Injuries Slow Major Grid Power Threat

One of the three great equalizers in college football—the injury—is making the experts take a long look at Saturday's games.

Incentive and mud—the other two—are always a hazard in picking the winners, but the return or loss of key players in mid-week makes things more interesting.

That could be the case at Dartmouth Saturday where Penn, a 42-0 loser last week to Penn State, must face the Indians without Fred Dolling, their right halfback who twisted an ankle. Dolling led the Quakers' ground offense last year with 511 yards. Penn's center John Marchiano is also out.

Dartmouth, already a 12 point early favorite, lost tackle Bill Pettway, perhaps for the season, with a knee injury in the Lafayette game.

Illinois, a three point favorite, goes out of the Big Ten to Durham, N.C., for a battle against the Atlantic Coast Conference's Duke and will have to get along with only limited service, at least, from captain and fullback Jack DeLoach. He pulled a leg muscle against UCLA while quarterback Bob Hickey has a sprained ankle that caused Coach Ray Elliot to move sophomore John Esterbrook to No. 1 quarterback.

Purdue, worried enough with Rice's powerful offense, will probably be without first string quarterback Bob Spoo, out with bruised ribs suffered against Nebraska. The Boilermakers are 7 points favorite against the Owls.

Pitt has been listed an early 6 1/2 point favorite over Minnesota's Gophers. But the Panthers still don't know the status of quarterbacks Bill Kaliden, who has a bruised instep, Ivan Tonicin, a pulled rib muscle, and halfback Bill Haley, a sprained ankle.

Ohio State will be the favorite over the Washington Huskies Saturday, but the absence of Buckeye quarterback Frank Kremblas could take its toll. Kremblas' passing gave Woody Hayes' boys a sudden shift from his ground offense in their 23-20 Southern Methodist victory.

Any hopes Indiana, a six point underdog, had of catching West Virginia, still down after its 47-14 blasting by Oklahoma, were dimmed with the return of Mountaineer quarterback Dick Longfellow.

Though he played his first game, Michigan fullback John Herrstein, an injury victim most of 1957, is still the key for the Wolverines against Michigan State. The Spartans are 13 point favorites, but Herrstein is looked on as the possible equalizer.

He duped his entire 1957 output with 144 yards gained against Southern California last week, scoring two touchdowns.

Tony Kubek Seeking 'Comeback' In Series

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—An experienced shortstop won't make the same mistakes that a rookie utility man made a year ago, so the New York Yankees' Tony Kubek, a Milwaukee ace, anticipated a World Series "comeback" today.

Kubek was the "goat" of the 1957 series, winning the role on a third inning wild throw of a potential double-play ball which put Milwaukee Braves runners on first and second base with one out. Both scored, the first runs of an eventual 5-0 Milwaukee win in the seventh game for the Series victory.

"More experience would have helped me," Kubek said. "I thought those runners were slower than they were, and I threw too fast. This year I'm not so apt to do that."

HOMERS IN DEBUT

"It's helped me to play the same position all season, too, and it's the same one I'm playing today."

Kubek, who last year played left field, center field and third base for the Yankees in the seven game series, made a brilliant debut in his first appearance before his home town friends in County Stadium, hitting two home runs and driving in four runs in a 12-3 Yankee win.

In his second show in Milwaukee he collected two hits in five times at bat. But after apparently winning the hero's role with this performance, he lost the honor in the seventh game.

"I FELT PRETTY LOW" "I felt pretty low after it was all over last year, I'll tell you," Kubek said. "It was quite a comedown. People were nice about it, but it's hard to wipe it out of your mind."

Kubek has been home only once, for a brief visit, since the Yankees hit town Monday. Last year he paid a brief call too, and intended to live at home, but his arrival brought about so much neighborhood excitement, he returned to the Yankee camp at Brown's Lake, a suburban resort.

This year he will remain at the resort, returning home only after the Series has ended—and he hopes as a hero. He goes into Army reserves for six months Oct. 16.

Smith Nabs AP Lineman Week Honor

It's World Series time and also the time of year to start picking the Lineman of the Week.

Tennessee failed to make a first down against Auburn last Saturday. For his part in helping to bring this about Zeke Smith, Auburn guard, today was named the first Lineman of the Week for the 1958 football season.

The 210-pound junior topped such other linemen as Bill Kerr, Indiana guard, and Ron Luciano, Syracuse tackle, in The Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters.

Smith, who stands 6-2, was graded 98 per cent on defensive efficiency. He broke through and spilled Tennessee runners time and again as Auburn won 13-0. He was rated near the top on offense, too.

Other Auburn linemen, center Jackie Burkett, tackle Jim Jeffrey and end Jerry Wilson, also received praise.

Kerr, a sophomore, was named an "unsung hero" for his play for Indiana against Notre Dame in the Chicago Football Writers Assn. Notre Dame won 18-0 but Kerr's inspired performance held the Irish to a mere 6-0 lead until the closing minutes.

Luciano provided the key play as Syracuse came from behind to beat Boston College 24-14. With BC ahead 14-12 in the last quarter Luciano threw John Amabile, Eagle quarterback, so hard he fumbled. Luciano recovered the loose ball on the BC 25. A few plays later Syracuse scored the winning TD.

Hoople Back, Picks Upsets In Grid Play

Boise, Idaho (AP)—Hundreds of chinook salmon migrating through the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake River will die before reaching their spawning grounds, an Idaho fish authority said Tuesday.

Ross Leonard, state Fish and Dam Department director, said he expects the loss to be considerable despite efforts to transport the fish around Brownlee and Oxbow dams.

A concrete and steel fish trap installed by Idaho Power Co., builder of the two dams, was damaged and a temporary wooden trap is being used to aid the fish.

However, Leonard said turbulent water below Oxbow has made it difficult to steer the fish into the temporary trap. Many of the fish will become exhausted, give up and drift back downstream, he predicted.

Leonard said about 3,400 fish, including 200 steelhead, have been transported around the dams by tank truck but some have died during the journey.

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Sky Leaflets Report OSC Due For Defeat

Word has come out of the sky at Corvallis that Oregon State is going to get whipped by UCLA in their football game Saturday.

The prophecy fluttered to earth in leaflet form from an airplane that flew over the Oregon State campus Tuesday. Since UCLA is more than 1,000 miles away, the propaganda war hardly seemed the work of Bruin supporters. Oregon State students speculated it was much more likely the doing of their arch rivals from the University of Oregon.

OSC coach Tommy Prothro didn't drop any leaflets but he gave the Bruins almost the same billing. He told a booster group UCLA probably is "the best football team on the coast in the last three or four years."

At Eugene, meanwhile, Oregon had a few worries of its own. Its opponent Saturday will be Oklahoma, rated No. 1 in the nation in this week's Associated Press poll.

The Webfoots fortunately have all their players in top shape. They ran through a 10-minute scrimmage Tuesday. Later the ends and backs concentrated on pass defense.

At Pullman, Washington State coach Jim Sutherland said he'll

have some new faces in the lineup when the Cougars play California Saturday. He didn't say what the changes will be, but he had senior Dave Wilson working at quarterback in place of the famed Bobby Newman in a three-hour drill. Other new men in the first-team lineup were halfback Keith Lincoln and fullback Chuck Morrill.

California, troubled by injuries since the start of the practice season, reported two more casualties. First-string right guard Charles Johnson and second-team left tackle Doug Furita were benched because of knee strains.

At Seattle, Washington team doctors said halfback Carver Gayton and fullback Sam Hurworth should be able to play Saturday when the Huskies meet Ohio State at Columbus. Gayton has a leg infection and Hurworth a sprained ankle.

Stanford, beaten 49-6 by Washington State, goes Saturday against Northwestern, a team that beat the Cougars. This indicates the Indians have some work to do, and they did 90 minutes of it Tuesday in a tough scrimmage.

Senior quarterback Bob Nicolet worked out with the Indians for the first time in a week. But he is not expected to be sufficiently recovered from his injuries to play at Evanston Saturday.

The Southern California Trojans learned that two of their reserve linemen will be unable to play Friday night when USC meets North Carolina at the Coliseum. Ron Mix, No. 2 right tackle, is still recovering from pneumonia. And Dick Bronson, No. 3 man at the same position, is out with injuries. Guard Walt Gurasich has moved over to help first-string right tackle Monte Clark.

UCLA drilled two hours against Oregon State offensive and defensive setups, but did no heavy work.

London Tops Will Pastrano

LONDON (AP)—Strange things are happening to American heavyweight contenders on this side of the Atlantic.

Europe's big boys no longer hasten to horizontal positions at the sight of an American left hook.

Willie Pastrano is the latest Yankee to trip on his rating.

The third-ranked contender from Miami Beach, Fla., lost on a fifth round technical knockout, because of a cut over his left eye, to British heavyweight champion Brian London Tuesday night.

Only last Sept. 14, Eddie Machen, unbeaten and the No. 2 contender from Redding, Calif., was flattened in the first round by European champion Ingemar Johansson of Sweden.

Next to visit London will be Zora Foley, Uncle Sam's No. 1 contender from Chandler, Ariz. He fights Henry Cooper on Oct. 14.

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
