Two Give Nuptial Vows

WEED — Nuptial Mass was read at high noon Saturday, August 30, in the Holy Family Catholic Church at Weed for the wedding of Barbara Jean Ewing and Donald Wayne Shaffer. The Rev. James Vaughan officiated at the double ring ceremonies.

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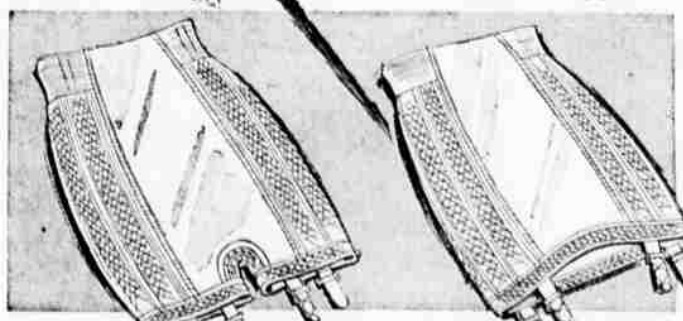
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
