

Braves Win Behind Spahn; Can Sew Up Series Today

NEW YORK (AP)—This could be it. The World Series could end today.

The once mighty New York Yankees appear ready to take the count. They've never been as "down" as they are right now. It would appear that Manager Casey Stengel would have to be a miracle man to get them up again.

The stage appeared set too. The pitcher the American League champions must get by today in order to stay alive is that old Yankee killer himself, Lew Burdette. He's beaten the Yankees four-for-four in the last two series.

The Yankees dropped their third in four games to the Braves Sun-

day 3-0. The loss was in the pattern of the pair they lost in Milwaukee—woeful hitting and leaky fielding.

Warren Spahn, the brilliant southpaw, held the Yankees to two hits Sunday. The day before, they managed four hits in their only winning game. Their team batting average is a microscopic .168. Their fielding percentage is a respectable .968 but it doesn't show the many mental lapses and errors of omission.

Stengel, frankly chagrined over the failure of Whitey Ford, his left handed ace, to register at least one victory in two starts, nominated Bob Turley to pitch the "must" fifth game. The fire-balling right-

hander was shelled out in the first inning of the second game of the series last Thursday.

It is not surprising, therefore, that the odds-makers have declined to accept any more Milwaukee money that the Braves will win the series. For today's game, however, the Yankees were favored 13-10.

Yankee left fielder Norm Siebern was the "goat" in New York's loss Sunday. He allowed four drives to fall out of his reach, all of which appeared "catchable." These lapses figured in all the scoring and ruined an otherwise fine pitching performance by Ford.

Norm, 25, normally a good fielder, just had a bad day. The strong sun and the shadow-making third deck behind home plate didn't help him either. In the fifth, he failed to get a jump on Del Crandall's fly and it fell at his feet for a single. No damage.

In the sixth, he got over to Red Schoendienst's long fly to left center, then decided to let Mickey Mantle, who had come over, take it. Neither did. The ball rolled between them for a triple. Shortstop Tony Kubek's error of Johnny Logan's grounder scored Red with the Braves' first run.

In the seventh, after a walk and Andy Patko's double had put Milwaukee runners on second and third with one out, Spahn blooped a fly to short left. Siebern hesitated, charged in, and stopped. The ball dropped at his feet for a run-scoring single.

In the eighth, Logan sent a routine fly to left. Siebern flipped down his sun-glasses — and lost the ball altogether. The ball hopped past him into the left field boxes for a ground rule double. Eddie Mathews followed with a double off the right field scoreboard, scoring Logan with run No. 3.

In the meantime, Spahn simply mesmerized the Yankee hitters. Mickey Mantle, with a tremendous 425-foot triple in the fourth, and Bill Skowron, with a single in the seventh, were the only batters to fathom his delivery. The 37-year-old southpaw, who called it the best game he had pitched all year, walked two and struck out seven. He appeared stronger at the finish, getting the last nine men.

yards Sunday. Brown, an All-America at Syracuse, scored three touchdowns and carried the ball for 129 yards. The result: the Browns second consecutive victory, a 45-12 whacking of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Meanwhile there were a couple of other surprises as the NFL split the second week of the season over two days.

Saturday night, Baltimore's Colts broke Lenny Moore loose for four touchdowns as they displayed a strong attack in rolling up a 31-20 score over the previously unbeaten Chicago Bears. The Cardinals, usually looked upon as Chicago's poor sisters, upset the Washington Redskins 37-10.

In other Sunday action, Philadelphia defeated favored New York 27-24. Los Angeles belted San Francisco 33-3 with the 49ers' Joe Perry setting a career rushing record, and Detroit and Green Bay played a 13-13 tie.

Stitch Meets Isaac Logart In Ring Bout

Rudell Stitch gets his big chance Monday night.

The 25-year-old Louisville welterweight, who has been struggling for a living in the ring, gets his opportunity to prove his usque victor over Cuba's sleek Isaac Logart last August was no fluke.

He and Logart clash in a return over the ten round route at New York's St. Nicholas Arena. There won't be any television but boxing matchmakers will be on hand to see what Stitch can do.

Apparently he is no flash in the pan. He followed up his victory over Logart by flattening Luther Rawlings in the fourth round last month to run his win streak to eight. Rudell is now ranked 10th among the 147-pound contenders while Logart is ranked fifth.

If he can whip Logart again Stitch will be promoted in the rankings. And more important to the father of five, he will be in line for fatter purses.

Logart's record is 52-10-5 including 19 knockouts. Stitch's record is 15-3 including nine kayos.

Sonny Liston, of Philadelphia, is another young fighter out to strengthen his position in the rankings. Winner of 29 of 31 pro fights, the hard-hitting heavyweight now is ranked ninth among the contenders. He meets Frankie Daniels of Los Angeles in a non-TV clash at Miami Beach Tuesday night. Liston stowed away tank-like Wayne Bethea of New York in just 69 seconds on Aug. 6.

Linfield, the defending champion, put together two scoring drives in the second half and topped Whitman 21-14 in a game at Walla Walla.

Linfield moved 62 yards to a touchdown in the opening quarter. But then Whitman snapped back and took the lead with a pair of second quarter scores. Bill Grant plunged over from one yard and Max Johnson scored on a 55-yard pass from Bob Collins.

Coy Zimmerman and Sel Spray scored the final Linfield touchdowns with short runs.

Favored Willamette had to fight hard for its 27-14 victory over Pacific at Forest Grove. Jack Nehring, who carried the ball 33 times, passed to Don Iverson for one Pacific touchdown. Dennis Rieger circled left end for the other.

The highlights of Willamette's score were a 22-yard run with an intercepted pass by John Hinds and two one-yard sneaks by quarterback Keith Driver.

Cadets, Irish Clash In Gridiron Meeting

Notre Dame and Army meet for the last time in their current series Saturday and it couldn't be a more important farewell.

Both teams have set this year as the target date for a high spot in the national rankings and both, so far, have showed they mean it.

Army is ranked No. 5 in the weekly Associated Press poll and Notre Dame No. 7. No one at either Army or Notre Dame appears ready to say when — if ever — the series will be resumed.

It will prove a mighty test for Army's hazooka offense.

Army beat Penn State 26-0 Saturday, doing all its scoring in the first half. Coach Red Blaik apparently didn't want the Irish scouts to see too much, so the wraps were placed over the Cadets in the second half.

Oklahoma, No. 1, had a scare, winning by 6-0 against Oregon, one of the top defensive clubs in the country.

This week the Sooners take on Texas, the lone undefeated team in the Southwest Conference. The Longhorns whipped Texas Tech last week.

There are a couple of potential upsets for Saturday when Michigan State plays Pitt and Iowa goes against Indiana.

The Spartans are advertised as being the No. 1 threat to Ohio State in the Big Ten (they don't play each other). But they could do no better than a 12-12 standoff against Michigan in their last outing.

Pitt, which dearly would love to win the Eastern title, had no easy time against Minnesota (13-7). The Panthers have a rough schedule including both Army and Notre Dame. Even if they don't win, this one will toughen them up for the big ones to come.

As for Iowa, another Big Ten tonotcher and rated No. 8 in the AP poll, the Hawkeyes were held to a 13-13 tie by the Air Force Academy.

Iowa has a date with conference foe Indiana, which turned back tough West Virginia 13-12.

Auburn, ranked second to Oklahoma and the national champion last year, plays Kentucky. The Tigers whipped Chattanooga 30-3 and appear too tough for Kentucky.

Third-rated Ohio State, which had its worries with Washington, 12-7, tangles with Illinois, which lost to Duke 15-13. This, too, could be close.

California licked Washington State 34-14 in the NCAA's Television Game of the Week, and in an upset of sorts, Tennessee, in the midst of a rebuilding program trounced Mississippi State 13-8.

World Series Highlights

NEW YORK (AP) Figuring the World Series:

For all the good they've done, the series pinch-hitters could just as well have remained on the bench. None among the 12 pinch-hitters used has hit safely. Only Enos Slaughter of the Yanks reached base — on a walk in the third game.

Warren Spahn's shutout was the first by a left-hander in the series since Johnny Podres of the Dodgers beat the Yanks 2-0 in the seventh game of the 1955 classic.

After getting two hits in his first three tries in the opening game, Yogi Berra of the Yankees has gone hitless in 12 consecutive times at bat and his average has dipped to .133.

The Pittsburgh Pirates of 1925 were the only team to have won a seven-game series after dropping three of the first four games. And to accomplish the feat, the Pirates had to overcome a 7-6 Washington lead in the final contest with three runs in the eighth inning of Walter Johnson.

Hank Aaron's two hits in Sunday's game gave the Milwaukee outfielder 16 safeties in two series and an over-all percentage of .472. Included are two doubles, one triple and three homers.

Shortstop Johnny Logan of the Braves has now handled 95 chances without a miscue in 1957 and has 21 so far this year.

The Yankees are batting .168 as a club. The record low for a five game series is .163 by the Philadelphia A's in 1905.

The four series games have averaged 2 hours, 43 minutes. Sunday's game was the shortest in time — 2 hours, 17 minutes while the first one was the longest — 3 hours, 9 minutes.

Emphasizing the Braves' fine team effort is the fact that they've batted in 19 runs and no player has more than three RBIs. Hank Bauer has driven in seven of New York's 12 runs.
