The Loquacious Portable

Editor's Note — This is one of a series of letters written by Waltraud (Dietsche) Eriksdun, formerly of Klamath Falls, and now in Germany.

When the World's Fair closes in Brussels October 17, there will have been 35 million visitors. We saw women in saris, Germans, priests, U.S. generals, Spaniards, invalids, Japanese, and the Belgian housewives who go every day. We also saw our own inimitable globe-trotting American clubwomen. They were in the Russian pavilion, near a model of Sputnik, taking notes and firing questions at poker-faced young employees of the USSR.
For the three-day roundtrip from Essen, Germany, we took only my typewriter case. We found an old fashioned, high-ceilinged double room with running hot water. The cost five dollars a night, including breakfasts, and was not inflated as a competitor with identical \$20 accommodations had prophesied.
A day was spent at the Biennial

Reds Draft Many Families Into 'Peoples Communes'

TOKYO (AP) — More than 46 million Chinese peasant families have been drafted into people's communes since Red China launched its latest communization project in June, Radio Peiping reports.
Peiping said seven million women have been "freed from household tasks" and put to work for the state in the new drive. They toil now in such fields as community restaurants, nurseries and kindergartens.

The communes—large, self-sufficient communities of villages and former cooperative farms embracing up to 50,000 persons each—have been set up with frantic haste in an effort to wield something more effective than the old cooperative system.
The movement is one of the most important steps since the Communists took over China eight years ago. Recent visitors to the mainland say the program is effective and is proceeding quickly.

The families already enrolled represent 57 per cent of the peasant population, Peiping said.
"People's communes... are considered to be a good form of basic organization of society to accelerate Socialist construction and the transposition to communism."

There is a rumor that World's Fair prizes, October 1, will go to Czechoslovakia, Belgium, Great Britain, the United States and Germany, in that order. Of these we saw only the American pavilion, where, in a spread of the New

York Times behind glass, we discovered a critique of Eriksdun.
Thus human endurance had been tested, but technical and artistic displays remained unexplored when threatening skies ended our dizzy hike. Greatly we boarded one of those open Walt Disney trains for an exit.
In a Brussels cafe, German fellow passengers, loaded down with luggage, coats and remembrances, were waiting for the bus. These travel-tolder fanatics had harvested richly of philosophy and fact. There were gleanings for the grasshoppers.
We learned that, had we known it, we could have marveled at Swiss precision, could have admired the Old Testament austerity of struggling Israel, could have delighted in Philippine pina cloths and sea-shell dishes, could have entered those shrouded Arab sanctuaries of mosaic and filigree.
"Every country expressed its ideals," the spokesman said. "Ours of West Germany is the industrial miracle."
"We had enough slogan-making

in the immediate past," a second man said. "Now we want to live well. They can make the slogans behind the Iron Curtain."
"It is true that the Russians plastered their mammoth pavilion with the opiates they decry—slogans and emblems of hero cult," the spokesman said. "But the fine Czechoslovakian and Yugoslavian pavilions, and those of other Iron Curtain countries as well, showed that in sentiment their people belong to the West."
"The Russians themselves seem to waver," a woman said. "They play Beethoven symphonies and display Western fashions, but their photographs idealize primitive peasant types."
"The Russians are primitive," a third man said. "That's why their war wounds healed more quickly than ours. Their women have a natural grace our women have lost. I will never forget an evening in the Occupied Ukraine when a group of girls returned from the fields, swinging their pitchforks and singing a Russian song."
"To a soldier anybody looks



good," the second man quipped.
"I liked those American mannequins with that certain American something," a young man said.
"I can't understand why they showed such cheap clothes," Lady Thoroughbred complained. "Dresses for only \$7."
"They showed clothes everyone can afford," the spokesman countered, "and that is the ideal of democracy. They showed casual clothes—the ideal of freedom. The American, an rotunda, accessible from all sides, with its landscaped courtyard, open to the sky, was an architectural symbol of freedom and democracy."
Our cafe, too, looked out on the sky. Suddenly its open front darkened. Then, to senses blinded by a glittering fair and the new modernity of North Germany, was of-
