Peace Representative Plan Okayed By Three Countries

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United Arab Republic, Jordan and Lebanon are reported to have agreed to a plan for U.N. peace representatives in their countries.

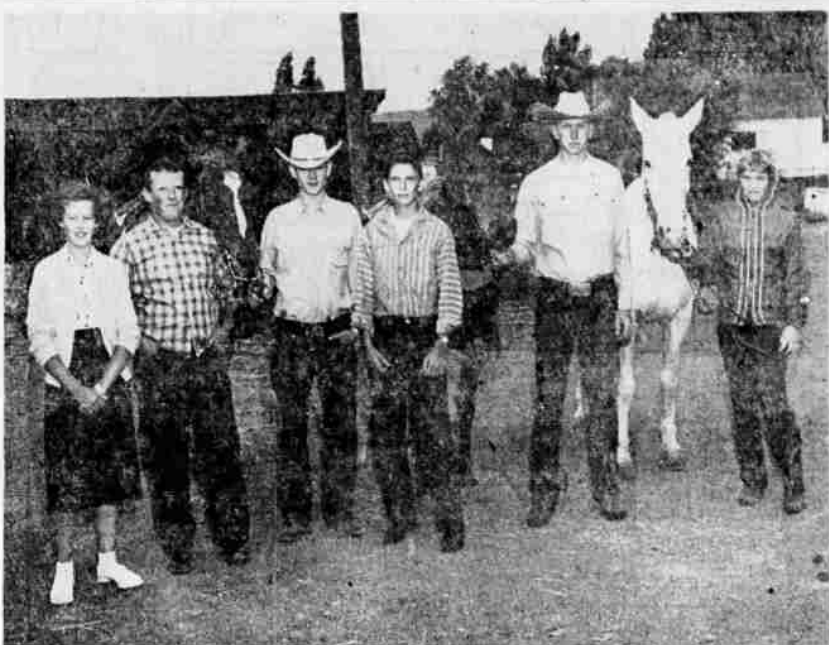
Sources said last night the three nations gave their consent to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld on his recent Middle Eastern trip.

Hammarskjöld is to report to the General Assembly by Sept. 30 on his progress toward insuring peace in the troubled area and facilitating withdrawal of U.S. troops from Lebanon and British forces from Jordan. U.N. officials declined to comment on his progress.

Hammarskjöld was believed to have advocated a plan for what was called a U.N. presence in the three countries to watch for foreign interference. Both the outgoing government of Lebanon and King Hussein of Jordan have accused President Nasser's United Arab Republic of trying to overthrow them.

Although details were not made public, the sources indicated the three countries had accepted a form of Hammarskjöld's plan. Some diplomats said a roving U.N. ambassador would be named.

Here Are Pact Highlights Of Ford, UAW Agreement

DETROIT (AP)—Here are the highlights of the new Ford Motor Co.-United Auto Workers contract agreed on yesterday:

Wages—No flat pay increase for production workers. However, continuation of annual improvement factor and cost-of-living adjustment provides immediate increase of between 9 and 10 cents an hour. A fraction less than 7 cents comes from the 2½ per cent improvement factor, 3 cents from the cost-of-living adjustment. New approximate average hourly pay is now \$2.32.

Skilled worker wages — An increase of 8 cents an hour in base pay for tool and die workers and other classifications. These pay rates vary.

Layoff pay — Extension of the maximum payment period from 26 weeks to 39 weeks and an increase to a flat 65 per cent of take-home pay for the full period; formerly it was 65 per cent for the first four weeks and 60 per cent for the remainder. Layoff pay (supplemental unemployment benefits) is in addition to state unemployment compensation.

Pensions—Increased from \$2.25

a month for each year of service to \$2.40 for all past service and to \$2.50 for all future service. Employees now on pension are increased to \$2.35. Early retirement permitted at age of 60 on double benefits; single benefits take effect when person becomes 65 and is eligible for Social Security.

Severance (or separation) pay—A lump sum payment based on length of service to workers losing their jobs because of plant relocations. It pays up to a maximum of \$3,000 for 30 years service. This is an entirely new contract provision.

Civil Service Exams Slated

Training officers in the military sciences are needed at the U.S. Naval Training Device Center, Port Washington, New York, the U.S. Civil Service Commission announces. The entrance salaries are \$7,630 and \$8,300 a year.

The duties of these positions involve the participation in programs for the development, production and utilization of military training devices and in the training of technical personnel to maintain and operate these devices.

Applicants must have completed college study in both technical and educational fields, have had appropriate military or civilian training experience, or have had any time-equivalent combination of education and experience. In addition, they must have had appropriate specialized experience in training programs concerned with technical equipment.

Full information regarding the requirements and how to apply may be obtained from the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications will be accepted by the Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, U.S. Naval Training Device Center, Port Washington, New York, until further notice.
