

Second-Guess Sees Braves W-S Triumph

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Could the Milwaukee Braves have been the world champions today instead of New York had they given Elston Howard an intentional pass?

It's possible, in fact, replaying the eighth inning of Thursday's World Series finale, won by the Yankees 6-2, brings up a lot of possibilities.

With two out, Yogi Berra doubled to right field. It would have been logical to walk Howard.

But Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney had Lew Burdette pitch

and Howard broke up a 2-2 tie with a single to center. Some might say it didn't make any difference because Andy Carey singled and Moose Skowron homered.

However, Carey's single was off the glove of Eddie Mathews and wouldn't have scored anybody. And with the bases loaded, Burdette would have had his full windup and maybe worked more carefully to Skowron.

Then, too, there's always the possibility that Yankee Manager Casey Stengel would have taken Carey out for a pinch batter since Carey hadn't had a hit in the series.

Haney left himself wide open for the second guess on two other occasions. After the Yankees had failed to score in the first inning, the Braves opened up with Red Schoendienst singling and Billy Branton drawing a walk.

It appeared the Braves were headed for a big inning. But Haney had Frank Torre sacrifice and when the inning was over Milwaukee had only one run instead of maybe a cluster.

Party Fails In Bushville

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Milwaukee was a city without its baseball champion today, and to put together a time-honored poem and a name applied to Milwaukee in happier days, it was indeed true that "There is no joy in Bushville, the Milwaukee Braves have struck out."

One Milwaukee daily, the morning Sentinel, put the words into a banner with a black background: "No Joy in Bushville."

Milwaukeeans, who were ready to celebrate their second straight world's championship, acted after the seventh game Thursday like normal people, which is not how they have acted when the Braves were pennant and World Series winners last year, and pennant winners again this year.

Wisconsin Avenue, the nerve center of all other Milwaukee celebrations, was poised for the big blowout Thursday if the Braves had been able to turn the trick again against the New York Yankees.

The souvenir vendors were lined up along the sidewalk, the extra police were on duty to handle the crowds, and the mobile and radio units and news cameramen were in position to report the celebration.

But it never came.

A little old lady walked up to one newsstand and asked: "Who's ahead?"

"Yankees, 6 to 2," was the answer, and she grumbled shortly and strode away.

Finally Red Schoendienst fled to Mickey Mantle, and it was all over.

The street was quiet... even more quiet than usual.

The vendors began rolling up their pennants.

"What are you going to do with all those things now?" one vendor was asked.

"Take 'em back to the boss and let him wipe his feet on 'em. They ain't my worry," he said.

It appeared the Braves were headed for a big inning. But Haney had Frank Torre sacrifice and when the inning was over Milwaukee had only one run instead of maybe a cluster.

In the third, with the Braves trailing 2-1, Branton led off with a single. This time, instead of sacrificing the tying run to second, Haney had Torre swing away. He popped out Hank Aaron followed with a single and the score would have been tied if the Braves had sacrificed. Instead, they didn't score and left three men on base.

But the winners always look good and the losers bad. Haney said if he had to play the series over again "I wouldn't do a damn thing differently."

Fight Sought By Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS (UPI)—Rich hotel owners today were reported ready to "beat any offer" to stage the next middleweight championship bout between Sugar Ray Robinson and Carmen Basilio in this gambling resort.

As visualized by Benny Goffstein, vice president of the Riviera Hotel, one of the string of luxurious hostilities on the strip, the fight would be a "white tie" affair with tickets costing \$100.

The hotelman said the Las Vegas group would wait until promoters in Los Angeles, Chicago and New York had made their best offers and then would top them.

"We have some pretty elaborate plans for the fight," Goffstein said. "We'd like to make it a white tie affair that would follow big dinner parties at the hotels. We'd probably charge \$100 a ticket."

If Las Vegas gets the championship bout, Goffstein said it probably would be staged next February or March as the inaugural event of a new \$5,300,000 convention hall.

The hall is located a quarter of a mile behind the Riviera. Plans call for its completion in January.

Bobby Boyd, Beecham Meet

CHICAGO (AP)—Lanky Bobby Boyd of Chicago tonight goes against Jimmy Beecham, who knocked him out of the middleweight rankings with an upset victory last August in Miami.

The 19 round middleweight scrap will be broadcast and televised by NBC from Chicago Stadium starting at 9 p.m. (EST). Scoring will be based on the five point maximum system.

Beecham, 24-year-old self-styled psychology student who migrated from Philadelphia to Miami, climbed to the No. 6 contender spot in the National Boxing Assn. ratings mainly by his victory over Boyd.

Boyd has scored 26 knockouts in winning 49 bouts. Beecham has only 7 kayos in 24 victories.

Stengel Credits McDougald With Big Roll In Yank Win

MILWAUKEE (AP)—"Gil McDougald came through for us with some amazing plays and we just wound up looking like the real New York Yankees."

That was Manager Casey Stengel's capsule sizeup of his Yankees' triumph over the Milwaukee Braves in the World Series.

Although Thursday's 6-3 Yankee victory in the seventh and deciding series game had Moose Skowron, Bob Turley and Elston Howard as primary heroes, McDougald was New York's big playmaker and bellwether in the uphill Yankee battle over the entire series.

"You see we didn't look so hot fielding or base running early in the series," said Stengel. "Our pitching is fine, but it takes McDougald to settle us down. He made some plays that were splendid—actually amazing."

Second sacker McDougald also wound up with a .321 series batting average, topped on the Yankee squad only by Hank Bauer's .323. McDougald's 9 hits in 28 trips included 2 homers and 2 doubles.

Actually, this appeared to be a World Series the Braves forgot to win—only because the Yankees started to remember they were the Yankees.

While everybody was swooning over the great one-two Braves pitching punch of Warren Spahn and Lew Burdette, Yankee pitchers made a series strikeout record that may stand for many years.

Headed by Whitey Ford's 13 strikeouts, seven Yankee pitchers whiffed 56 Braves to break the 29-year-old series record of 50 set by the Philadelphia A's against the Chicago Cubs.

It was the old Yankee recipe of timely homers which broke Milwaukee's back. They belted to homers against only 3 by the Braves.

One of Milwaukee's homers was a swat by pitcher Burdette, one by leadoff man Bill Branton and one by catcher Del Crandall. None of Milwaukee's long ball artists—Hank Aaron, Wes Covington, Ed Mathews or Joe Adcock—could reach the fence.

The key blow of the series may have been delivered by Howard, a single off Burdette after Yogi Berra doubled to start the big Yankee inning.

Going into the eighth, Burdette had allowed only three hits and none figured in New York's two-run second. When Berra slapped his two-bagger with two out in the eighth, everybody expected the Braves would order a pass for Howard to fill first and make a force play possible at third or second.

But Howard punched a hopper over second, scoring Berra.

Along with McDougald, Howard figured prominently in restoring confidence to the Yankee defense. After bumping his knee on a clumsy try for Burdette's homer in the second series game, Howard yielded Yankee left field to Norm Sieber.

World Series Highlights

Hank Bauer of the Yanks compiled the highest World Series slugging average. The veteran outfielder collected 22 total bases in 31 at bats for a .719 mark. Billy Branton paced the Braves with .588.

Yogi Berra of the Yanks and Frank Torre of the Braves were the only players who did not strike out among those who participated in all seven games. Berra had 27 official trips and Torre 17.

It was "unlucky" seven for Lew Burdette of the Braves Thursday. Burdette allowed the Yankees seven hits in each of the three games he beat them last year and seven the first time he won over them this year. Thursday he allowed seven safeties but left the game trailing 6-2.

Joe Adcock of Milwaukee, who singled for Don McMahon in the ninth inning Thursday had the distinction of collecting the only pinch hit. Fifteen other pinch hitters had been retired previously. Enos Slaughter was the only one to reach base—on a walk.

Moose Skowron of the Yankees homered in the first and last games. In between he managed only five singles and wound up with a .259 batting average. Skowron's four runs batted in Thursday were only one short of the record set by Tony Lazzeri and Bill Dickey on Oct. 2, 1936, when the Yanks walloped the Giants, 18-4.

The Yankees left 40 men on base—only one under the record for fewest in a seven game series set by the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1920.

Yankee starter Don Larsen, who pitched 2-13 innings and gave up three hits Thursday, turned in the same performance in the final series game last year. Larsen was the losing pitcher in the 1957 finale.

Both the Yanks and Braves came up with five double plays. But New York committed only three errors and Milwaukee seven. The Braves finished with a fielding average of .974 and the Yankees with .988.

NHL Season Opens With Red-Hot Tilt

The schedule said it was only the first game of the season but you would have thought the Montreal Canadiens and the Boston Bruins were still playing in the Stanley Cup the way they went after each other Thursday night.

The Canadiens, who defeated the Bruins four games to two last spring in the cup finale, started their season with a 3-2 victory over Boston in the only game scheduled in the National Hockey League.

But before they achieved the triumph with Dickie Moore, Andre Pronovost and Doug Harvey scoring the goals, there was enough wild play to last a season. Jerry Toppazzini and Vic Stasiuk prevented goalie Jacques Plante from turning in a shutout with goals in the last six minutes.

The Bruins drew a total of \$125 in automatic fines as the result of the wild first period action. Bronco Horvath drew a fine of \$75, after being charged with a misconduct and game penalty. Don McKenney was handed a misconduct penalty, calling for a \$25 fine, for squawking after Bob Armstrong had been given a penalty for slashing. And Herb Flaman injured Pronovost in another melee. The penalty also called for \$25 fine.

Pronovost needed five stitches to close a cut over his right eye after tangle with Flaman. Plante was struck on the chin by one of Vic Stasiuk's shots and required seven stitches to close the wound.

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STARRED IN HOLLYWOOD

PITTSBURGH (AP)—National League hitters who were surprised with the pitching of Pirate rookie George Witt this season only had to look at his 1957 record for a rating. The 24-year-old native of Long Beach, Calif., buried 29 straight scoreless innings for Hollywood last year. He had an 18-7 record and a 2.24 earned run mark. During one stretch he hurled 58 frames without allowing an earned run.

Hi-lites and lo-lites of the 1958 World Series:

First game—Braves 4, Yankees 3. Warren Spahn beat reliever Ryne Duren in 10th on Billy Branton's single which scored Joe Adcock from second. Home runs by Bill Skowron and Hank Bauer gave Yanks early 3-2 lead. But Wes Covington's sacrifice fly in the eighth tied it.

Second game—Braves 13, Yanks 5. Braves produced seven run, first inning rally, featured by Branton's leadoff homer and a three-run home run by Lew Burdette. Burdette was touched for two homers by Mickey Mantle and one by Bauer but had little trouble defeating Yankees for fourth consecutive time. Bob Turley was the

losing pitcher.

Third game—Yanks 4, Braves 0. Don Larsen and Duren combined to pitch a six-hitter. Bauer drove in all New York's runs with a bases-filled single off Bob Rush in the fifth and a two-run homer off Don McMahon in the seventh.

Fourth game—Braves 3, Yanks 0. Spahn allowed only two hits to win his second game. Whitey Ford was victimized by poor fielding as left fielder Norm Siebera misplayed Red Schoendienst's sixth inning drive into a triple and the Braves scored the game's first run when shortstop Tony Kubek let a grounder go through his legs. Siebera also set up the final Braves run by losing Johnny Logan's fly in the sun. Schoendienst's fine play on Yogi Berra's line drive

with a runner on third and two out in the fourth saved Spahn's shutout.

Fifth game—Yanks 7, Braves 0. Turley hurled a five-hitter and struck out 10. Yanks beat Burdette for the first time, scoring on Gil McDougald's third inning homer and adding six runs in the sixth.

Sixth game—Yanks 4, Braves 3. McDougald's home run and a run-producing single by Skowron off Spahn in the 10th gave the Yanks the victory. Braves bounced back for one in their 10th and had two runners on base. But Turley nailed pinch-hitter Frank Torre on a pop fly to end the game. Duren

was the winning pitcher, striking out eight in an excellent 4-2-3 inning relief stint. Bauer hit fourth series homer to tie record. Howard doubled Andy Pafko at the plate after catching short fly and shortened Braves' second inning uprising.

Seventh game—Yankees 6, Braves 2. Turley, in relief of Don Larsen, allowed only two hits in 6-2-3 innings. Yanks wrapped up game in eighth with four-run rally highlighted by Howard's RBI single and a three-run homer by Skowron. Burdette was touched for two unearned runs in the second and lost his second series game. Yanks became first team since Pittsburgh in 1925 to win series after losing three of first four games.

Few Yankees Said Not On Sound Land

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—The triumphant Yankees can start counting their lion's share of the World Series today but they'd better not begin counting their chickens for next year because some of them may not be back.

Even before they beat the Braves to win the World Series Thursday, Casey Stengel revealed that he will make a special trip back to New York to "listen to a lot of trade offers people have been making us."

General Manager George Weiss confirmed that there may be several changes in the Yankees' playing personnel before 1959 rolls around.

"We're always in the market for a deal," Weiss said, "and there is a good possibility we might make a few of them this winter."

That would mean, of course, that some of the Yankees who helped Stengel to his seventh World Series victory will be serving with other clubs next year.

Among the candidates who may be traded are pitchers Johnny Kucks, Art Ditmar, Duke Maas and Bobby Shantz and infielders Andy Carey, Bobby Richardson and Jerry Lumpe.

Stengel had profound words of praise for practically every one of his Yankees immediately after Thursday's clincher. But that was in the first flush of victory. Upon re-evaluation, he is sure to be a bit less excited about some of their performances, particularly during the last month of the regular season.

The Yankees had managed to stay even with Milwaukee by the grace of a couple of wild throws by first baseman Frank Torre and

failure of the Braves to come through in the clutch. They scored two unearned runs against Burdette without the aid of a hit in the second inning to take a 2-1 lead.

The Braves had two good shots at starter Don Larsen and winner Bob Turley and muffed both. Even the 46,367 Milwaukee diehards sensed they had had it despite a game-tying home run by Del Crandall in the sixth.

It was the same Crandall who twice came up with the bases full and twice failed to come through.

The Braves' catcher struck out in the first inning after his team had taken a 1-0 lead against Larsen and filled the bases on three walks. In the third, Turley replaced Wes Covington on a run-scoring grounder, purposely walked Eddie Mathews to fill the bases, and disposed of Crandall on another grounder.

The Braves left eight runners stranded to increase their total to 57 for the seven games. The Yankees left only 40 on base. Milwaukee hit only three home runs with such sluggers as Mathews, Hank Aaron, Covington and Joe Adcock hitting nothing longer than a double.

Upland Bird, Duck, Goose Seasons Set

The upland game bird and waterfowl hunting season in Oregon will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday.

Reports from the state Game Commission indicated upland game hunting will be the best in years. The waterfowl population in the Pacific flyway showed a gain from last year.

The season on the upland birds will run through Nov. 16. The waterfowl hunting will continue for 95 days, until Jan. 13.

The commission said there was plenty of game in the Willamette Valley. Hunters were cautioned that the season is not open for bobwhite and valley quail in Linn County.

There also is no season for Hungarian partridge west of the Cascades.

The pheasant, quail and partidge population was reported strong east of the Cascades.

Early waterfowl hunters, the report said, probably will have to depend on local birds. It said five million birds were reported at the Klamath-Tule Lake area, but elsewhere there were few.

The nesting population of waterfowl was high in the marsh and land areas, especially Warner, Summer Lake, Klamath and other major waterfowl areas.

West of the Cascades, the entire shooting picture depends on locally produced birds. Pintails are in the bays, but not in sufficient numbers to provide good hunting.
