Sooners, Army Show Football's New Look

The two-point conversion rule isn't the only "new look" in college football this season. Oklahoma and Army, two perennial powers that heretofore featured well-executed but conventional attacks, both introduced new spread formations in bowling over their opening opponents last Saturday.

The Sooners used split ends, flankers, laterals and long passes in walloping West Virginia, 47-14, while the Cadets rolled to a 45-8 victory over South Carolina with a razzle-dazzle offense that included an unbalanced line with the strong-side end flanked 15 yards out.

Oklahoma's new attack completely baffled West Virginia. The Sooners out-rushed the Mountaineers, 223 yards to 120, and out-passed them, 247-50. Three of Oklahoma's touchdowns came on passes, including a spectacular aerial from Bobby Boyd to Walter McDaniel that covered 88 yards.

For a team that failed to complete a pass against Navy two years ago, Army went wild through the air in its opener. Pete Dawkins scored four of the Cadets' seven touchdowns, two on aerials, while All-American lin Anderson pitched a pair of scoring passes.

While Oklahoma and Army had it easy, Ohio State and Notre Dame stumbled slightly coming out of the gate. The Buckeyes pulled out all the stops in turning back Southern Methodist, 23-20, while the Irish, 24-point favorites, had to settle for an 18-0 triumph over stubhorn Indiana.

Don Meredith, SMU's passing wizard, gave Ohio State a scare by completing 19 of 28 aerials for 213 yards and one touchdown. The Buckeyes actually gained their winning margin on a pair of conversion passes by Frank Kern blas.

Chicago Bears Win NFL Opener

George ("Poppa Bear") Halas, one of professional football's founding fathers and its chief innovator, has made a successful return to the coaching ranks after a two-year absence.

Halas decided to forego coaching in 1956, handing the reins of his Chicago Bears to Paddy Driscoll and contenting himself with his front-office duties as owner. The Bears won a division title that year but last year they had a dismal season, finishing fifth in the Western Division with a 5-7 record. Poppa Bear quickly decided to come out of his semi-retirement.

Taking an outstanding batch of players like Willie Galimore, an unknown picked off the campus of little Florida A&M; quarterback Ed Brown; brilliant end Harlon Hill, and a sturdy forward wall, Halas had mixed well and apparently has a winner.

In three games, Frank Gifford scored three times as New York trounced Chicago's Cardinals 37-7. Cleveland overcame Los Angeles 20-7 on Lou Groza's field goal with 25 seconds left; Baltimore up-ended defending champion Detroit 28-15; Washington beat Philadel-

Ashburn, Williams Cop Titles

Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox and Richie Ashburn of the Philadelphia Phillies emerged with the major league batting titles in down-to-the-wire finishes.

When the last ball had been thrown and the final bat swung Sunday, Williams was atop the American League batting list for the sixth time and Ashburn looked down on the other National League hitters for the second year.

Williams, who at 40 is the oldest player ever to win a major league batting title, finished with a .328 average—a far cry from his high mark of .406 in 1941 and even his .388 of last year.

Ashburn, 31, carried off the National League laurels with a .350 percentage. He previously had won in 1955 with .336.

Neither backed into the championship.
Ted had two hits in four times at bat against Washington while teammate Pete Runnels went hitless and dropped back to .322.
Ashburn had three hits in four at bats against Pittsburgh and he needed every one of them as San Francisco's Willie Mays pounced out three in five tries. The Giants' centerfielder wound up at .347.

Victories by Williams and Ashburn climaxed a red-hot final week by each.
While the interest of the final weeks was centered in the batting races, Mickey Mantle of New York regained the American League's home run crown. He edged Cleveland's Rocky Colavito 42-41. Jackie Jensen was the circuit's RBI leader with 122.

Ernie Banks, Chicago Cubs' shortstop, won the National League home run crown with 47 and topped the circuit in runs batted in with 129.
