Mr. and Mrs. Pete Belcastro of Weed are the parents of the bride. The bridegroom is the son of Dr. Clara Birelew, Weiser, Idaho and Charles Lawson, Boise, Idaho.

Both the bride and bridegroom were 1958 graduates of the University of California at Berkeley. Lighted white tapers in gold candelabra were background lights for a profusion of white chrysanthemums and pink snapdragons that decorated the altar, statues flanking the altar and the side altars of the church for the afternoon ceremonies.

The petite flower girl, Denise Calhoun, San Bruno, a cousin of the bride was dressed in all pink, wearing net ruffled dress, net headpiece and mits and satin slippers. She carried a pink basket from which she scattered pink rose petals along the white carpeted aisle.
