

Bonanza Antlers, Merrill Tied For League Top Spot

With one short week left before reaching the midway point in District 5B football action the league lead has narrowed down to rest on the broad shoulders of Merrill and Bonanza, both with 2-0 marks to date, moved to the top of the ladder after breaking up a four way tie for the No. 1 spot last weekend.

Coach Al Keck's Merrill Huskies, deemed by many the squad to beat, took care of one side of the four-way hook-up as they whipped the St. Marys Crusaders 33-6, while Erv Ellis' capable Bonanza Antlers moved the Jacksonville Redskins out of the top ranking with a 27-12 defeat on the Redskins' own ground.

Both the Antlers and the Huskies face slightly less formidable foes this Friday night. Merrill will host the Sacred Heart Trojans under the lights at Merrill while Bonanza returns to Gem Stadium to face the Chiloquin Panthers. The Huskies figure to have the easiest time in their assignment since the Antlers have no cinch in their match with Coach Gordon Kuis's Panthers.

Sacred Heart, with a 0-2 record, has been stopped by both Malin and St. Marys; teams that have each fallen before the Huskies in previous games this season. Coach Jerry Kempf's Trojans are the smallest squad among the District 5B contenders. In the Malin loss a Trojan standout was sophomore quarterback, 125 pound

Johnny Jackson, who filled for George Hurley. The Panthers dropped their opener to the Jacksonville Redskins but bounced back to hand the Talent Bulldogs a 12-7 loss their second time out. The Chiloquin team, paced by the dual-threat, Johnny Ochoa, who passed his club to their Bulldog win, has shown a marked increase in proficiency since its first start and must be taken seriously as an upset-minded club.

The Huskies have seemingly not had a true test of their abilities, since, in their victories over the Malin Mustangs and the Crusaders they were never seriously threatened. A balance of power in the Husky backfield, which includes the Haskins brothers, John and Dean, Dennis Salvadori and converted lineman Troy Patterson, a 210-pounder, gives the squad a scoring thrust hard to stop when combined with the smooth-working efficient forward wall.

The Antlers, led by halfbacks Gary Dayley and Dan Nork, have turned in a pair of fine performances and are considered definite stumbling blocks for any team that is championship minded.

Saturday afternoon action finds Coach George Hanson's slightly inexperienced Malin Mustangs scheduled for an entanglement destined to eliminate someone from the four way tie for position No. 2 on the league ladder as they meet the St. Marys Crusaders in Medford. The Mustangs, a relatively new team under a brand new coach, head for this match on an upbeat, coming fresh from a convincing win over the Sacred Heart crew after dropping their opener to the Huskies. Heading the Malin attack is one of the few seniors on the squad, Stan Petrasko, 130 pound halfback, who is strongly supported by quarterback Randy Miller, an able passer, Ron Mullanix, 185, a thorough

going fullback and Rick Illian, a rangy 185 pound end. Rounding out the 5B play for this week are the Jacksonville Redskins and the Talent Bulldogs as they meet on their own side of the mountains. The Redskins hold one-third of second place with Chiloquin and St. Marys, while the Bulldogs share the cellar with the Sacred Heart Trojans.

Hornets Journey For Test

The Henley Hornets take on their second "Little Rogue" conference for Friday night as they journey to Rogue River with high hopes of repeating their 1957 performance when they handed the Rogues a 59-0 trimming.

Not over confident coach Ted Ammerman observed, "We should be able to handle them—but you never know. We beat them badly last year but they are bound to be better this year. So are we, though."

Dropping a rough, tough 12-0 decision to Eagle Point in their conference opener last weekend gave the Hornets a 1-1 tie, 1-loss mark not counting a victory over the Chiloquin Panthers in a non-conference tilt.

Rogue River tumbled 21-0 before Glendale in its first conference game.

The Hornets are gradually regaining strength after a siege of injuries that saw five regulars forced to sit out the Eagle Point battle. The Rogue River game will mark the first time in the three starts that the Hornets will field a complete backfield. Gary Beber will direct the club from the quarterback slot while Burrell Gober, and Lawrence Lugo, both of whom have been sidelined will handle the halfback posts. Phil Swisher, the Hornet ace punter, is sufficiently recovered from a hand injury to again take over the fullback chores.

Still missing from his regular spot is all-conference center Joe Tachini, who is wearing crutches because of a badly sprained ankle. The injury has caused him to miss the last two games and as yet it is not known when he will be able to rejoin his mates.

Larry Moffit, 170 pound junior, has done a creditable job in taking over for the missing Tachini, turning in stable performances both offensively and defensively.

Tackle John Roberts will move back into his starting position after shaking off the effects of twisted knee leaving only defensive back Tom McBride sidelined along with Tachini.

Ammerman has put his squad through tough scrimmages this past week with a fingers-crossed attitude, knowing that the returnees need the work yet fearing that their injury-jinx may still be hovering near.

The Hornets tapered off this afternoon and will leave for Rogue River Friday morning accompanied by a large contingent of Henley rooters. Game time is 8 p.m. under the Rogue River lights.

Poll Names Willamette

KANSAS CITY (AP) — East Texas State College, which outscored its first two opponents 27-7 and 35-20, heads the season's first football poll by the National Assn. of Intercollegiate Athletics.

Ranked second by the NAIA's 32-man board was Willamette College of Salem, Oregon. Willamette is the NAIA offense leader with a game average of 438.5 yards.

Middle Tennessee, tops in the 1957 poll, was third followed by Northeast Oklahoma, Arizona State of Flagstaff, Central Michigan, California Poly of San Luis Obispo, Southern Illinois, Tampa (Fla.) University and Iowa State Teachers College.

The East Texas Lions have defeated Abilene Christian and Southeast Louisiana this year. Willamette beat Whitworth 41-6 in its opener and downed the California Aggies 20-0 in the second game.

All teams in the top ten are undefeated.

Sets Record

Bauer Pickoff Key To Brave Victory

MILWAUKEE (AP) — What would have happened in the first World Series game if Hank Bauer hadn't been so eager in the first inning?

And what would have happened if Warren Spahn hadn't been waiting for just what Bauer did? Here was the picture: Bauer, first up for the New York Yankees, rapped a single to left

and thereby broke his own World Series record by hitting safely in 15 consecutive games.

Maybe that made him a little too careless. At any event, he took too wide a lead off first and Spahn, on the mound for the Milwaukee Braves, whipped the ball to Joe Adcock at first as Bauer, hopelessly trapped, bolted for second. Adcock threw to Johnny Logan and Bauer was out.

Then up came Gil McDougald. He singled through short. If Bauer had played it safe, this would have put him on second. Spahn uncorked a wild pitch which would have put Yankees on second and third with none out. Mickey Mantle popped out to Del Crandall, but Elston Howard fled to center—and if Bauer had been on third he could have scored on the fly ball.

That would have meant a Yankee run, which could have meant that instead of the game being tied at 3-3 in the ninth, the Yankees would have been on top 4-3. Instead it was the third out.

What did the principals say?

The Braves came back in their half of the fourth to score two. Hank Aaron drew a base on balls, advanced to second on a passed ball and to third on a fielder's choice. Then with two out Crandall brought him home with a single to left. Andy Pafo singled to center, putting Crandall on second, and he scored on Spahn's single to left.

The Yankees went ahead in the fifth when Bauer atoned for his base running by laying a home run over the left field fence after Ford had drawn a walk.

The Braves drew even in the bottom of the eighth on Eddie Mathews' base on ball, Aaron's double to right, and Wes Covington's sacrifice fly that scored Mathews.

So at the end of the ninth the score was tied at 3-3.

In the 10th, with Ryno Duren pitching (since the eighth) for Ford, and one out, Adcock singled to center, advanced to second on Crandall's single through short, and scored on Billy Bruton's low liner to right center.

But second-guessers will talk about this one long into the hot stove season because of what happened in the first inning.

Practices on the Honker grounds this week have stressed avoiding the keenly felt penalty situations.

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Weeb Ewbanks Quiet About Colts, Bears

NEW YORK (NEA)—The way they play today, the last guy you want to talk to about a game coming up is the coach. We can prove it, having just conversed with Weeb Ewbank, the diligently cautious man who directs the Baltimore Colts.

The Colts, after knocking over the defending champion Detroit Lions in their 1958 debut, are preparing to jam Memorial Stadium in Baltimore Saturday night so's not to conflict with the World Series with some 52,000 loyalists, leaving room for the offensive and defensive platoons of the Chicago Bears.

The Bears, undefeated through six exhibitions and one regular season contest, are the scourge of the National Football League.

"But I can't tell you anything about them," shrugs Ewbank. "I haven't talked to our scouts. I haven't seen the films. We're right in the midst of grading our boys."

The best we could get out of Ewbank was that against the Lions the Colt defense was "very outstanding." Two bad punts got the Colts in trouble from which an aggressive, rushing line extricated them.

Weeb confessed, "Our offense made 416 yards. John Unitas, at quarterback, is coming through." The defense bit intrigued us most, however, because the revived Bears will be tough to stop, with Willie Galimore getting the habit of scoring three or four times a game and Ed Brown firmly reinstated at quarterback.

Assuming they'll stop them long enough for Unitas to get in his pitching to Ray Berry, we pick the Colts to stomp the Bears, 28-24.

The Lions get a chance to hoist themselves upright the next afternoon in the slick new Green Bay stadium, since the Packers are generally figured the doormats of the West. For some reason, though, Detroit has always had trouble with Green Bay. Allow us at least one long stab this week. With their bull backfield controlling the ball, the Packers are wistfully picked over the Lions, 23-21.

The third game in the Western sphere is the perennial donnybrook involving the Los Angeles Rams and the San Francisco Forty Niners. It wasn't Billy Wade's fault the Rams couldn't stem the Browns in their opener. But for one of Billy, the Forty Niners have two—Y. A. Tittle and John Brodie. The combo figures to pull the Forty Niners past the Rams, 39-28.

The Chicago Cardinals unveiled their new double wing off the T, interesting in its variations, which has the wingbacks slanting in as well as out. But Frank Ivy could not have anticipated the string of fumbles and miscues.

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
