

# Tigers Start Season - End Sprint: Cards Make Life Tough For Braves

## Detroit Humbles Turley

Detroit is third in American League standings, but they're still the tail-end Tigers, waiting until the pennant is gone before making a season-end sprint for a share of the World Series loot.

It's a old habit with the Tigers. And it has cost two managers—Bucky Harris and Jack Tighe—their jobs.

In 1956, the Tigers roared through the last weeks and finished fifth.  
The Tigers finished fourth in 1957, but they had to win on the final day to do it.  
When their 1958 start indicated something worse, Tighe was ousted and Bill Norman took over an eighth-place club June 19.  
The Tigers moved into third last weekend and built a two-game hold on the spot with a 5-2 victory over the Yankees yesterday. It was their sixth straight win. Again the Sox are tied for fourth with idle Cleveland by splitting a double-header at Kansas City. The A's won the opener 6-3, then lost 4-2. Rain postponed Baltimore's game at Chicago.

## Tigers 5, NY 2

The Tigers got the clincher the hard way. They beat 21-game winner Bob Turley with the help of eight-swinging Reno Bertia, whose fifth and sixth homers counted their first three runs.  
Jim Bunning (13-19), last year's 20-game winner, gave up a third-inning, two-run homer by Mickey Mantle, his 41st.

## Boston, A's Split

Williams lost ground to Boston teammate Pete Runnels in the bat race. Both honored in the opener, but Runnels pushed his leading average to .322 with 4-for-8 in the pair. Williams, sitting out the second game, was 2-for-4 for a second best .318. Kansas City's Bob Cerv was 2-for-4, tying Cleveland's Vic Power and Detroit's injured Harvey Kuenn for third at .315.  
Harry Chitt's grand slam won the opener for the A's and Ray Herbert (8-7) against Ike Delock (12-8), who has lost five straight.

## Honkers Eye Home Win

"Since the varsity has no stars to carry the load each player must do his own share," said coach Howard Hopper while preparing his Lakeview High Honkers for their first home game of 1958 season against Yreka at Lakeview Friday night.

# County 'B' Schools Begin Grid Schedule

County 'B' School footballs will fill the air this weekend as the Sacred Heart Trojans, the Bonanza Antlers, the Chiloquin Panthers, the Malin Mustangs and the Merrill Huskies get off and running in regular 1958 season conference play.

Opening the fully packed two days of play, on a local gridiron are the Bonanza Antlers who play host to an invading Talent 11 at Gem Stadium Friday night at 8.

The Antlers, under the direction of coach "Erv" Ellis, hold a 26-0 win over the Henley Hornets Jayvees in a game played at Henley last Saturday and from a casual observer's standpoint may prove to be a dark horse entrant in the county race. The Talent team, relatively unknown quantity in pre-season dope, should prove to be a good test of the Bonanza power.

Also set for a Friday night engagement are the Sacred Heart Trojans who trek across the Green-springs for their opener with St. Mary's of Medford. Coach Jerry Kempf's Trojans, the smallest squad among the Klamath Basin schools, have turned out to be a rough-tough group despite their lack of depth and experience. In a warmup test played on Modoc Field against the Klamath Warriors Jayvees the Sacred Heart warriors got off to an early one-touchdown lead, sagged to a 13-6 deficit in the middle periods, then bounced back with a fourth period TD and conversion that netted them a 13-13 draw with the junior Peels.

St. Mary's lost its game to Sacred Heart last year by virtue of a forfeit and no pre-1958 season dope has been made available to date.

The Merrill Huskies and the Malin Mustangs square off Saturday afternoon at Malin in what must be termed the highlight of the weekend's festivities, since it is the only game played on the home front in which two Klamath County schools will participate.

The always intense rivalry between the Huskies and the Mustangs is further heightened this year by the fact that the Malin 11, still smarting from the defeat handed them last year by Merrill is going into battle under the direction of brand new coach George Hansen, who is determined to launch his career with a victory over coach Al Keck and his defending District 5B champions.

In a pre-season clash on Modoc Field last Saturday afternoon the Malin squad racked up a 23-9 victory over the Klamath Union Jayvees, while Merrill pulled down a win from an alumnae team in a warmup game played at Merrill. Saturday night the Chiloquin Panthers, headed by Coach Gordon Kust, greet an invader from the "valley" side of the conference when they face Jacksonville in Gem Stadium at 8 p.m.

Jacksonville, like the Talent team, is an unknown quantity. They come off a 1957 season during which they failed to break into the win column. Early scouting reports of the addition of a new coach and a complete renovation of the squad indicates that Jacksonville may be a highly improved club.

The Panthers, who fell before powerful Henley last Friday night at Gem by a count of 29-6, are showing much more power than originally forecast by coach Kust. The Chiloquin team emerged from the hard-fought Hornet test with no injuries and have gone through five days of steady preparation for Jacksonville with heavy emphasis being placed on blocking assignments. Chiloquin is rated the favorite's role.

# Cardinals Stymie Nemesis

The St. Louis Cardinals, without a manager and with only a slim hope for a fourth place finish, are back at the old stand — making life a bit tougher than it should be for the Milwaukee Braves.

It was in 1956 that the Cardinals, settled in fourth, knocked the Braves out of the National League pennant. Last season, when the Braves thought they had it all locked up, they had to put on another drive to knock off the second place Cardinals, who had closed within two games.

## SL 5, Braves 3

Last night, hours after Fred Hutchinson was fired officially as field boss, the Cards took the Braves 5-3, knocking off 29-game winner Warren Spahn, a longtime nemesis, to boot. That delayed the Braves' run to a second consecutive flag. Their magic number still is three over second place Pittsburgh.

The Chicago Cubs tied Los Angeles for sixth by beating Philadelphia 6-2 in the only other NL game scheduled. It was held to seven innings by rain.  
Gene Green drove in two runs, with his 12th homer and a triple for the Cards, who came off with a 3-3 record against Spahn for the season. Larry Jackson (13-12) was the winner with Jim Brosnan's relief in the ninth.

Stan Hack, fired as a coach in the St. Louis house cleaning, agreed to direct the Cards for the rest of the season. The Cards' front office refused to name a manager for next year—likely ex-intellecter Solly Hemus, now with the Phils—to replace Hutch, who was the fifth to get the gate this season in the majors.

## Cubs 6, Phils 2

Rookie Bob Anderson (13-1) beat the Phils with a five-hitter, and held batting leader Richie Ashburn hitting in two at-bats, dropping his average to .342 for .004 edge over the Cards' injured-illed Stan Musial. Ray Semproch (13-11), once a rookie of the year candidate, lost it, giving up a two-run homer to Ernie Banks, his 47th.

## Football Tickets

Reserved seat tickets to the Klamath Union-South Eugene football game to be played on Modoc Field Friday night will be placed on sale at the chamber of commerce early Friday morning, it was reported today by KU athletic director, Jim Johnson. Reserved seat prices are 1.50 per game.

Also on sale at the chamber office are season tickets which, for \$6 will entitle the holder to admission to all Pelican home games. Johnson had previously noted that purchasers of season tickets would virtually own their seat for future years, the plan being that they would be awarded the first chance at the same seats for the ensuing seasons.

# Henley To Test Alturas

Coach Ted Ammerman and his squad of fired-up Henley Hornets will taper off a week of extensive drills Friday afternoon in the final preparations for their departure for Alturas to meet the Modoc Union High Braves Saturday afternoon in their second venture of the 1958 season.

The Henley footballers, Klamath County's lone A-2 representative, showed strong signs of living up to pre-season predictions that they were the club to beat in A-2 contention by stopping a determined Chiloquin Panther eleven 20-6, at Gem Stadium last Friday night.

Spearheaded by standout performances by All-Conference center Joe Tachini and the mighty-toed fullback, Phil Swisher, the Hornets were never in serious trouble against the eager Panthers.

A black spot on the otherwise clear Hornet horizon developed when Burrell Gober, a fleet 165-pound senior halfback, re injured an already sore knee while trying to cut through the Panther defense. Gober, although not seriously damaged, will be forced to sit out the Alturas conflict. It is expected that he will be ready for the next Henley match at Eagle Point.

Substantially filling the hole vacated by Gober is Tom McBride, a 135-pound junior, who will join sophomore quarterback Gary Beber, Lawrence Lago, a sophomore half and Swisher, the fullback in making up the Hornet backfield.

Beber showed an aptitude as a passer in the Chiloquin test, while Lago is developing into a credible blocker and pass receiver. Swisher, in addition to his punting ability pairs with Beber in the passing assignments.

Serving on the line with Tachini are ends Leroy Larsen and Dick Dehlinger; guards Gary Boyd and Ted Berry; and tackles John Roberts and Lewis Carey.

Henley enters the Alturas hassle sporting a 100-point average front line while the backs average 153.

With Hutchinson went his three coaches, Stan Hack, Terry Moore and Al Hollingsworth. Hack agreed to manage the Redbirds until the end of the season. Then he's on his way out of the Cardinals organization, as is Moore. Hollingsworth might be offered another job in the system.

The only stumbling block in the way of Hemus' selection appeared to be terms the Philadelphia Phils might want for him. At second base for the Phils, he has been one of the few live wires on that team.

Eddie Stanky, now a coach with the Cleveland Indians, will be with the Cardinals next year. He'll act as a "baseball brain," with a final say on trades, bonus players and rookies.
