

# Braves Two Up On Yankees On Burdette's 13-5 Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—Two up and two to go. But there is not a Milwaukee Brave who thinks it will be easy.

Two down and four to go. But there is not a New York Yankee who thinks the situation is desperate.

That was the World Series picture today as the Braves and Yankees took a 24-hour breather after Lew Burdette's 13-5 conquest of the American League champions that gave Milwaukee a 2-0 edge in the series.

Despite their crushing defeat, matching the worst beating they had ever absorbed in series competition, the Yankees were confident they could turn the tables on the Braves, winning at least two out of the three in Yankee Stadium.

Manager Casey Stengel, who saw his left and right-handed ace, Whitey Ford and Bob Turley, driven from the mound in two successive days, will rely on Don Larsen, another right-hander, Saturday.

Manager Fred Haney said his starting pitcher will be either Bob Rush or Juan Pizarro.

The guess here is that the third game pitcher will be Rush. The

big right-hander gets the call over the young left-hander because of his greater experience. Rush had a 10-6 record during the season. Larsen was 9-6. The Yankees are 7-5 favorites.

The series odds, which now favor Milwaukee at 11-5, failed to dampen Stengel's faith.

"Sure, we're not in what I would call a rosy position," he said, "but this thing is not over by a long shot. Why, only two years ago, we lost the first two to Brooklyn. I seem to remember that we won it at the end, didn't we? There's no law that says we can't do it again. You just never know about these things until they happen. Then you know."

"Somebody ought to tell those guys not to get too cocky just because they beat us a couple of times. This club of mine has a way of coming back. I know we haven't looked so good but we might get to 'em pretty quick."

Stengel better not back on the Braves becoming too cocky. Haney spoke for all of his players when he said: "It's far from over. All I'm looking forward to is Saturday's ball game. We'll play them one at a time. All right, so we're two in front. That's two

they can't win. But you can't be too chesty. They can come back and pin our ears back. You just got to play 'em one at a time."

Warren Spahn, who probably will pitch the fourth game Sunday, said he figured it will take six games for the Braves to repeat last year's triumph.

"These Yankees are tough," he said.

Perhaps the Yankee optimism was the result of their three-run ninth inning outburst against Burdette.

He had a three-hitter and had retired 15 men in a row going into the last inning. Four straight hits, including home runs by Hank Bauer and Mickey Mantle, put him in real trouble for the only time since the first inning when the Yankees scored first and had the bases loaded before the first double play of the series pulled him out of it.

But Burdette dug up a little something extra in the ninth and three straight putouts followed the four hits.

Lew left the field as the first pitcher in 21 years to win four straight from the same team in World Series competition. Lefty Gomez, a Yankee great, did it back in 1936-37 against the New York Giants but he had relief help in one game, while Burdette's have all been complete jobs.

Burdette himself homered in the last half of the first to cap a record seven-run inning by the Braves that all but wrapped it up. He was the fifth pitcher to homer in a World Series and the first since Bucky Walters did it for Cincinnati against Detroit in 1940.

Elston Howard, playing left field for the Yanks, crashed into the fence in a vain effort to pull down Burdette's poke. Examination showed he probably will be sidelined Saturday.

Howard's replacement, Norm Siebern, got one of the seven hits off Burdette, who walked one and struck out five. Bauer had two hits and Mantle two. Mantle has now hit 11 homers in series play, second only to Babe Ruth's 15.

## Defense To Get Test In Weekend Football

The defense phase of college football will get some stiff tests this weekend.

Oklahoma and Army, who unveiled new, wide-open offenses that staggered opponents a week ago will be at it again Saturday. Before all this comes about, though, Jim Tatum's winless 0-2 North Carolina Tar Heels meet Southern California tonight in Los Angeles. USC is 1-1 and a six-point favorite.

Oklahoma, No. 1 team in the country, plays defense-minded Oregon. The Webfoot had a week to work on Coach Bud Wilkinson's new offensive concepts, and enter the game ranked No. 7 in defense. Movies of the "baroque formation" at West Point have been distributed to all Army's opponents.

except Navy, and Penn State is the first to see if it can make Coach Red Blaid sorry for his generosity. The fifth-ranked Cadets have that "lonesome end" (plays 18 yards from his tackle) that was greatly responsible for the 45-8 drubbing of South Carolina a week ago.

There will be all sorts of variations in the Cotton Bowl when Notre Dame (No. 7) meshes its running and passing attacks against Southern Methodist (No. 18) and quarterback Don Meredith's great passing arm. The Irish have fullback Nick Pietrosante back for full-time service.

Fireworks aplenty are planned at Michigan State when the fourth-ranked Spartans use their multiple offense against neighbor and bitter rival Michigan in the Big Ten's top game.

Television viewers get a bit of variety too, when Washington State's ace passer Bob Newman goes against California's Joe Kapp, a split-T quarterback who is rated a better runner than passer. The game is scheduled for 3:45 p.m., EST, over NBC-TV or as soon as the World Series is finished.

Third-ranked Ohio State's Buckeyes meet upset-minded Washington, a 24-21 victor over Minnesota last week. Second-ranked Auburn has more to lose than gain with its game against tiny Chattanooga as does sixth-ranked Mississippi against Trinity of Texas.

Iowa (No. 8) ushers the Air Force Academy into competition with the Big Ten, Wisconsin (No. 9) tests Marquette's one-game winning streak after it lost 19 in a row, and 10th-ranked Clemson plays Maryland in an Atlantic Coast Conference game.

The first two TDs came off the arm of quarterback Gary Buchholz, who connected with Brinson once for 39 yards and again for 40. An interception by Erik Peterson who rolled to the Merrill five set up the third score as Brinson plunged into the end zone.

The Merrill six-pointer came early in the second quarter when an aerial tossed by KU's Ken Hunsaker was intercepted by the Husky Bill Beasley who sped 60 yards to pay-dirt.

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## Mantle Second To Ruth

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Mickey Mantle, a soft-spoken man who swings a big bat for the Yankees, provided one of the bright spots in New York's otherwise dismal showing against the Milwaukee Braves Thursday.

Although the defending world champions handed the Yankees their second straight defeat, 13-5, Mantle broke out of a mild slump and emerged as the losers' batting hero.

He hit two home runs and drove home three runs off Lew Burdette to become second only to Babe Ruth in World Series home run history. The famed Ruth swatted 15, and Mantle's pair ran his total to 11, one ahead of teammate Yogi Berra, Duke Snider and Lou Gehrig, one of Ruth's companions of the original "Murderers' Row."

Mantle, a switch hitter who rates among the batsmen most feared by American League pitchers, went hitless in three trips against Warren Spahn in the first game.

Mantle, however, was anything but elated as he sat quietly in the locker room after the game. The Yankees had suffered a humiliating defeat, and that was obviously uppermost in his mind.

He shrugged off congratulations on his performance. Asked if he was pleased to be hitting well again, he replied, "I'm not worried about my hitting. I just want us to win."

Mantle said the center field bleacher fans were "on" him throughout the game, but added: "It was mostly just good natured kidding and didn't bother me any. I sort of laughed when they got together and sang the 'Mickey Mouse' theme song from that television show."

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## 'Same Old Way' Says Brave Ace After Win

MILWAUKEE (AP)—"I pitched the same way against them as last year. Why should I change?"

The speaker was the Milwaukee Braves' Lew Burdette and he was referring, of course, to his continued World Series mastery over the New York Yankees.

As they say in the West Virginia mining country where Burdette comes from, he whupped 'em for fair Thursday for the fourth consecutive time as Milwaukee won 13-5.

Only Lefty Gomez ever beat the

same team four straight in World Series competition. He did it for the Yankees against the Giants in 1936-37.

Burdette laughs off suggestions that perhaps he has been using a secret weapon on the Yankees.

"I honestly don't know why I can beat them, or how for that matter," he said. "There's no reason that I know of."

He might have pointed out that the Yankees just don't seem to be able to cope with his assortment of breaking pitches—screwballs, sinkers and sliders—especially when he keeps them low.

The 31-year-old right-hander also might have mentioned his sharp control. He issued only one base on balls, an intentional one to Mickey Mantle in the first inning.

He preferred to dwell on the three-run homer he hit in the Braves' seven-run first inning, the Yankees' ninth-inning uprising and "the room."

Burdette denied that he let up in the ninth when Casey Stengel's athletes clipped him for four of their seven hits and three of their runs.

"I didn't let up intentionally, at any rate," he said. "I was just throwing strikes to get them out. Made 'em too good, I guess. Then I figured I better get them out. Things were getting rather binding out there."

Burdette and southpaw Warren Spahn, who beat the Yanks Wednesday, room together when the Braves are on the road. They often refer to "the room" when talking about their combined accomplishments. Last spring they predicted 50 victories for "the room."

"This gives the room 44 victories," Burdette said. "Not bad, but it doesn't look like we'll hit 50. The series won't last that long."
