

Flier Chutes To Safety

An Air Force pilot from Klamath Falls recently parachuted to safety when the jet fighter he was flying in an air defense exercise mission went out of control in northwest California.

Capt. Ray R. Royse, son of Mr. and Mrs. Len Royse, 615 California Avenue, was flying an F-102-Delta Dagger — out of Travis Air Force Base, California, when the accident occurred.

According to a spokesman at Hamilton Air Force Base, Captain Royse reported that he bailed out after a futile effort to regain control of the plane, which crashed near Philo, not far from Eureka, setting fire to some 15 acres of grass. The crash occurred September 20.

Royse was picked up by a helicopter from the Hamilton AFB rescue service and flown to Travis AFB Hospital, where a complete physical checkup showed him to be little the worse for his experience. His face was somewhat puffed from the impact of the wind as he left the plane.

Chief Of Police Gets Shoplifter

Rand pleaded guilty to charges of petty theft in the Weed Justice Court Tuesday and was sentenced to serve 60 days in the county jail by judge Kenneth T. Stone. Police said Rand had taken six cans of beer from the store and hid them in his auto parked outside, then reentered the store and made off with a packaged raw chicken by hiding it inside a second pair of trousers that had the legs wired closed around the ankles. When cornered by employees in the store the man took off on the run. In the pursuit the chicken fell out of the trousers and was later recovered.

Improvement Hearing Set

Properly owners on Cannon Street west of Altamont Drive, beyond the city limits, will be heard October 29 on their request for street improvements.

The owners already have presented a petition with signatures from more than 70 per cent of their number, asking the county to grade and blacktop the street which now is graveled in spots.
