Mrs. Walter Brown, Klamath Falls, new president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, opened her term as president discussing plans for her coming two years in office with an executive committee meeting in the president's suite of the Mallory Hotel in Portland September 22.

The board of directors of the state federation met Tuesday, September 23, at 9:30 a.m. in the Mallory Hotel Italian Room and a no-host luncheon followed at noon.

Mrs. Brown has had an active career as a worker in women's organizations. She has held many offices in the state federation as well as in the Klamath Falls Woman's Library Club, which is a member of the OFWC. She also has been chairman of the Klamath Falls Doernbecher Benefit and it was under her term as president that the Children's Case Benefit Fund was originated by her.

Mrs. Brown is also a poet, and was chairman several times in Klamath Falls for Oregon Poetry Day. Another interest of hers is the Oregon Society of Artists, and as an artist, her paintings have been exhibited in one-man shows. She was chairman of American Art Week in Klamath Falls for several years, and because of this Klamath Falls now has a painting awarded for outstanding Art Week participation.

In May, 1958, Mrs. Brown received an invitation from the White House to serve on President Eisenhower's Regional Committee for Traffic Safety at San Francisco.

She is also a member of Tau Sigma and various fraternal organizations.

"New Approaches to Peace" was taken as Mrs. Brown's theme for the year. She states, "We will continue to carry on the fine projects already instituted by our past presidents. We have selected Greece as the recipient of our Care projects, since our General Federation is emphasizing international affairs."

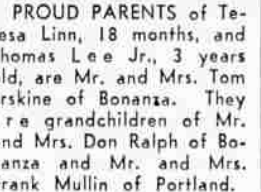
For traveling the bride chose a blue dress with black accessories and a corsage of red rosebuds.
