

Garrison Flag Tipped Clue When Ike Suffered Attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — The big garrison flag wasn't flying that gloomy Saturday morning three years ago today. We didn't know it then but it meant President Eisenhower had suffered a heart attack.

Today, his 68th birthday less than a month away, the President is ruddy and apparently much refreshed after 3½ weeks of a lot of golf by the windswept sea at Newport, R.I.

Today most folks never would guess just by looking at Eisenhower that since the heart seizure in Denver exactly three years ago he also had brushed close to death with ileitis in June 1956.

They wouldn't guess, either, that last November he was hit by a slight stroke which affected his speech for a while.

But if you are a reporter who has covered Eisenhower's activities since he was nominated for the presidency in July 1952, then you know that this man's appearance means little—indeed, it can be most deceiving—so far as the

state of his health is concerned. Take, for example, that Saturday morning in Denver—Sept. 24, 1955—when the big garrison flag wasn't flying in front of the President's vacation office at Lowry Air Force Base.

To sleepy-eyed newsmen arriving at the base at 7:30 a.m. from a downtown hotel, that at the moment was good news. It meant they were on hand ahead of the early-rising Eisenhower—and that takes some doing—to see him arrive from the Lafayette Street home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. John S. Doud.

A medium-size American flag fluttered from the staff in the murky early autumn weather. But a much larger garrison banner always was run up in its place the minute the President arrived, and it had not been hoisted yet.

Time passed, and still no word the President was on his way.

The newsmen pondered the possibilities, but the delay wasn't disturbing. Apparently the President, for once, was coming to the office a bit later. Or maybe he had decided to skip the office and go directly to the golf course.

Not until mid-afternoon did they learn the real reason the garrison flag wasn't run up.

No thought the President might be ill crossed the minds of the waiting newsmen. And there was good reason for that.

The day before, Eisenhower had returned to Denver after several days of trout fishing high in the Rocky Mountains at Fraser, Colo. He had looked wonderful.

He had stopped by the office briefly and then hustled out to the Cherry Hills Country Club for 27 holes of golf. He had a hamburger with onions for lunch.

So he was in excellent health, no doubt about that—just as the doctors in Washington had told the President himself a few weeks earlier after his annual physical checkup.

But in the night all that had changed. He had suffered what the doctors later diagnosed as a moderate heart attack.

It would put him in the hospital for seven weeks. It would keep him away from his White House desk 3½ months. It would curtail his activities to some extent the rest of his life.

But it would not keep him from running for reelection—something that seemed incredible that day three years ago—and winning.

Pope Names Chicago Head

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pope Pius XII today named Archbishop Albert G. Meyer of Milwaukee to succeed the late Samuel Cardinal Stritch as archbishop of Chicago. The Chicago archdiocese, with 1,942,000 Catholics, is the largest of the 138 archdioceses and dioceses in the United States.

Announcement of the appointment was made by Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, apostolic delegate to the United States. Archbishop Meyer, a native of Milwaukee, is 55. He was ordained in 1926.

No date was set for the archbishop's formal installation in the Chicago archdiocese.

Today's announcement made no reference to Archbishop Meyer's successor in Milwaukee.

The Pope last March 1 named Cardinal Stritch pro-prefect of the Vatican's Congregation for the "Propagation of the Faith—to direct the spreading of the Roman Catholic faith throughout the world.

Cardinal Stritch died in Rome May 27 after suffering a paralyzing stroke a week earlier.

Redlands Youth Damages Auto

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DeGaulle Calls Cabinet, Ready For Sunday Vote

PARIS (AP)—Counting on voter approval of his new constitution, Premier de Gaulle summoned his Cabinet today to prepare for the first elections under the Fifth Republic.

The election for a new Parliament shorn of many of its old members is expected to be set for Sunday, Nov. 16. Political observers say runoffs would be held the following Sunday.

Gen. de Gaulle, who virtually dictated the proposed constitution to be voted on this Sunday, still has given no indication how he

wants the election law written. Its form will strongly influence the political complexion of Parliament. Some non-Communist leftist parties fear De Gaulle will weight the law to favor conservatives.

Whatever the leanings of the new Parliament, its election will clear the way for the naming of a new president. De Gaulle himself is expected to take the job.

Observers expect the presidential election to be held the last half of December. The new constitution leaves the choice up to Parliament and electors representing the towns, most of whose officials are conservatives.

None of the election decisions to be taken today was expected to become public.

With the referendum only four days away, Algerian nationalists redoubled their campaign of terrorism intended to force France into negotiating with them. The rebels object that the proposed constitution does not promise independence to Algeria.

Police are fighting back. In two attacks on police cars in the Paris area during the last 24 hours, six Algerians were killed and two policemen slightly wounded.

The most daring nationalist attempt at sabotage was discovered yesterday. A frightened French woman tourist found a crude five-pound dynamite bomb in a toilet on the top level of the famed Eiffel Tower.

The bomb was powerful enough to blow off the top of the 984-foot landmark. But its timing clock had stopped.

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Reds Create Freak Dog

LONDON (AP) — Moscow radio reported today a Soviet surgeon has created a dog with two heads, one of them transplanted. The broadcast said the dog is feeling well and eats with both mouths.

Dr. Vladimir Demikhov reportedly removed the head from a puppy and joined its main blood vessels to the carotid artery and jugular vein of an adult dog. The broadcast said an American Neuro-pathologist, Dr. A. David Gurevitch of New York, saw the experiment. It took place at the Moscow Medical Institute.

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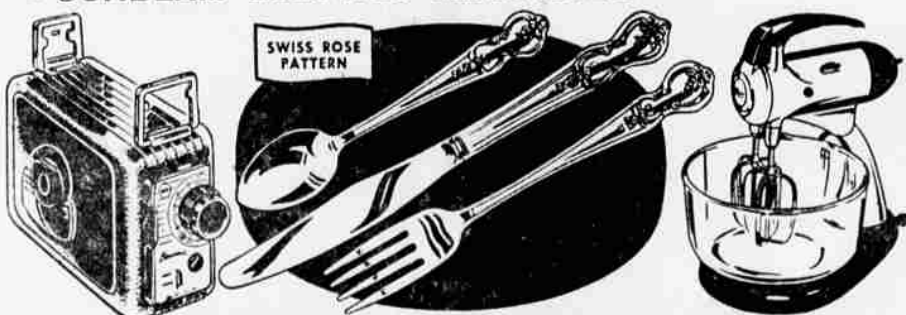
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
