

Citizens Claim Success In Maneuver With Bears

DULUTH, Minn. (AP)—Citizens claimed success today for the latest maneuver in their battle against the bears.

After eluding 15 rifle shots in

three days, a honey-loving bear came to grief yesterday near the home of a beekeeper whose hives had lured the animal into a residential district.

Residents spotted the bear several times and opened fire. They had no luck until somebody decided to string a line of light bulbs from a garage to a field.

Lookouts were posted. When the bear showed up, one of the scouts gave a signal whistle and the lights were turned on. An off-duty policeman felled the animal with his second shot. It weighed 250 pounds.

"The bears have been coming into the Duluth outskirts by the hundreds," said Einar Karlstrand, city editor of the Duluth News-Tribune. "It hasn't been as bad as this since one year right after World War II."

A poor crop of blueberries, usually one of the prehabitation staples of Minnesota's north woods bears, has forced the animals to invade cities and towns in search of food.

Actual encounters between man and bear have been few but violent. Near Mountain Iron, Minn., a wood cutter turned to find a bear standing two feet behind him ready to pounce. He swung his chain saw around and ripped open the bear's belly. Then he fainted from fright.

A hungry bear ripped off the siding of a frame house near Brimmon, Minn., last week. On the other side of the wall slept an 11-year-old girl. Her father grabbed his rifle and stood watch the rest of the night.

A bear was shot on a Duluth golf course and another one was gunned down not far from the downtown section of Ely, Minn.

Farm Prices To Decline

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Agriculture Department report today forecast further declines in farm prices this fall, raising the prospect of lower prices for some foods.

With a record crop in prospect, a seasonal pickup in hog marketings and egg production running above a year ago, prices to farmers are likely to tend down in the next few months, department economists said.

Average prices received by farmers in mid-August were 2 per cent below a year earlier but 5 per cent above the 1958 high point reached in May.

New Sky Ear Weight Told

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—America's newest ear to the sky is dish-shaped and weighs 150 tons.

The ear, a 90-foot radio telescope, was erected at an observatory site yesterday in a desert valley below the High Sierra, 250 miles north of here.

The California Institute of Technology, which will operate the observatory, said the first of two dish-shaped ears will be ready next month. Both will be hooked up and in operation by spring.

Radio telescopes pick up radio waves from stars.

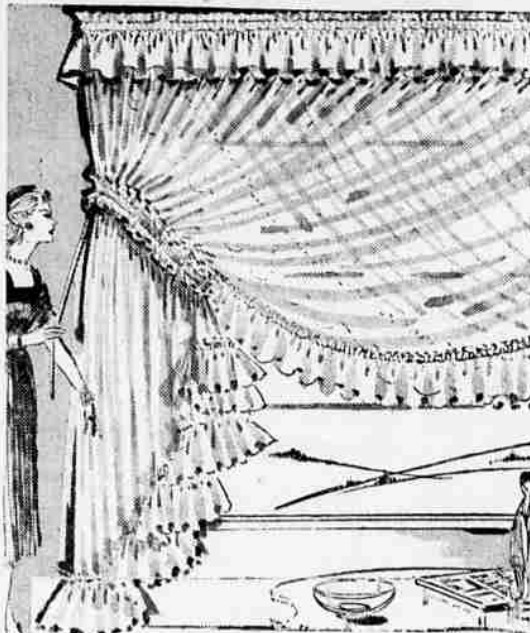

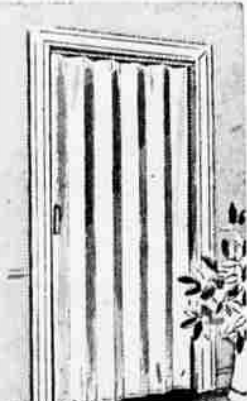
