Boys Placed On Probation

Two youths, both 17, were caught prowling cars by a city police officer who at the time was clad in a bathrobe, each was sentenced to a year on probation in district court Tuesday.

Judge D. E. Van Vactor sentenced each to a stern probationary period which included conditions they get a job and work each working day, be at home by 10 each night, and not leave the county without permission.

Or, said the judge, they may go to school if they wish.

These youths were two of the three caught prowling cars last month by City Patrolman Ray Howard, who took chase clad in a bathrobe and armed with flashlight and a pistol.

The third youth, 19, previously was sentenced to a probationary period.
