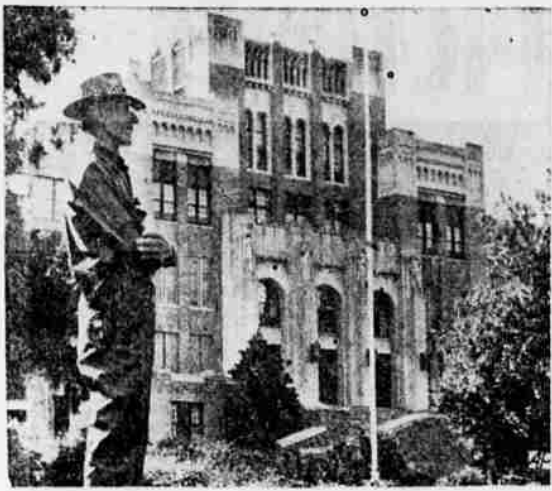

Official Cites Ore Shortage

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The United States cannot now produce enough iron ore to keep the steel industry operating at full capacity for any substantial period, an executive of one of the nation's largest iron ore companies said today.

Herbert C. Jackson, associate managing partner of Pickands Mather & Co. of Cleveland, said foreign iron ore sources must be imported to supplement our domestic production.

Jackson told the American Mining Congress that the steel industry will require 200 million tons of ore a year 10 years from now, a 10 per cent increase over present needs.

Pointing out that the steel industry is demanding a higher grade of ore than in the past, Jackson predicted a continuing expansion in concentrating facilities in the U.S. and Canada.

Sen. Alan Bible (D-Nev.) Wednesday criticized the federal government for its policy towards silver miners. Bible said that the silver miner "not only does not get a subsidy from the government but actually pays a subsidy to the government."

He explained this by saying that the miner is paid 90 cents per ounce for silver, but that the government converts this amount of silver into coins worth \$1.29 an ounce.

Trends and opportunities of town and country churches in the state will be studied at this year's Oregon Town and Country Church Conference, according to an announcement from the conference planning committee.

The conference, to be held on the Oregon State College campus October 14 to 16, will examine the direction town and country churches in the state have been moving the last several years, the committee said. Then, these attending the conference will look ahead to see what opportunities exist for better service to local communities.

Anyone who attends, works in, or is interested in a church that serves rural people is invited to come to the conference, it was pointed out.

Keynote speaker at the 1958 conference will be Dr. Frederick A. Schilling, rector of St. Jude's Episcopal Church, Burbank, California. He is also a lecturer in New Testament at Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley. Dr. Schilling will give three addresses at the conference.

Other program features will include a chart talk on "Trends in Oregon Agriculture" by Dr. Emory Castel and Manning Becker, OSC agricultural economists; and a talk on "Challenges in the Community" by Rev. George A. Murphy, priest at St. Pius the X Church, Klamath Falls.

The annual Church Awards Dinner, sponsored by the Sears, Roebuck foundation, will be held the night of October 15. Dr. Frank B. Bennett, president of Eastern Oregon College, La Grande, will be speaker.

More information about the conference may be obtained from local ministers, or from county extension agents.

The Town and Country Church Conference is sponsored each year by the Oregon Council of Churches, Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, Oregon State College and its extension service, Oregon Farm Bureau, Oregon State Grange, Oregon State Farmers Union, and the Oregon Home Economics Extension Council.

Oregon State College extension service has announced the appointment of Esther A. Taskerud as coordinator of its state program in home economics.

The appointment announced this week by F. L. Ballard, associate director of OSC extension service, is subject to approval by the State Board of Higher Education.

Miss Taskerud fills a vacancy created last month by the resignation of the former Frances Clinton, now Mrs. S. B. Hall of Portland.

The statewide extension education program in home economics extends college teaching and research to both adult and youth groups throughout Oregon. County extension agents help homemakers and 4-H clubs develop local programs and train leaders to take information to others.

Expansion of the home economics program to more young families, and more training for Oregon's 4,200 voluntary 4-H club leaders are objectives of this year's program, Ballard said. More family-centered programs including family finance, housing, gardening, legal assistance, and consumer buying will be offered.

Miss Taskerud has been an OSC staff member since 1947 as an assistant state 4-H club leader and, for the past three years, a district supervisor of extension home economics.

She is a graduate of South Dakota State College and holds a master's degree from Columbia University Teachers College. Before coming to Oregon, she was an assistant state 4-H club leader in Iowa and South Dakota and earlier taught school in South Dakota.

Last spring, Miss Taskerud was awarded the Superior Service citation by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for outstanding contributions to extension education.

Operators, Experts Meet

A group of specialists from Oregon State College met here Monday with some 25 livestock operators to discuss the apparent copper deficiency in forage for cattle in some parts of this area.

The group from Corvallis was headed by Dr. Jack Miller, who came to the college about two weeks ago from Texas A&M. He has assumed the position of head of the recently combined dairy and animal husbandry departments. He was accompanied on the two-day visit by Dr. J. R. Haag, agriculture chemist and Dr. Jesse Bone of the veterinary department of Oregon State College.

The purpose of the visit here was to make blood tests from sheep and cattle and chemical tests of forage. At the group meeting held at the Klamath experiment station, Dr. Miller recommended the addition of one to two per cent of copper sulphate to the salt and bone meal mixtures fed free choice to livestock.

Copper deficiency shows up, Dr. Miller explained, in the lessening of production of hemoglobin in the blood. This often results in poor bone formation caused by the difficulty in assimilating necessary chemicals such as phosphorus.

The problem of copper deficiency appears more frequently, he said, in lakebed soils.

Authorities Deny Scientist's Bid

LONDON (AP)—British authorities have turned down a bid by convicted atom spy Klaus Fuchs to do scientific work outside prison during the last months of his term.

Fuchs was convicted in 1950 of turning over British-American atomic secrets to the Soviet Union. He was sentenced to 14 years in prison but could be freed as early as next July with time off for good conduct.

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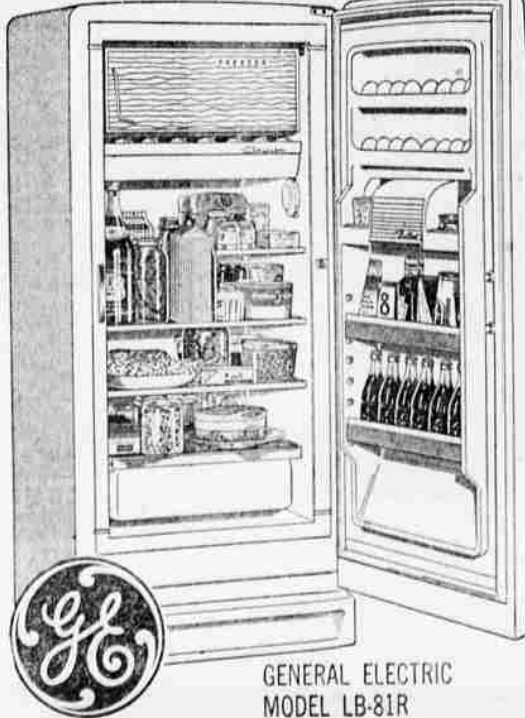
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
