Portland Firm To Build Ship

PORTLAND (AP)—A \$1,100,000 contract for reactivation of two aircraft carriers Friday was awarded to the Willamette Iron and Steel Corp. of Portland.

In making the announcement, the company said the two vessels, the U.S.S. Core and the U.S.S. Breton, will be towed to Portland from Bremerton, Wash.

The wartime crew of each vessel is about 800. Both can carry fighter-bomber squadrons of 21 planes or 90 planes with wings folded.

During the peak of the work some 500 will be working on the contract at the shipyard.
