

Phillies Win Two From Pittsburgh

That was quite a fanning bee in Philly, but no one could buzz the ball by Richie Ashburn, who regained the National League batting lead with a .343 figure.

A total of 38 strikeouts—which set two major league records—were registered Monday night as the Phillies swept a two-night twin-bill from the Pirates. The Phillies won the 14-inning opener, 3-2, and the nightcap, 1-0.

Ashburn was one of the few players on both clubs who didn't strike out once. He collected two hits in six trips during the opener and went four-for-four in the finale to boost his average five points and move ahead of San Francisco's Willie Mays, who is second with .342.

Phils Win Pair

Three Philadelphia pitchers — Seth Morehead, Dick Farrell and Jack Meyer — contributed to a record in the opener when they struck out 21 Pirate batters. That broke the previous record of 20 strikeouts set by St. Louis Browns' pitchers in a 15-inning game against the Washington Senators July 25, 1913.

Morehead fanned 12 in 9 innings, Farrell 2 in 2 innings and Meyer, the winner, 7 in 3 innings including the first six men to face him.

Ronnie Kline went the route for Pittsburgh and had five strikeouts himself. He played only the winning run in the 14th on singles by Bobby Young, Ed Bouchee and Dave Philley.

In the nightcap, Jack Sanford of the Phillies struck out 10 more Pittsburgh batters while pitching a seven-hit and notching his 10th victory.

Sanford's 10 victims, coupled with the 21 in the opener, set another record of 31 for a doubleheader that included an extra-inning game. The old record was 27 set by the Dodgers and Cubs in a June 30, 1957, doubleheader that totaled 20 innings.

Bennie Daniels, the loser, struck out two and gave up the only run of the game in the seventh inning. Ashburn bunted safely, then stole his 29th base and came around on Ted Kazanski's single off second baseman Bill Mazeroski's glove.

Chief Pirate strikeout victims were Kline, who fanned five straight times in the opener, and Bob Skinner, who went down on strikes four times in the first game.

Only Pittsburgh players who didn't strike out all night were Dick Groat, who played only in the first game, and Ted Kluszewski, who grounded out in a pinch-hitting role in the ninth inning of the nightcap.

Braves' Pitching Has Edge

NEW YORK (AP)—Psychologically, physically and statistically, the Milwaukee Braves hold the edge over the New York Yankees in pitching.

Psychologically because Lew Burdette, who ran up 24 scoreless innings while winning three games against New York last year, again will be on the firing line. Manager Fred Haney probably will start right off with him instead of waiting until the second game as he did in 1957.

Physically because Whitey Ford, Don Larsen and Ryno Duren, three of Casey Stengel's most dependable hurlers, have done little to help the Yankee cause in the last couple of months. Ford and Larsen have been plagued by sore arms and Duren came down with a leg injury on top of a beaning.

Statistically because the Braves' Warren Spahn has lost none of his effectiveness, winning 20 or more games for the ninth time. Burdette is having his best year and Bob Rush and Carl Willey filled in exceptionally well for the injured Bob Buhl. Conversely, Bob Turley was the Yanks' only reliable pitcher after Larsen and Ford were sidelined.

Led by Spahn, the major league leader, Milwaukee pitchers have gone the distance 69 times. Yankee mounds have 53 complete games, New York leads in shut-outs — 20 to 15. Spahn has 23 complete games while Turley tops the American League champions with 19.

Twenty-two pitchers will be eligible for the World Series which starts in County Stadium, Milwaukee, Wednesday, Oct. 1. Before that date Stengel will decide which among right-handers Larsen, Murry Dickson and Tom Sturdivant will be on the sidelines.

Only nine hurlers, however, figure to have anything to say about the outcome. They are Turley (21-7), Ford (14-7), Larsen (8-6) and reliever Duren (6-4) for the Yankees. And Spahn (21-11), Burdette (19-10), Rush (10-6), Willey (8-6) and reliever Don McMahon (7-2) for Milwaukee.

Duke Maas (10-8) of the Yanks has an outside chance for a starting assignment.

Burdette's three victories and one by Spahn enabled Milwaukee to take last year's seven-game set. Ford, Turley and Larsen won for the Yankees.

Curtice Has Humor Despite Worst Loss

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Coach Jack Curtice of Stanford issued a word of advice to other mentors today.

"No matter how badly you get beaten, if you stay in the game long enough some day you'll get beaten worse."

Curtice, who may be the world's funniest losing coach, made the statement after watching his new Indians get shellacked by Washington State, 40-6, in the opening game of the season.

"The only thing we did real good up there was to confuse the Rice scouts," said Curtice. "Maybe that'll help us in our game against the Owls this week."

Curtice blamed the debacle on the fact that the Stanford lads were "just trying too hard. I think they wanted to get me off on the right foot — and they became too tense."

It was Cactus Jack's belief that the Washington State team is one of the sounder squads on the West Coast — but really not more than two touchdowns better than the Indians.

"That is a solid club," he said. "Their punter, Bob Newman rates right even with Lee Grasscup, whom I had at Utah."

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Untested Ohio St. Tops Poll

NEW YORK (AP)—Still untested Ohio State and Oklahoma this week retained the No. 1 and No. 2 positions they were awarded in the Associated Press preseason football poll a week ago.

Ohio State still held its whopping margin with 45 first-place votes and a point total of 963, to Oklahoma's 12 ballots for top place and a 328 total.

Notre Dame and Auburn, also untested, switched places as the sports writers and sportscasters participating in the poll changed their mind as to the potential of the two teams. Notre Dame, third in the preseason balloting, was dropped to fifth, and Auburn moved up from fifth to third, Michigan State retained its fourth spot.

Auburn, in fact, ran second this week in first-place votes, garnering 18. It had nine last week.

Only three of the top 10 preseason teams have seen action, and one was defeated. North Carolina, 10th last week, was upset by North Carolina State and dropped out of sight. Mississippi played Memphis State and Texas Christian played Kansas, both winning their games handsly.

Washington State replaced North Carolina as the No. 10 team, and Navy, which was seventh in the preseason poll, dropped to 11th as Pitt. on the basis of its victory over UCLA, was moved from 19th to the Navy's spot. Army moved up a notch to eighth place although it ranked behind Navy a week ago.

Gallagher reminded all Owl Hoot members that the regular Monday night dinner meetings will reconvene next Monday night. A program is planned for next week's meeting.

Owls, Pels Schedule Home Field Contests

It's home football week at Modoc Field as both the Oregon Tech Owls and Klamath Union High School Pelicans schedule home field battles this weekend.

Friday night, coach Andy Knudsen's spirited Pelicans take on the Shasta High Wolves of Redding. Saturday, Oregon Tech opens its 1958 home season against Hamilton Air Base, one of the toughest service teams in the country.

OTI's home opener for the 1958 schedule will bring to Klamath Falls several former college stars including four or five all-American gridlers. Other Hamilton footballers have already seen pro football service and will undoubtedly be the toughest foe on the Owls list of nine games.

Tech opened their season last Saturday with a 6-0 win over a tough undated Westminister College club. Westminister was the heavy favorite to dump the Owls, just as the Hamilton Defenders will be in Saturday night's game here.

Oregon Tech will probably go into the game without the services of end Ardel Hamilton. The Sacramento JC transfer suffered a badly wrenched knee in the second quarter of Saturday's game at Salt Lake and is expected to be sidelined for at least a week and a half. It is not known at this time if Hamilton will be ready for the Owls Oregon Collegiate Conference opener a week from Saturday against Portland State College.

The Pelicans step onto the field for the second consecutive week in front of hometown fans as they tangle with the Redding Shasta High Wolves in a nonconference match beginning at 8 p.m. on Modoc Field.

The Pels, with a 1-1 mark for the early 1958 season, will seek to make it two in a row, having trimmed favored South Eugene 12-0, their last time out. In addition, the Pelicans hold a 7-6 victory over the Wolves from their meeting in 1957.

Coach Steve Stevens' Shasta squad suffered a 42-14 trimming at the hands of the Oroville Tigers at Oroville last Friday night after having taken the Eureka Loggers into camp, 20-7, the week before.

The Pelicans bounced back from a 47-0 blasting at the hands of the Marshfield Pirates to launch one of the most determined attacks ever seen on Modoc Field in whipping the Axemen.

KU coach Andy Knudsen, highly pleased with the overall performance of his squad in the Eugene victory observed that while his club may have a slight speed advantage over the Redding aggregation, the Shastas are a good bit heavier and contain a tough offensive punch.

The Pels took only warm up drills in the rain on Modoc Monday afternoon and will swing into tough pre-game scrimmage sessions as the week progresses.

KU, Henley Fresh Meet On Modoc

The Klamath Union freshman football squad, under the leadership of coach Hank Smith, gets its first taste of action this afternoon as it hosts a Henley High squad of freshmen and sophomores on Modoc Field.

The KU frosh, after getting off to a late start because of a delay in arrival of equipment, will use the Henley test as a springboard for the match with the Medford McLaughlin Junior High team this weekend.

The starting lineup for the baby Pels will include Gary Buchholz at quarterback, Earl Brinson and Ted Steiner at halfback slots and Larry McClure at full. David Stippich will work as alternate backfield man. In the line are Bob Dearing and Dick Stevens at ends; Ken Cooper and Craig Elliott at tackles; David Burnett and Rod Sparlin as guards and Dick Mode at center. Mike Newell and Dennis Swift will serve as defensive linemen.

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Injuries Rap Bears Hard, Two Sidelined

California's Golden Bears are finding football an exciting sport but a devastating one, also.

Three first string players have been removed from action for the entire season because of injuries. Two more were on the sidelines Monday as Cal went through an hour's drill for Saturday's upcoming battle with Michigan State at Lansing. The Bears lost to College of Pacific, 24-20, last week.

Right guard Charlie Johnson had several stitches taken in a foot cut and will have to stay off it for at least three days, and center Frank Doretto missed practice because of an injured knee.

Washington's performance in beating San Jose State, 14-6, pleased coach Jim Owens, so he gave his squad only a light workout Monday. The players went indoors to drill on offensive and defensive plays. Owens said he would make no lineup changes for this week's contest against Minnesota.

Although Washington State bopped Stanford, 40-6, coach Jim Sutherland put the Cougars through a hard drill Monday in preparation for Saturday's contest at Evanston against Northwestern.

Sutherland said some weaknesses were detected in the Stanford game and he'd work on them the rest of the week. Fullback Eddy Stevens was the only casualty. He suffered a back bruise, but it isn't bad enough to keep him out against Northwestern.

UCLA, whipped 27-6 last week by Pittsburgh, reported sad tidings.

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
