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PCC Football Roundup

California coach Pete Elliott says Washington State probably has the best football team in its history this season.

Elliott will get a chance to check this estimate Saturday when his winless Beavers take on the once-beaten, once-victorious Cougars at Berkeley.

The Cal coach delivered his high appraisal of WSC Wednesday during a practice session. The squad ran through a 1½-hour scrimmage, and was joined by three players who had been on the injured list. They are first-string tackle Frank Sully, guard Charlie Johnson and end Dave George. All are expected to be ready to play Saturday.

At Pullman, Washington State coach Jim Sutherland returned Elliott's compliment. "My boys have a lot of respect for the ability of the California backfield," he said, "especially Mr. (Joe) Kapp. And we'll try to provide a warm reception on the field Saturday."

Washington and Oregon, facing the toughest competition of any teams in the conference this week, provoked opposite impressions in their drills Wednesday.

The Huskies, meeting powerful Ohio State at Columbus Saturday, held an impressive passing drill during which sophomore Phil Borders got off three straight scoring throws to George Fleming. Coach Jim Owens admitted he was pleased.

At Eugene, Oregon worked on defense against the type of plays it expects Oklahoma to spring Saturday at Norman. Observers said the Ducks looked less than frightening.

At Los Angeles, UCLA coach George Dickerson announced he'll start pint-size Dave Peterson at quarterback against Oregon State at Corvallis Saturday. The quarter-back's chief job in a single-wing offense is being quick and Dickerson said he was delighted at the way Peterson did the job against Illinois last week.

Peterson stands only 5-feet-9 and weighs 160. Steve Gertman, who has been the No. 1 quarter-back, is a 207-pound 6-footer. Gertman missed the Illinois game because of a knee injury, but is expected to be ready Saturday.

Jerry Persinger, the unheralded Southern California fullback who played a fine game on both offense and defense against Michigan, has been named to start for the Trojans Saturday against North Carolina. Clark Holden, the No. 1 fullback, is still troubled by a charley horse.

The Foot In Football Gaining Attention

The kick, and its first cousin, the punt, often a dull hit of routine to some football fans, get more than their share of attention these days around the college football practice fields.

For the fan who likes to see the running-passing phase of the game, a man who has to kick a ball is looked on as somewhat of a kill-joy.

Not so to Ohio State's Woody Hayes, or Harvard's John Yovicsin. Hayes, whose Buckeyes play Washington this week, feels his team must match the Huskies kicking game if they are to win. Washington currently is No. 6 in the country in punting.

Jim Owens' team, in upsetting Minnesota 24-21 last week, punted six times for a 44.3 yard average. In two games it has 10 punts for 42.3 average.

Ohio State managed four for 34 yards against Southern Methodist last week. Woody also has his boys looking to the field goal, a weapon he used successfully in winning the Rose Bowl 17-14 this year, and one these same Huskies used to beat Minnesota.

Yovicsin saw his Harvard team stunned with a 6-3 loss to unheralded Buffalo on a blocked kick. His three punters are getting plenty of time working under pressure from linemen this week in prepping for the Cornell game Saturday.

Notre Dame, which must face SMU Saturday, practiced kickoff and punt returns. The Mustangs rank No. 5 in punting, with 2-for-42.5 yards against Ohio State.

A pair of Southwest Conference teams, Texas A&M and Arkansas, drilled in kicking with both looking for initial victories Saturday after two consecutive losses.

Just who will do the punting for Penn is the problem today. The Quakers face Dartmouth Saturday with two halfbacks who took care of the chore last week against Penn State on the shelf.

Jack McGuire, Brown halfback who missed the Columbia opener because of a knee injury, tested it in a running and kicking drill and found no hitches.

The Davidson Wildcats worked at their kicking game in preparation for Saturday night's game against the Citadel. The Cadets did likewise in their practice session.
