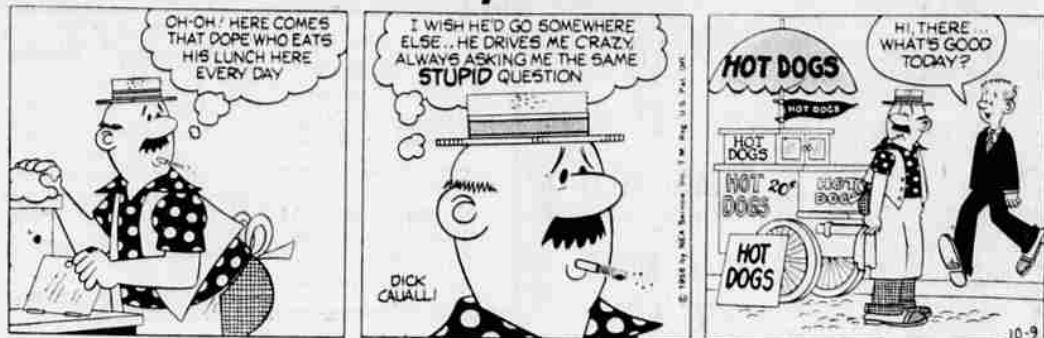

New Roman Catholic Head To Be Named By 55 Clerics

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The man who will succeed Pope Pius XII may be any of the cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church, or perhaps even a prelate who is not a cardinal.

The 55 cardinals will make the selection. They will gather behind locked doors at the Sistine Chapel. The new Pope must be elected by a majority of one more than two-thirds of the cardinals present.

All the Popes have been Italian for 400 years, and most speculation again will center around Italian leaders in the church.

There is an old saying about conclaves to elect Popes — that "he who enters the conclave Pope, leaves it cardinal." It means that those most talked about as likely candidates are seldom elected.

It is very possible the next Pope will be a prelate not even considered in Vatican circles as a candidate. Still, some names stand out.

Most prominently mentioned among non-Italians is Gregory Peter Cardinal Agagianian, Russian-born patriarch of Armenia, who was chosen by Pope Pius last June to succeed Samuel Cardinal Stritch as pro-prefect of the Congregation for Propagation of the Faith.

Bearded Cardinal Agagianian, 63, is the Catholic Church's foremost expert on the Soviet Union, and communism. As a representative of the Eastern rites of Catholicism, his appointment might strengthen ties with the East.

Another foreigner sometimes mentioned is an Australian, Norman Thomas Cardinal Gilroy, 62, partly because of an old prophecy

that the next Pope would be "shepherd and sailor." Before becoming a priest he served as a telegraph operator aboard a warship in World War I.

Prominent among the Italian

possibilities is Archbishop Giovanni Battista Montini of Milan, 61, who turned down a cardinal's red hat in 1953 to remain close to Pope Pius as pro-secretary of state at the Vatican.

During his serious illness four years ago, the Pope named Mgr. Montini to head the Milan Archdiocese, a position where he added pastoral experience to his long administrative experience within the Vatican.

Another potential candidate is Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, 66, archbishop of Bologna, who organized "Flying Friars" in radio-equipped automobiles to help counter the threat of Communism in Italy.

The youngest is Giuseppe Cardinal Siri, 52, archbishop of Genoa, a brilliant scholar and also supporter of social reform measures.

Other possibilities include: Marcello Cardinal Mimmi, 76, former Archbishop of Naples and now a member of the Roman Curia.

Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, 74, French-born dean of the College of Cardinals.

Ernesto Cardinal Ruffini, 70, Archbishop of Palermo, a noted scholar.

Crisanto Cardinal Luque, 69, Archbishop of Bogota and Colombia's first cardinal.

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Bonneville Power Officials Report Lack Of Customers

PORTLAND (AP)—The Bonneville Power Administration said Wednesday it has plenty of power, but not enough customers.

As a result, Bonneville Administrator William A. Pearl said, the big federal power agency is operating in the red this year and expects to continue doing so through 1959.

Pearl said Bonneville might have to raise its rates in the near future.

Pearl's report was one of several presented at Wednesday's meeting of the Columbia Basin Interagency Committee, a regional organization attempting to work out a water-use program.

Pearl said power use had fallen off because of mild weather and the recession.

Ray W. Scheufele of the Army Engineers reported that 90 million dollars will be spent in the Columbia basin in the current fiscal year.

This includes \$400,000 for navigation and flood control studies, two million for advance work on 17 projects, three million to begin

construction on 11 new small projects, 70 million for continuing work on projects underway, and 14½ million for operation and maintenance of present projects.

Ellis Hatt of the U.S. Department of Agriculture said that 1958 was the worst year for forest fires since 1951. There were 1,721 fires in Washington and Oregon through September and 17,396 acres were charred. Last year 879 fires burned only 1,196 acres.

David Portner of the U.S. Department of Labor said the unemployment situation in Oregon this winter will be even worse than last winter. He said the region's basic industry—lumber and woodworking—had picked up orders. But employment increases

had not followed, he said. The total unemployment in the Pacific Northwest at the end of September was 95,000. At this time last year the total was 77,000. "Things will be worse this winter than last," Portner said.

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
