From Washington: Administration officials discount speculation that Nationalist China may GO IT ALONE in attacking the China mainland. They say they're confident Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek would make no such move without explicit American approval.

From Formosa: "Informed sources" said today the United States has told General Chiang Kai-Shek that it is 100 per cent opposed to bombing raids on the China mainland AS LONG AS THERE REMAINS A SPARK OF HOPE THAT THE FORMOSAN CRISIS CAN BE SETTLED PEACEFULLY.

These sources said this view has been explained to Chiang and that the Nationalist president has accepted it. They added that as long as the communists limit their assault on the Quemoy to artillery shelling the Nationalists will restrict their defense to counter-artillery fire.

Bombers would be unleashed against the communists only if the reds bomb first or attempt an amphibious landing against the offshore islands.

In attempting to analyze and appraise what is going on, we have to remember that the poker game in the Formosa straits is a staggeringly big one.

If we back down, our prestige in the Far East will be gone where the woodbine twined. If Red China backs down, she will lose face. "Face" is traditionally important in the Orient. For that matter, "face" is important everywhere. NOBODY likes to admit he has started something he can't finish.

For that reason, this Formosa straits business is as dangerous as an atom bomb. It could explode into a war that could wreck the world.

I hope that in talking to Chiang our people have been very explicit indeed. I hope they have said to him flatly: "If you start ANYTHING on the mainland of China, COUNT US OUT. In that event, we'll be through with you."

We can say with reason that we will protect the Nationalist Chinese in the island sanctuary of Formosa to which they have retired.

But— If we back them in RECONQUERING THE MAINLAND OF CHINA we will be on very, very dangerous ground—much too dangerous ground for us to stand on.

There is something else we must remember:

Chiang has maintained persistently that WHEN COMES THE TIME he will go back to the mainland and throw the communists out. He has been firm in that contention.

He must know by this time that ALONE he can't do it. He must know that in the words of

Crippling Wildcat Walkout
Plagues Automobile Talks

DETROIT (AP)—General Motors, just five days away from a strike deadline, and Chrysler headed back into contract talks with the United Auto Workers today against a backdrop of crippling wildcat walkouts.

GM flatly labeled the walkouts part of a master plan being directed by UAW leaders in Detroit to bring pressure to bear in the contract negotiations.

Chrysler hinted at a similar sentiment, saying the "timing and extent of these walkouts clearly indicates that they are not all spontaneous affairs over local issues."

The union said the strikes grew out of what it called the companies' refusal to negotiate local grievances. It publicly asked its members in GM and Chrysler plants to stay on their jobs.

More than 57,000 workers in plants across the country were idled—32,000 on GM plants, 14,000

Federal Jury
Indicts Pair
For Fraud

WASHINGTON (AP)—A federal grand jury here today indicted Richard A. Mack, former member of the Federal Communications Commission, and Miami lawyer Thurman A. Whiteside on charges of conspiring to defraud the United States.

The indictment, returned after a five-month investigation, alleged that Mack and Whiteside had improper dealings while the FCC was considering a four-way contract for TV channel 10 at Miami.

Whiteside was backing Public Service Television, Inc., National Airlines subsidiary, which won the channel.

Mack resigned from the commission March 3 after a House investigating committee developed that he had accepted financial favors from Whiteside while the channel 10 case was pending.

Mack said he had done no wrong. He and Whiteside both insisted the financial favors were based entirely on a long friendship.

A 48-year old Florida Democrat, Mack was named to the FCC by President Eisenhower in the summer of 1955. The channel 10 case was decided in February 1957.

Under a court order, FCC is currently rehearing the contest to determine whether undue influences figured in the outcome.

Hunter Death

Under Probe

YREKA — Investigation of the circumstances surrounding the death last Monday of Walter Odell Ramsey, 60, of Lemon Grove, California, near Happy Camp, is being continued by the office of Siskiyou County Sheriff Al Cottar.

Two men from the Sacramento Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Identification are assisting the undersheriff in charge of the work at Happy Camp, Sheriff Cottar said today.

George L. Duff, 60, of Tustin, California, Ramsey's hunting companion for the last 10 or 12 years and on this trip, is being returned to Yreka for questioning. Duff went immediately to the police station after he was told by his wife on his return home, that detectives were seeking him. He is expected to arrive in company with a deputy sheriff, either late tonight or early tomorrow, Sheriff Cottar said.

"We want to talk with him," the sheriff said, "and he will be held at least as a material witness."

A complete report from the pathologist at Chico had not been made by Thursday. It is expected that the report will establish the time of death and which of the two bullet wounds in the head caused Ramsey's death. He also had a gunshot wound in his left forearm near the palm. It is difficult to determine, the sheriff commented, with the new type wind shields whether the bullets struck the inside or outside of the glass.

This official assessment was based on present circumstances. Authorities said it could change if any of the factors changed — for example, if Red China went all out to conquer Quemoy without regard to frightful military losses or the danger of touching off a nuclear war.

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Departure Of Americans
Seen By Lebanon Leader

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Rashid Karami, the new pro-Nasser Premier of Lebanon, predicted today American troops would quit this country by the end of October.

Karami told newsmen the question of the withdrawal of the remaining 9,500 Americans was a matter of first importance which would be discussed at his first Cabinet meeting.

"President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles both said the troops would be withdrawn when the Lebanese government requested it or when the situation warranted," Karami said. "Therefore I am certain they will go soon."

Karami, a former rebel leader and an admirer of President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, was named chief of Lebanon's new eight-man Cabinet Wednesday night.

The city remained under a day and night curfew to prevent a new flareup of Wednesday's fighting between extremist elements, in which 19 persons were killed. All shops were closed today and streets deserted except for essential personnel.

Karami takes over the job vacated by Sami Solh, a pro-Western Moslem who was twice the target of assassins during the 4½-month revolt in this half Moslem, half Christian land against the administration of President Camille Chamoun.

Solh is now in Turkey. Chamoun has retired to his summer home at a Christian village near Beirut.

Like Chehab, Karami wants the remaining 9,500 American troops based in Lebanon to get out. He has suggested Oct. 15 for the final withdrawal.

The Phalangists, a Christian organization that backed Chamoun, fired on the crowds. The Moslems quickly mustered a fighting force and returned the fire. In addition to the dead, dozens were wounded.

Chehab, who rarely showed the iron fist as Chamoun's army commander, surprised everyone by quickly sending tanks and troops to train their guns on the opposing forces. Then he ordered a curfew effective until dusk. Antisniper patrols were instructed to shoot down anyone illegally carrying weapons. Quiet was restored in a few hours.

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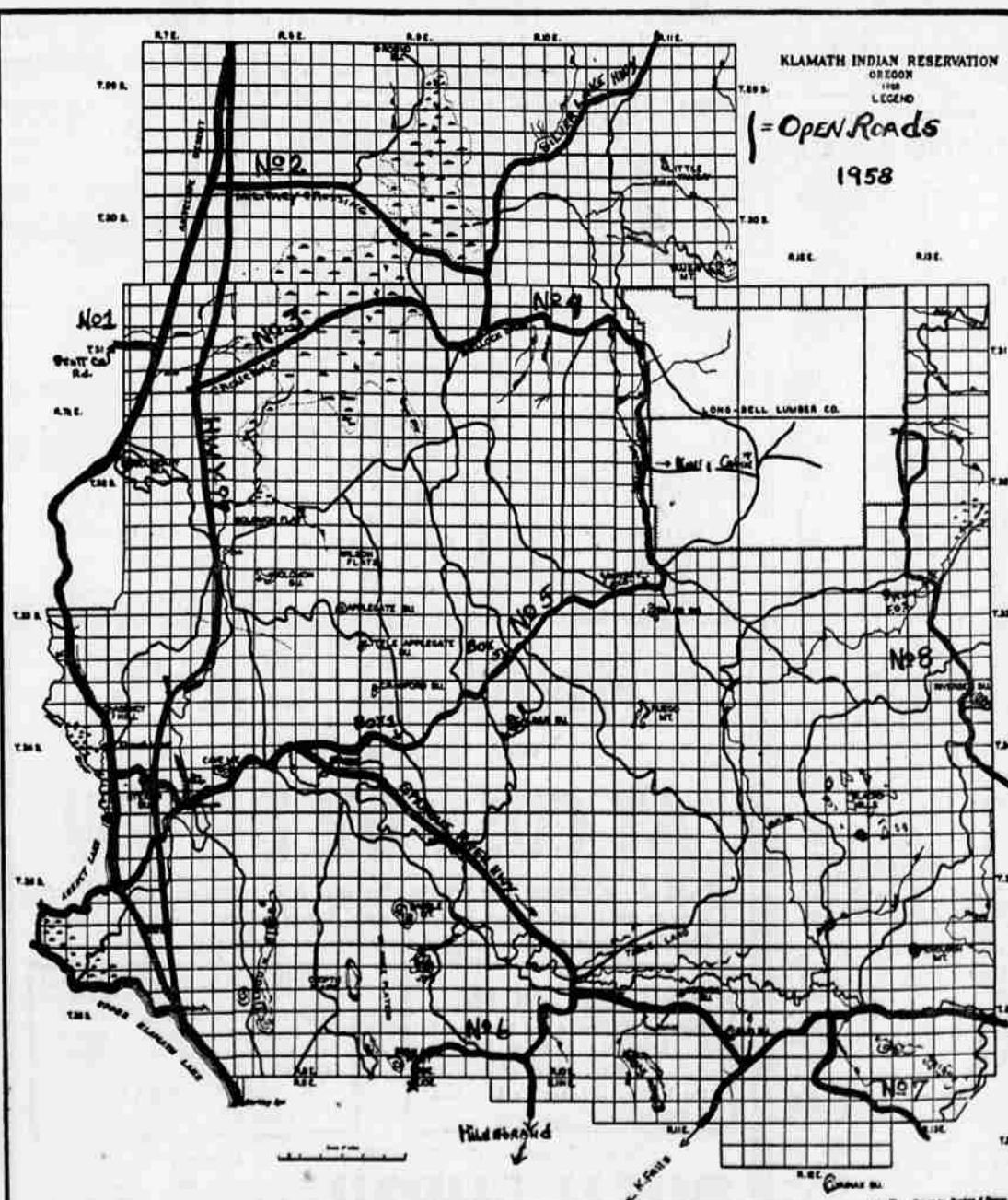

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AF Missile
Belts Target

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force said today its new Bomarc long-range interceptor missile "destroyed" a 1,000-mile-an-hour target flying 75 miles away at a height of 48,000 feet.

Both the Bomarc and the X-10 research rocket used as the target were launched from the Cape Canaveral site Wednesday. However, all firing control of the Bomarc was from a SAGE air defense network center of the Air Force at Kingston, N.Y., 1,500 miles distant.

The Bomarc carried no warhead and the "knockdown" was simulated—recorded by an instrument—with the target flying on for later use.

This was the second known instance of a missile being used successfully against a supersonic target. Previously a Navy Talos antiaircraft missile had been fired successfully against an Army rocket target missile, the Kingfisher.

Artillery Kayoes Many Red Guns

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Nationalist Defense Ministry today claimed artillery fire from Quemoy knocked out 16 Communist guns and six artillery emplacements yesterday.

Nationalist gunners also blew up a mainland ammunition depot, a gasoline store and a radar station, the ministry said.

Communist shelling of the offshore islands started off its 34th day with 1,832 rounds by noon, according to Nationalist count.

The Reds hurled 6,211 shells at the Quemoy yesterday, the ministry said.

Qualified sources in Taipei said the Nationalists were not pressing the United States to assist in Nationalist bombing of the mainland gun positions. The U.S. ban is intended to keep the fighting over the Quemoy from spreading to Formosa, which Washington is pledged to defend.

Fighting between Red China and the United States could lead to a major war.

"We understand fully and sympathetically America's position," said a Nationalist official who declined to be identified.

The Nationalists accused the Communists of trying to force Nationalist jet fighters over the mainland in the hope of shooting one down and claiming it as a raiding Red China.

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Reds Return
Dead Airmen

KARS, Turkey (AP)—The bodies of six U.S. airmen killed in a crash in Soviet Armenia Sept. 2 are back in American hands. The Soviets surrendered them at the Soviet-Turkish border Wednesday.

The fate of 11 other crewmen remained a mystery.

The full story of the final flight of the C-130 turboprop transport and the explosion and fire that destroyed it remained to be told.

The Soviets have protested that the transport "intentionally violated the Soviet border." The U.S. State Department said Soviet MIGs had jumped the plane near this provincial capital, 20 miles inside Turkey, and forced it across the border, though it did not remain a mystery.
