

New Conservation Rules Planned By Shasta Firm

MOUNT SHASTA — New principles of conservation will be brought into play next year when the Ralph L. Smith Lumber Company starts cutting 20 million board-feet of timber from 3,000 acres on Mount Shasta's southeast slope. The timber was sold on a selective basis in a contract just negotiated by Southern Pacific Land Company.

The new logging plan, drawn by Richard C. Sias, Southern Pacific's district forester here, was described by a state official as "the most advanced and scholarly logging plan ever submitted for approval to the California State Division of Forestry."

Culminating more than a year's research into conservation methods used both here and in Europe, the program calls for cutting the timber in three cycles — first of which will be undertaken next spring.

Included are heavy stands of pure Mount Shasta red and white fir, according to Louis Frandsen, SP Land Company president.

He explained that logging on Mount Shasta presents peculiar problems under Southern Pacific's planned — management approach since conservation methods ordinarily used would probably result in damage brought on by heavy winter storms—to the standing timber.

"Ordinarily," he pointed out, "we log off all the mature or high-risk trees. That leaves the land in the best productive condition possible, in most cases. But it wouldn't work here because of the heavy winds on that slope. If we used our usual plan, many of the trees left isolated would be blown down—and that's why Shasta developed this new method."

Under this approach, every acre of timber in the area is treated as an individual unit.

"This is being done," Sias says, "because some portions of the acreage are completely covered with mature trees. Other sections have intermingled young and old trees in various combinations."

"Now, where we have small acre-size patches of heavy, mature timber, surrounded by other blocks of growing trees, we're going to cut the entire patch."

"Where all the trees are mature, we're going to take them out in strips 200-feet wide and at right angles to the wind. We'll leave intervening strips of mature timber 400-feet wide," Sias explains.

"This is a practice used with great success in Europe."

"Under the other situations, our foresters will mark all of the boundaries within which the trees will be removed. We'll cut out another 200-foot strip when a new crop becomes established."

Sias added that meanwhile, the mature trees in the 400-foot strips left standing will reseed the area, retain soil and moisture, block the wind and shade the area sufficiently to insure prompt regeneration and solid growth before the next logging cycle begins.

When the third and last strip is cut, the first will be sufficiently regrown to provide the same protection and the cycle can be repeated indefinitely.

"In the sections where growth is balanced, our SP foresters will go through and mark the individual trees that we want removed in our normal fashion," Sias says.

"That leaves room for the young trees to grow and the area stays 'park like.'"

Southern Pacific's policy is to limit sale of timber from its lands to the volume that can be continuously produced.

Sias also points out that the new plan also will cut down water erosion and help reseedling, since the seed source is always to the windward side of the logged-off strip.

Current logging operations will take two years. The timber is on Section 5, TWP 40N, 1/2W, and Sections 17, 19, 21, 29, 31, 33, TWP 41N, 2W.
