Porcupine Total Listed By Clerk

LAKEVIEW — A total of 4,198 porcupines have been accounted for by the beginning of this week, according to County Clerk Zane Grey, in connection with the program started in the county in July.

A bounty of 50 cents is paid on each porcupine nose brought to the office of the county clerk. The program was set up through an agreement between Lake County and three timber companies operating in the county whereby each put up \$1,000 for a total fund of \$4,000.

Jack Saubert, timber management officer on the Fremont Forest, states that he has received inquiries from Region 5 of the U.S. Forest Service regarding the setup of the porcupine control program in Lake County. Region 5 is composed of the state of California with headquarters in San Francisco.

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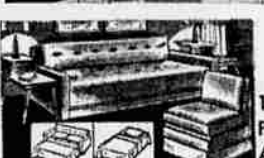
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
