Alpha Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma held first fall meet at the Pelican Party Room September 1. After luncheon, Augusta Dunbar, music chairman, led in the response and the theme song of the organization. Marguerite Parker, president, called for reports of several committees.

Eva Burkhalter, chairman of the program committee, stressed that the topics for this year would be strictly in accord with the announced theme, emphasizing teacher welfare, advancement of women in the profession, and the promotion of better understanding, generally, of the aims of the society.

More group participation, as well as individual contributions to the programs, will be featured throughout the year with special effort to carry out the ceremonies and rituals in an impressive manner. Gamma Nu of Yreka will be entertained in October.

Beulah Elliott, first vice president for Oregon, Alpha Rho, presented a report on the international convention which she attended in Minneapolis in August. From the legislative angle, she identified statesmen as to their stand on important measures and issues of current interest. Mrs. Green mentioned that many more scholarships were to be given for advanced studies by women teachers in the United States. Mrs. Green was well received by the convention which comprised around 1,300 delegates from the nation. Mrs. Elliott's report was sparked by her personal impressions of the convention and many interesting incidents.

Clara Carlson, chairman of the membership committee, gave a summary of the recent survey made of the status of women teachers in Klamath County. She revealed that the total number of women teachers in the county system is 170. Klamath Falls District No. 1 has 98, while District No. 2, the High School, has only 27. Sacred Heart has 17 women on the faculty and OTH has just two. Total for the area is 314.

Informative sketches regarding the qualifications of candidates for new members were then read. Chosen from this list were Jewel Cambron of Bly, and Leola Thompson of Altamont, whose names will be added to the roll following the initiation ceremonies scheduled for the October meeting with Mary Whiting in charge. Florence Olinian will conduct the impressive ritual for Founders' Day on the same date.

A rummage sale was held in the Pelican Theater Building on September 18, 19 and 20, with Lillian Brandt and Esther Dellier directing the activities. The money from this sale is used in part for the annual scholarship which is presented to a junior or senior girl, majoring in education at some state school. The recipient of last year's award was Carol Larson who is attending Oregon State College.

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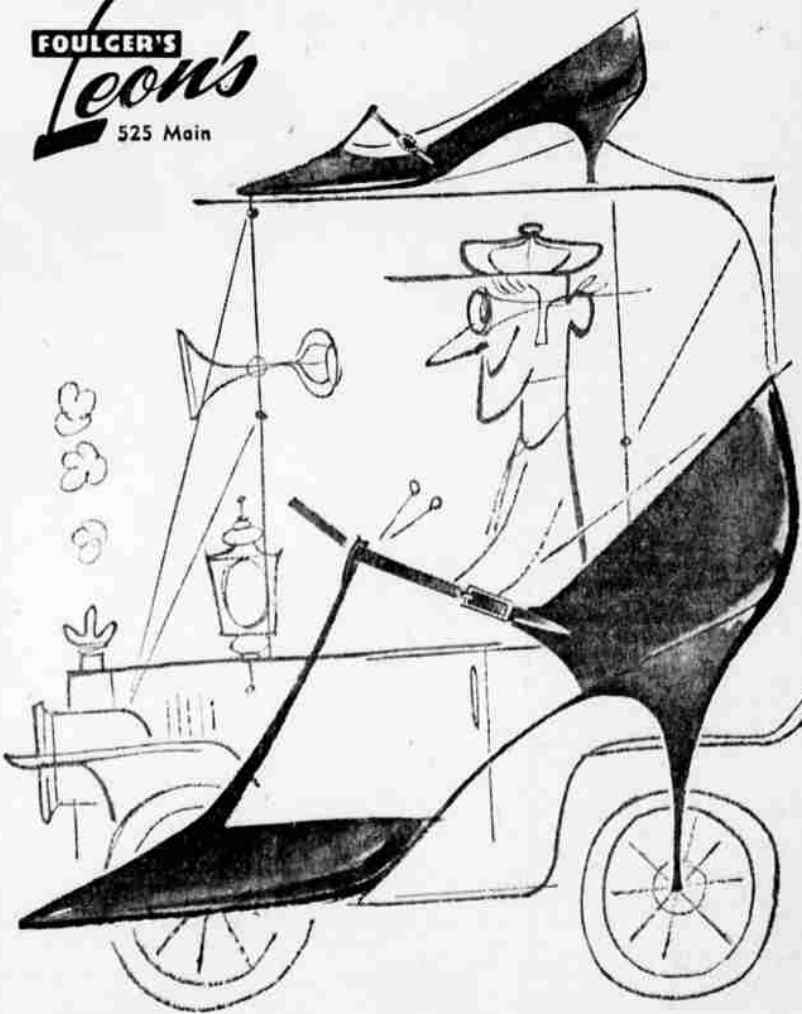
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
