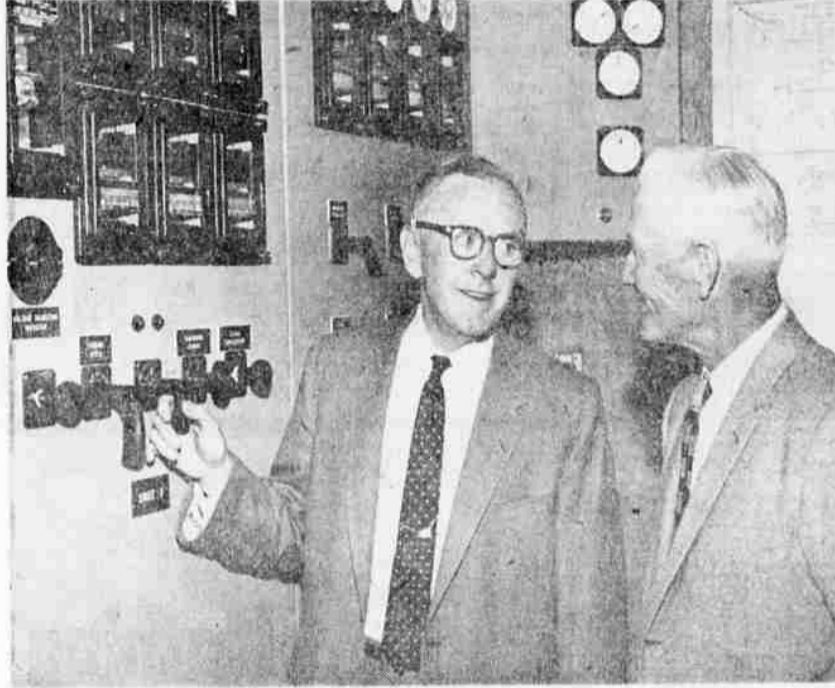

No Smoking Area Cited

The only exceptional "no smoking" area in the Main Street-Esplanade Avenue region is in a store basement, Fire Chief Roy Rowe said Thursday morning. Replying to reports that smoking had been prohibited in that entire area, Rowe said that the problem has existed for a couple of months, dating from the time it was first discovered that gasoline was seeping into the basement. The seepage was traced to a nearby service station, which installed a new tank, apparently solving the problem. However, more gasoline has seeped in, and the fire department, with the cooperation of all service stations in the area, is conducting tests to discover the present source of the gas. Until the seepage is halted, smoking is of course excluded from the basement involved, but there is no danger elsewhere, Rowe said.
