The 1958 major league baseball season closes today, and the World Series starts Wednesday as baseball takes its last breath of air before bowing out of the sports scene until next spring. It's been a long season, and a good one, but it's the same old story: The New York Yankees against the winner of the National League, Milwaukee.

When people think of the World Series, they think of the Bronx Bombers. The series and Yankee Stadium have been linked together so many times in the last 20 years that sports fans would think they were in the wrong city should the Yanks forget to win the American League pennant some year.

This year's series is a rematch of last year and promises to hold many interesting moments. As in all previous playoffs between the champions of the two major leagues, this is the ultimate in baseball, the best the sport has to offer in a best-of-four playoff.

Oregon State College's fine tackle Ted Bates picked up another all-American honor (pre-season) with the publication of Dell Sports' annual football preview for 1958.

Bates was picked to the first team all-American team by Stanford Woodward, selecting the dream team for Dell Sports. Bates teamed with John Wooten of Colorado as the two first unit tackles. Quarterback Lee Grosscup of Utah was named by Woodward, giving the west three places on the first team.

Uclans Beat Illini, 18-14

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — A 98-yard scoring runback of a pass interception by Phil Parslow, second string halfback, Saturday touched off an 18-14 victory for UCLA over Illinois.

For the second straight year, UCLA spoiled the Illini's football opener with single wing magic conjured by tailback Don Long.

Long's passing and running geared an 84-yard touchdown drive in the third period that came minutes after Parslow's electrifying run. It put the Uclans ahead and sent them to their first victory of the campaign. They were crowned 27-6 by Pitt last week.

Two Long's passes for two points after touchdown failed. Illinois, guided by 150-pound John Easterbrook, a sophomore quarterback, rolled up a 14-6 halftime bulge. Don Grothe's 32-yard run gave the Big Ten team a touchdown in the first quarter and Easterbrook passed for two points and an 8-6 lead.

Long's one yard plunge after a 15 yard pass to Jim Steffin had put UCLA ahead in the opening minutes.

The Illini counted again in the second quarter with the chance coming on Rich Kreitling's recovery of Eugene Gaines' fumble on the UCLA 13. Easterbrook's 10 yard screen pass to L. T. Bonner clicked but his toss for two points failed.

UCLA caught fire on Parslow's run in the third period. After Illinois had moved 70 yards, Bob Hickey's jump pass was deflected into Parslow's hands and he rocketed down the sidelines 98 yards.

OSC Stubbornness Pays Off In Victory

PORTLAND (AP) — Kansas stopped Oregon State on the goal line four times but in the end, its stubbornness yielded to State's ground power in a 12-0 intercollegiate football game Saturday night.

It was the first win for Oregon State and the second straight loss for Kansas.

The Staters spent almost the entire game in Kansas territory eating up big yardage until they got to the Kansas 10. There, the Jayhawks stiffened and only twice was the West Coast team able to punch across the goal line.

The first touchdown came in the first quarter. Kansas gave ground grudgingly and it took the Staters 12 plays to move 55 yards to the score, which halfback Grimm Mason tallied on a three-yard end run.

By that time Kansas had already stopped one Oregon State drive on the Kansas four. Before the half ended, Kansas stopped a 76 and then a 33-yard march on the goal line.

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Defenders Outclass Game Ore-Techmen

Oregon Tech's 1958 home football season opened before a good sized crowd and a pro-style opponent at Modoc Field Saturday night as the Owls bowed to powerful Hamilton Air Base, 34-0.

The game, but badly outclassed Owls were battling for their first score of the night even after the final horn had sounded, but to no avail. Hamilton's pro and all-American studded club was just too big, too experienced and too much to handle. Yet the large crowd went home satisfied they had seen a good game — regardless of the final outcome on the scoreboard.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls from the Mile High Campus came out of the non-counting scrap without a serious injury and should be in good physical shape for their Oregon Collegiate Conference opener next Saturday night at Modoc Field when they take on the Portland State College Vikings. Several Tech gridders were shaken up and received bumps and bruises, but Hunsaker said after the game there was nothing that looked serious.

Hamilton's bruising attack, led by a mammoth line and several 200-pound backs who ran like a band of wild horses, proved too much to handle for the smaller Owls, yet OTI managed to hold off several defender threats including two inside the Tech 20-yard line.

The Defenders won the opening loss and on the first offensive drive went 80 yards in 10 plays for the first score. Jim Small, a 5-11, 190-pound speedster, raced the final 45 yards as he ripped through a hole off right guard and tackle, Lou Baldacci, the ex-Michigan all-American and Pittsburg Steeler

halfback of last year, kicked the extra point and Hamilton led 7-0 with 10:05 left in the first quarter.

Vic Eaton, former Missouri quarterback, tossed a pass to end Norm Collingsworth who traveled 75 yards to the Oregon Tech eight-yard line to set up the next Hamilton score. From the eight, Jim Craig cracked over for the touchdown on the next play and Hamilton's toe accounted for another extra point with 6:20 left.

In less than five minutes of the second quarter, Hamilton zoomed into a 20-0 lead. The third defender score came on a 23-yard draw play ramble by Eric Kuykendall, a 225-pound fullback, who found a hole up the center of the Tech line. Baldacci's PAT attempt failed.

Oregon Tech's defense stiffed in the remaining 10 minutes of the second quarter and Hamilton was forced to be satisfied with only a few yards here and there. In fact, the rugged Defenders were held scoreless until only 30 minutes were left in the third quarter. After Kuykendall's TD romp, Tech managed to hold Hamilton scoreless for more than 26 minutes of action.

Eaton tossed the only scoring pass of the night when he scored former UCLA all-American end Bob Heydenfeldt in the end zone for a 13-yard touchdown aerial. Baldacci booted the extra point to give Hamilton a 27-0 lead at the close of the third period.

The final score of the night came with 8:50 left in the game. Jack Shoes (\$6.40) nosed out Hildagar in the feature at Bay Meadows.

of the 1956 Green Bay Packer backfield, picked off one of Charlie Gantner's passes to set up the Hamilton TD. Losch intercepted the ball on the 12 and returned to the 35 where he handed off to Baldacci who raced down the sidelines to Tech's 41, a return of 47 yards. Four plays later, Kuykendall broke through right tackle for five yards and a score. Baldacci again kicked the point after.

OTI threatened to pick up their first score of the night in the closing minutes of play. Gantner threw a pass intended for Charlie Wilson that fell incomplete just before the horn sounded, and the officials gave Tech one more play since the clock should have been stopped with the incompleteness. With the ball resting on the 41, Gantner fadded to throw a desperation pass, then behind some good downfield blocking ran to the 16 before being pulled down, just 16 yards and one Hamilton tackler away from pay dirt.
