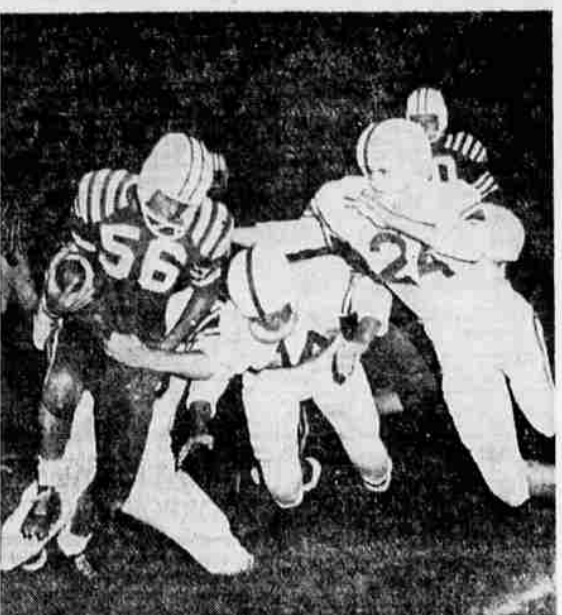

Redding Bounces Pelicans

Shasta Turf Attack Hands KU 33-6 Loss

A grimly determined squad of Redding Shasta Wolves spearheaded by a pair of backs that literally chewed great chunks of yardage through the Klamath Union defenses, dealt the Pelicans a 33-6 trimming on Modoc Field Friday night to hand the KU gridgers their second loss in three starts in the 1958 football season.

"Tonight's game was a complete reversal of last week's victory — the Wolves wanted to win more than we did, evidently," observed Klamath Union head coach Andy Knudsen in the sober atmosphere of the Pel dressing room following the Wolves' smashing win. We were a half a count behind them all the way — and we could never catch up."

"Our boys played a great game — the only shadow is the fact that Snow (Gary Snow, a 139 pound halfback) injured his arm badly. He may be out for a number of games — outside of that we are very happy," calmly stated Wolf pack member Steve Stevens as his squad prepared for the victory ride back home.

The Pels fell before a blistering ground attack that saw the Wolves rack up 331 yards in 45 carries and suffer only one four yard loss throughout the test. The KU squad picked up 82 net yards on the turf and added 114 via the airwaves as quarterback Blake Griggs completed 8 of 17 attempted airds. Wolf quarterback Mike Anthony was successful on five of six passes for a total of 86 yards.

The standout performer on the Shasta team was a 170 pound halfback, Dean Gordon, who played his first game in two years having been a JV as a sophomore, then dropping out of football entirely during his junior year. He returned to duty purely as a filler for starting half, Chuck Schater, who is sidelined for the season with an ankle injury.

Gordon, in 17 carries, cracked the Pels for a total of 162 yards, carrying from one to three defenders each time.

Fullback Butch Croto, 170, added to an already amazing total of yardage gained in his first two games, piling up 102 yards in 13 trips through a Pelican line that was ripped to shreds time after time. Croto blasted off left tackle and hurdled a pair of would-be tacklers to notch the longest run of the game, a 45 yard sprint to paydirt for the Wolves third TD. His teammate, Gordon, was responsible for two Shasta touchdowns as he scampered 28 yards for the Wolves' first tally and went 20 for another in the last stanza. Croto also accounted for two of the three conversions. Gary Boyse hauled in one of Anthony's passes for 40 yards and one more of the Shasta six-pointers while reserivist Dick Neitz powered the last one in from the three.

The Pelicans seemingly took control of the situation early in the first quarter, grabbing off five of their first 10 downs, four through the air and one on the ground, only to see a pair of 15-yard clipping penalties stall their drives.

Pel scoring hopes were dashed in the first frame after an interchange of punts saw the Wolves take over on the 30 and in two plays spring Gordon into the end zone.

The KU gridgers, sparked by an excellent showing by halfback Ron Olvera, the Pel's leading ground-gainer, bounced right back as Blake Griggs, who was deadly during the first half with his passing, collaborated with Olvera and Gary Kranenburg to move to within the Wolves' 10 yard stripe. Pel hopes again crumbled as a loss intended for Kranenburg in the end zone was intercepted by the ever-present Croto for a touchdown.

From here on it was all Shasta until in the final period the Pelicans started a march from their own 43 and went all the way in seven plays, John Hancock plunging over from the one for their only entry into the scoring column. Hancock was unable to get his conversion attempt through the uprights.

In the closing seconds of the game the Whitebirds took advantage of a Shasta fumble and moved to the one but were unable to punch it over before the final gun.

Malin Whips Trojans In 5B Gridiron Play

Coach George Hanson's powerful Malin Mustangs scored three touchdowns in the second half to break open a comparably close contest last Friday night at Gem Stadium as they defeated the Sacred Heart Trojans, 26-6 in a District 5B football game.

The Mustangs were led by Rick Iliian, the 6 foot, 180 pound end who snagged two touchdowns passes by quarterback Randy Miller.

Both teams battled on even terms the first half, with the Trojans controlling the ball most of time with Malin leading 7-0 at intermission. Late in the first period, SH put on a drive which carried from their own 31-yard line to Malin's seven yard line. Halfback Tam Amberg and fullback Allan Thill divided the ball — carrying chores during the drive but it was stalled on the seven as the big Malin forward wall tightened up and a fourth down pass from end Bob Andersch to end Mike Brumbe fell incomplete.

Malin came roaring back early in the third quarter as they recovered a fumble on the Trojans' 31-yard line. On the first play, fullback Ron Mullanix carried around right end to score. Iliian's kick hit the crossbar and Malin led, 13-0.

Late in the third stanza, reserve fullback Harvey Milligan intercepted a Trojan pass on the 50-yard line. Five plays later Petrasek tallied from 13 yards out but an offside penalty nullified the fine fun. On the next play, Miller hit Iliian, who had sneaked behind the SH defense, with a perfect strike. Iliian's kick was no good and the third quarter ended a minute later with the score favoring Malin, 19-0.

Halfback Abe Kirkpatrick intercepted a Trojan pass on the first play of the last period and six plays and 50 yards later Malin had another touchdown. Once again it was Iliian, as he took a Miller-pass and literally ran over the top of diminutive Johnny Jackson for 13 yards. Iliian's kick hit the crossbar at 26-0.

Trojan coach Jerry Kempf, his crew put on a 66-yard drive as they scored their only touchdown of the night in the last period. Highlighting the drive was a 38-yard end run by Amberg. Thill capped the scoring drive as he spun into the end zone from four yards out. The Malin forward wall smothered Amberg as the point-after-touchdown run was no good.

Malin had 272 total yards and 11 first downs to Sacred Heart's 129 total yards and 5 first downs.

Ashburn Snares Bat Lead

Willie Mays couldn't do anything but hit against St. Louis pitching last weekend as he took the National League batting lead from Riche Ashburn, who couldn't do a thing against Pittsburgh.

Now Ashburn's back on top, after clipping the Pirates for a 2-for-4 performance Friday night while Mays went hitless against the Cardinals.

Ashburn scored the winning run as Philadelphia defeated 22-game winner Bob Friend 3-2 and gained a point for a .349 average. Mays grounded out, flied out and hit into a doubleplay, losing two points for a .341 average, as San Francisco beat St. Louis 4-3.

While the batting race continued to run hot, Lew Burdette became a 20-game winner for the first time in his final tuneup for the world series, as the champion Milwaukee Braves beat Cincinnati 2-1.

Los Angeles and the Chicago Cubs remained tied for sixth, splitting a two-night pair in the other NL games. The Dodgers won 6-3 then lost 2-1.

In the American League, Boston's Ted Williams and Pete Runnels tied for the batting lead for .326 as the Red Sox swept a two-night pair at Washington 6-4 and 3-1. Baltimore beat the champion New York Yankees 3-2 in 12 innings. The Chicago White Sox beat Kansas City 1-0 and Cleveland defeated Detroit 5-4.

Phils 3, Bucs 2

Ashburn's single triggered a two-run sixth that cracked a shut-out duel between Friend (22-14) and Robin Roberts (17-14). His double came in the seventh, followed by Bobby Young's single. Roberts had a shutout until the ninth in his battle with Friend, who had won six straight.

SF 4, Cards 3

Rookie southpaw Bill Smith (0-1) and right-handed reliever Jim Brosnan collared Mays. Johnny Antonelli (16-13) needed relief help. But the Giants nailed third with the victory.

Braves 2, Reds 1

Burdette gave up nine hits, but the Braves shrugged off a four-hit job by Redleg rookie Jim O'Toole and veteran Hal Jeffcoat.

LA 6-1, Cubs 3-2

Al Dark's ninth-inning single won the nightcap for Cub rookie John Bushardt (3-0). The Cubs got their first run on a wild pitch by Sandy Koufax (11-11)—giving the Dodger staff a major league record for wild pitches with 68. John Roseboro drove in three runs with a triple and two singles in the opener as Don Drysdale (12-13) won with relief help. Bob Anderson (3-3) lost it.

BoSox Win Two

Williams walloped his 24th home run and a single in three at bats in the opener. Runnels, holding a .324 to .320 edge before he went hitless in the first game, was 2-for-5 in the nightcap.

Ted Lepcio's home run won the opener for Ike Delock (14-8) after Roy Sievers' 39th homer gave the Nats a tie. Frank Sullivan (13-9), backed by Bill Henna's home run, won the nightcap. Vito Valentini (5-6) and Bill Fischer (4-10) were the losers as the Senators dropped their 11th in a row.

Birds 3, NY 2

Hoyt Wilhelm, the knuckleballer who no-hit the Yankees last weekend, gave up six hits and left with a 1-1 after eight innings at New York. Reliever Billy Lozer (3-9) won his first since July 3 as the Orioles tagged Virgil Trucks (2-2) for two of their four hits and two runs in the 12th.

Chi 1, KC 0

Latman (3-0), a 22-year-old right-hander, gave up nothing but singles, two by Hec Loper, while walking two and striking out nine for his first complete game. A sacrifice fly by White Sox rookie John Callison beat Bob Grim (7-7) in the sixth.

Columbia Keeps Yacht Cup In US

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — America's Cup will stay in its glass case in a room above the bar of the New York Yacht Club.

Any faint hopes that it would go to Great Britain sank Friday in the bubbling wake of the United States' Cup defender, Columbia.

The powerhouse American 12-meter yacht clinched the cup with her fourth straight victory over the British challenger, Sceptre.

which sailed almost half the race with a crippled rig.

Her thick aluminum alloy boom had snapped in two in a freak accident when a spinnaker sheet got caught under it.

The British said the things they have been saying since 1851 after seventeen fruitless tries to wrench the cup free from America.

"I quite frankly don't think we shall ever give up trying for the cup," said Hugh Goodson, a member of the syndicate that owns Sceptre.

Sceptre's designer, David Boyd Sr., a quiet Scotsman, had little comment on Sceptre's design, his first for a 12-meter yacht. But if he were going to build another 12, Boyd said "I think I'd ask Olin Stephens to let me look at the lines of Columbia." Stephens designed Columbia.

Briggs Cunningham, Columbia's skipper, his shaggy hair still damp from the salt spray, said he was "terribly disappointed" Sceptre did not go any faster. It's a let down, an anticlimax," said the millionaire sportsman who has spent all summer racing Columbia in elimination trials.

Cunningham and his crew was host Saturday for the British sailors at Beachwood, the rocklike mansion he rented for Columbia's men this summer. It will be about as close as the two crews have been to each other in a week of racing.

Friday's concluding race was cut from the same pattern as the others. Sailed in a 16-20 mile an hour southwesterly wind, it saw Columbia outpoint and out sail Sceptre both into and away from the wind.

And what with all her other troubles, Sceptre was stricken with an almost impossible chain of catastrophes. First a Genoa sheet caught and had to be cut away.

Then the boom broke. "We thought the broken ends might kill someone," said Sceptre's assistant helmsman, Colin Ratsey.

The series, the first since 1937, was the fourteenth shutout by American yachts. In 54 races, the challengers have won only five times.

Miami couldn't do much against the towering Wisconsin line. Dale Hackbart was the big man for 14-ranked Wisconsin. He passed and ran for one touchdown in the first quarter and repeated at the end of the second stanza.
