Guide Council Elects Chiefs

Officers were elected and new members introduced at the first order of business at the Wednesday luncheon meeting of the Klamath County Child Guidance Advisory Council held at the Klamath County Health Center.

Mrs. E. A. Geary was reelected to serve as chairman for the coming year and Mrs. Hagan Moore was named as vice chairman. She will continue her duties as secretary until a new secretary is elected.

New members of the advisory council are Mrs. Leland Cheyne, Mrs. John Martin and Jess House. A guest at the meeting was Barbara Davis, from the state child welfare office.

Mrs. Geary set October 15 as the tentative date for the next meeting. Dr. John Waterman of the state mental health office will be invited to attend.

In anticipation of Dr. Waterman's visit, Mrs. Andy Collier was named as chairman of a committee to lay the groundwork for a community workshop program which is proposed here. Purpose of the workshops would be to permit wider dissemination of information regarding the availability of the services of the child guidance clinic and other community agencies.

Forrest F. Hawley, a supervisor with the city school system, gave a short talk on the value of the Klamath County Child Guidance Clinic and the services of a psychiatrist and psychiatric social worker to the school. He explained that about 10 cases each year over the last six years have been referred to the clinic from the schools. Diagnosis made by a trained psychiatrist can determine, he pointed out, the seat of the trouble in most instances. Consultations are held and in nearly all of the cases, much of the trouble has been alleviated.

Conditions in the home, Hawley said, are frequently the basis of difficulties at school. Parents with whom the school authorities consult, Hawley said, are almost uniformly cooperative and a change in home attitudes is nearly always reflected in improvement at school. If it is determined by diagnosis that there has been organic diffused brain injury, caused by a high fever in infancy or some other illness, treatment can be arranged, Hawley said.

Chiloquin Roster Stays The Same

CHILOQUIN — The total school enrollment at Chiloquin at the end of the first week of school is identical to that of last year at the same time, 450 students. There are eight fewer pupils in the lower six grades but five more in the seventh and eighth, three more in the upper four grades.

Principal Frank Hale reported the following registration: First grade, 50; second grade, 43; third grade, 37; fourth grade, 41; fifth grade, 42; sixth grade, 50.

From the high school building Principal John Mathis reports the enrollment as follows: seventh grade, 41; eighth grade, 31; ninth grade, 37; tenth grade, 32; eleventh grade, 24; and twelfth grade, 19.

The total enrollment as of the first week of school for the five years before 1957 were as follows: 1952, 392; 1953, 400; 1954, 438; 1955, 388; and 1956, 424.

Southern Cal Professor Outlines Study Methods

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Millions of students are back in class wondering if they have what it takes to shine as scholars.

They should lend an ear to Dr. Leslie N. Nason, professor of education at the University of Southern California. He's specialized for 20 years in helping students do better at exams.

Study habits, he says, can make all the difference. And he has a lot of helpful hints.

Here are some he devised for college freshmen—"the freshman year is an ideal time to cultivate proper methods"—but which should benefit students at other levels:

"1. Read the material in the table of contents of whatever book you are studying.

"2. Read the first paragraph, or two of the first chapter.

"3. Skim through the chapter rapidly.

"4. Read the summary at the end of the chapter.

"Then start reading the chapter carefully. At the end of each paragraph, ask yourself, 'What did the writer say?' And if you can't answer this question, you were reading too slowly.

"Slow reading allows extraneous thoughts and material to penetrate the consciousness. Reading faster serves to whip the mind to a faster rate of operation, thus limiting the circle of perception exclusively to the material at hand."

On lectures:
"You have to prepare for the lecture by glancing at the material to be lectured on beforehand. You get an over-all pattern in mind. You are filling up mind space which is not utilized by the lecturer. He's not talking fast enough to fill up your mind."

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
