an unsound notion which causes misunderstanding and confusion," Rogers said.

The attorney general told a national citizenship conference that individuals may not determine for themselves when they will obey the decree of the courts and when they will ignore them, adding: "Constitutional rights must not yield to defiance or lawlessness."

Rogers' speech came a day after he conferred with President Eisenhower at Newport, R.I., on the school integration controversy. It was viewed as an official statement of the administration on the flaming issue.

He said no public official, sworn to support the Constitution, has a right to defy Supreme Court decisions. Every citizen is dutybound to obey the Constitution as interpreted by the court, he added.

Rogers said "the orderly process of constitutional amendments" is available to persons disagreeing with court orders calling for integration of Negro and white pupils in public schools.

An attitude of defiance is futile and damaging, he said.

But he voiced the conviction that the difficulties of adjusting to school integration can be overcome "by a determination on the part of men of good will to find constructive solutions within the guidelines marked out by the Supreme Court."

Norblad (R-Ore) Wednesday criticized former President Truman and political observers who expect a war with Russia.

Norblad, who is seeking reelection from the 1st Congressional District, said Truman was wrong in blaming the Eisenhower administration for the recession.

Norblad said that the Federal Reserve Board—which controls certain aspects of the economy—is non-partisan and some of its members were appointed by Truman himself.

Norblad also said in an interview that the chances of war with Russia were remote because "by 1961 there will be an arms stalemate. Both we and Russia will have the intercontinental ballistic missile operational and in adequate number. We will have the virtual ability to destroy each other."

He conceded that Russia is ahead of the United States now in missile development. "However," he said, "we will catch them in two or three years."

This third telephone cable under the Atlantic is to be completed in 1961. The ocean section will run from Oman, Scotland, to White Bay, Nfld.

The British Post Office is doing the cable-laying job.

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Unwed Mother Of The Year Vanishes With 5 Offspring

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP) — as Eleanor McPartland, wife of a best-selling author and Monterey's Mother of the Year in 1956, said last night she was unwed — and disappeared quietly with her five children.

Ida McPartland, who lives 125 miles away in Mill Valley with her 10-year-old son Donald, first broke the news of John McPartland's two families. She said that in fairness to Donald she wanted it known that she, and not Eleanor, is the widow of the man who wrote "No Down Payment" and a dozen paperback novels.

McPartland died of a heart attack Sunday night and Eleanor was listed as his widow. But Ida said she was married to the writer in Tyler, Tex., in September 1943 and bore him Donald.

Eleanor had been received here as McPartland's wife for a decade. He bore him five children, aged 6, 7, 9 and 10.

"I confirm Ida's story," she said after Ida told newspapermen she is the real widow. "Other than that, I have no comment." Later, she said she was leaving with the children to avoid further publicity. She did.

Ida said the easy-going author had lived with both her and Eleanor over the years and each woman knew of his relations with the other. She explained she never legally separated from him because he kept promising to give up Eleanor and return to her and Donald.

"Why, he made that promise as late as last week," she added. She reported he had spent two weeks with her this month, returning to Eleanor in Monterey only the day before he died.

Eleanor and McPartland formerly lived in the country club district here, then moved to the exclusive Del Monte Forest on this art colony peninsula.

Eleanor was active in Parent-Teacher Assn. and Cub Scouts work.

Ida said she was very sorry over the publicity, but considered the story must be told to establish that McPartland was her son's legal father and that she is the widow.

Her attorney in San Francisco, Jay Ploehner, said he plans to ask that Ida be named administratrix of her husband's estate.

There was no mention of the size of McPartland's estate but friends here said they doubted it would be large.
