University of Oregon and Oregon State College continue to uphold the football reputation of the Beaver State with fine jobs over the past weekend. Oregon held the mighty Oklahoma Sooners to a 6-0 outclassed win, while Oregon State whipped the champions of the "Big Four" UCLA, 14-0.

Of the two, Oregon State's blanking of the Bruins from the southern part of California was a real great effort. It's too bad that Washington State had to lose to California. If the Cougars had won, none of the Southern Rebs would have been talking football this week. UCLA and USC took it on the chin, but the Cal Bears managed to save some face by whipping WSC, and whipping them badly.

Oregon's "moral" victory was the second in three games. The other "moral" win came last New Year's Day when Len Casanova's Webfoots lost a 10-7 nod to Ohio State. And the thing that points up Oregon's victory in defeat is the fact that both clubs were rated No. 1 in the nation when the Ducks tackled them. And both times the Oregon gridgers were tabbed as high as 35 point underdogs.

If you don't think Oregon lost a heartbreaker, take a look at the game statistics. First downs favored Oregon 13-7. Rushing yardage favored Oregon 174 to 129. Passing yardage favored Oregon 87 to 27. Total net yardage favored Oregon 261 to 156. Penalties favored Oregon 60 to 50.

But, the one little item that counts most of all, scoring favored Oklahoma 6-0.

Two former Oregon and OSC assistants are doing a great job in their first year as head coaches.

Clay Stapleton, former aid to Tommy Prothro at Oregon State has started out on the run at Iowa State. Bill Hammer, Oregon's well-liked line coach under Len Casanova, is well underway at Iowa State Teachers.

Stapleton's Iowa State club has rolled up two wins in three outings, losing only to Nebraska, and that by a 7-6 margin. He has defeated Drake 33-0 and Arizona 14-0. In three games his club has allowed just one opposing touchdown, and that's not bad.

At Iowa State Teachers, Ham-

mer's club is undefeated in four games to date. The Teachers have rolled over Bradley 29-12, Mankato 25-0, North Dakota State 21-11 and last week polished off Drake 20-16.

Former Weed High School star athlete Aaron Thomas had a real fine day for Oregon State Saturday in the 14-0 win over UCLA. Thomas caught three passes for a total of 60 yards, an average of 20 yards per reception. The young Beaver is being groomed as one of the top end prospects since Tommy Prothro has been at Oregon State.

One fan who saw the game said afterwards: "You knew what was coming as soon as he (Thomas) went into the game. It was a pass play coming up. But try and stop him. He's got great hands and can move."

As Oregon Tech heads into its fourth week of football competition Earl Green and Charlie "Go Go" Wilson lead the Owls in almost every offensive department. Green leads the Tech football forces in rushing yardage and is tied with Wilson, who is second in rushing, for the scoring lead.

Wilson leads the over-all total yards gained by rushing and passing. The Tulsa, Oklahoma, halfback has picked up 151 yards rushing and 124 yards on pass receptions for a total of 275 yards, or an average of just over 91 yards per game.

Green has rushed for 199 net yards, an average of 4.4 per carry. The Sacramento fullback and Wilson have both scored two touchdowns and are tied in scoring with 12 points each.

Huskies To Test Stanford

No one would have fallen out of his chair if the outweighted, underdog Washington Huskies had emerged from their game with Ohio State a little bruised and wobbly legged.

But, unhappily for the Stanford Indians, that's not the way the Huskies stack up this week. They had that healthy, rosy-checked look of a basket of Washington apples Tuesday as they drilled for their Saturday engagement with the Indians at Stanford.

Coach Jim Owen had his first and second units working on defense against the third team, which had little luck with its Stanford offense.

The Huskies, who scared the daylight out of a stadium full of Ohioans before losing to the Buckeyes 12-7 Saturday, will be playing their first conference game of the season Saturday. They figure to be decided favorites over the Indians, whose backfield hasn't scored a touchdown yet this year.

Despite three decisive losses, the Indians were in high spirits Tuesday and Coach Jack Curtice said the workout was the sharpest in two weeks. Curtice said his starting backfield Saturday will be Bob Nicolet at quarterback, Rick McMillen and John Bond at halfbacks and Gil Dowd at fullback.

The Oregon Ducks, another surprise team over the weekend, also were at full strength Tuesday following the return of starting guard Joe Schafeldt, idled last week with an injury. The Ducks, beaten only 6-0 by heavily favored Oklahoma, meet the Southern California Trojans Saturday at Portland.

Physically, the Trojans are less fortunately situated. Their No. 1 quarterback, Willie Wood, is expected to be out again Saturday because of a shoulder injury suffered two weeks ago. Also out is second-string tackle Ron Mix, who has had pneumonia.

The Washington State Cougars, meeting Idaho in this weekend's other conference game, concentrated on speed Tuesday. The Cougar line will be outweighed 10 pounds per man by the Vandals and WSC Coach Jim Sutherland said the speed factor will be emphasized the rest of the week.

Oregon State coach Tommy Prothro reports that his leading ground gainer, fullback Nub Beamer, will miss Saturday's game with Wyoming. Beamer suffered a shoulder injury in the UCLA game last week. He'll be replaced by Dainard Paulson or Chuck Marshall.

The California Bears last weekend took care of WSC's Bobby Newman, the second leading passer in the nation. Now they're trying to work up a defense for the nation in passing last season and threw for 14 touchdowns. Val Keekin, a transfer quarterback from Los Angeles City College who is ineligible to play this year, tossed some Grosscup-like passes at the Cal defense Tuesday.

UCLA Coach George Dickerson says he'll start all his half-season seniors Friday night against Florida at the Coliseum.

Ray, Cotton Clash Tonight

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Sonny Ray of Chicago offers Eddie Cotton of Seattle his first test of the year tonight in a scheduled 10-round light-heavyweight fight at Fairgrounds Coliseum.

Both were expected to weigh about 171 pounds for the nationally televised (ABC, 9 p.m. EST) bout. Scoring will be on the 5-point system.

Ray, now 23, has an 18-5-5 record, including three victories — two by knockouts — in four matches with light-heavyweight contender Jesse Bodry.

Cotton has a 35-7-1 record in a career spanning almost 11 years. He quit the ring in 1936 because of his slow progress and, last year, one of his few fights was a losing decision to Archie Moore.

NEW YORK (AP) — There's nothing like a crisp, audible tackle to make one forget quickly and completely about baseball.

Why couldn't it have happened a week ago when double plays and sacrifice flies interfered to the extent that 12 of 52 choices were incorrect for a record of 769.

Here are this weekend's undisturbed picks:

Ohio State over Illinois: The Buckeyes start playing in earnest now that their Big Ten title is at stake. It is an Illini home game but you can see it on your TV screen.

Oklahoma over Texas: The lean raw Oklahomans meet the lean, raw Texans. But the Sooners have more of them and that should decide.

Notre Dame over Army: This could be the game of the day. The Cadets have, by statistics, one of the most devastating machines in the nation when on the attack in Dawkins, Anderson and Lonesome Bob. The isolated end, The Irish have Nick Pietrosante and a tougher defense than Army has encountered before.

Auburn over Kentucky: The Plainsmen are rated No. 1. There to disagree.

Wisconsin over Purdue: Two unbeaten, unscored-on powers of the Big Ten collide. Loss of Purdue's Wayne Farmer, a 240-pound tackle via an injury will hurt the Boiler-makers.

Klamath Union Pelicans Prep For Non-Counting Grid Scrap

After a day's rest coach Andy Knudsen and his Klamath Union gridgers returned to the practice field Tuesday afternoon to open a week of preparation for the coming non-conference, the last one, game with the Orland Trojans Friday night at Orland, California.

Following their loss to the Springfield Millers the last time out, it was decided to avoid all unnecessary contact work during this week with the hope that the KU squad might recover from the rash of injuries that saw them enter the game at Springfield at less than three-quarter strength.

Tuesday afternoon the Pels began work with a session of pass defense work, a department in which they suffered badly against the Millers to spark his club into the spirit, coach Andy Knudsen took over at the quarterback slot for the offensive unit and spent two hours throwing strikes against his regular defensive unit.

Commented Knudsen, after his gruelling session, "We have to round into shape fast. Medford is only a week away and the rumor is that they are a wee bit tough."

Knudsen said he has a list of 15 players who would more than make up the difference; he weighs 220. Currin is suffering from a badly injured knee and will undoubtedly not return for the balance of the Pel season.
