Parents Mull Religion Study

DUNSMUIR — Whether or not Dunsmuir elementary school children will be excused from school for a maximum of four hour-long instruction periods per month for religious study will be up to a poll of parental opinion, church and school representatives have decided.

At a meeting of school board representatives and representatives of Dunsmuir churches a ballot was drawn up Wednesday morning which will be sent to every couple having children in school. One opinion per family will be sought and parents will be asked to return the ballots by next Tuesday.

The ballot will say "The laws of California state that pupils may be excused from school for religious instruction one hour per week, a maximum of four hours

per month, during the school year. Do you believe the Dunsmuir Elementary School Board of Trustees should continue to grant time to those pupils who would make use of it? Yes, No, and no opinion." The board has agreed to abide by a simple majority of yes or no.

Controversy over religious release time arose last month after the board voted to forego granting this period, reversing a 15 year custom. Board members explained their policy was to get the most of the school day for the maximum number of pupils. Club and all extracurricular athletics have been deleted from the regular class time, Roger Ellis, school superintendent, explained.

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Weed Judge Sentences 3

WEED—Approximately 310 days in the county jail at Yreka was doled out as sentences in three separate cases heard in the Weed Justice Court by John Kinstrey, acting judge of the Weed Justice Court in the absence of Judge Kenneth T. Stone.

Paul Alvin Mayes, 37, Klamath Falls, received a full six-month sentence after pleading guilty to charges of being drunk in an auto and for furnishing alcoholic beverages to a minor under the age of 21. The minor, Marvin Lee Jones, 18, Keno, was sentenced to serve 100 days after pleading guilty to driving while intoxicated and for illegal possession of an alcoholic beverage. The two were arrested Saturday evening by Weed Police officers. Before their arrest the Oregonians were reported to have forced another vehicle from the roadway.

Thomas Carrillo Jr., 25, Escondido, California, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail after pleading guilty to charges of carrying a concealed weapon in his vehicle. The weapon, a seven-inch blade knife was found by Weed police officers after apprehending the defendant for sheriff's deputies. Carrillo was reported to have driven away from a Yreka service station shortly before his apprehension here without paying for gas and will be charged in the Yreka Court for that violation.

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
