Dog On Raft Gets Reprieve

HONOLULU (UPI) — Devere Baker said today that Tangaroa, the mongrel pup that accompanied him aboard the raft Lehi IV from California to Honolulu, will not have to die after all.
Tangaroa has joined the Navy. Baker said he got a call from Capt. E. G. Gardner, skipper of the USS Kawishwi, navy tanker at Pearl Harbor, asking if he could have the bright-eyed dog as a ship's mascot.
"It's a perfect solution," Baker said. "He loves people and he loves the sea."
The 18-month-old dog served as "moral officer" for Baker and three companions on the 69-day raft voyage. He had been threatened with destruction because of Baker's strict quarantine rules.
Baker came to Honolulu Monday to await the arrival of his wife and two daughters from Redondo Beach, Calif.
The object of the Lehi's voyage was to prove that Hawaii's original settlers could have drifted from the Americas.
Baker said he had spent all his money on the Hawaii trip but that he is still "determined" to try to drift from the Persian Gulf to Central America. He is hoping to prove a section of the Book of Mormon which says the prophet Lehi used that method to transport the lost tribes of Israel to the American continent. He said it will take him about two years to get ready.

Elk Killed As Menace

PORTLAND (AP)—A bull elk which wandered into Portland recently was shot Monday as a menace to city dwellers.
Officials said it probably came from the Coast Range, following wooded ridges until it came to the southwest edge of the city. There it found a wooded tract surrounded by housing developments.
Residents said they heard it trumpeting in there several days after concluding they could not catch it alive.
Two city policemen flushed the 500-pound animal from the trees, and a state Game Commission employee killed it with a rifle.
