Air-To-Ground Missile Announced By Air Force

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—The Air Force plans to arm its supersonic fighter bombers with a powerful new air-to-surface missile, the White Lance.

Reports say the missile would be nuclear tipped. The weapon, an improved version of the Navy bullpup, will be manufactured by the Martin Co. Missile Division here.

The Air Force has not yet formally announced the name. However, it is no longer a secret within the Tactical Air Command. A section of the Martin plant already has become known as the White Lance Department.

The new super Bullpup was designed to multiply the destructive capability of the North American F100 and Republic F105 fighters.

It would be used in attacks on grounded aircraft, ships, bridges and on ground support and assignments requiring a high degree of accuracy.

It would fill a gap in Air Force weapons, providing greater accuracy than is possible with conventional bombs and offering greater firepower than is available with rockets such as the Sidewinder. The Sidewinder is designed to shoot down attacking aircraft and is not particularly effective against ground targets.

The Air Force reportedly has not yet made a decision as to the type of improved guidance to be ordered.

Known to be under consideration is a television guidance system that would enable the pilot to control the missile even beyond visual range. Some of the Air Force leaders argue that such a system would be unnecessarily costly and complex.

The Air Force also has demanded of the White Lance a greater range — meaning an improved propulsion system—and a bigger "bang" than that of the bullpup. Since the latter employs high explosives, the White Lance presumably would carry a nuclear warhead.

Town And Country Center First Unit To Meet Goal

The first division of the 1959 United Fund-Red Cross drive to meet its quota was the Town and Country Shopping Center, it was announced Wednesday. The news came during the weekly report luncheon at which the drive's progress to its \$150,000 goal reached the 74 per cent mark—\$111,012.28.

This was the first year in which the Town and Country center was entered as a separate division, and its quota had been set at \$1,000 by drive officials. When Howard Amidon, the center's unit chairman for the drive, reported \$710 in new pledges at Wednesday's meeting, the Town and Country total reached \$1,243.50.

Thayne W. Cole, associate director of all drive workers to the Town and Country for its outstanding showing, by presenting a special citation to Bob Waggoner. Cole cited the Town and Country's rapid growth to a "full-blown shopping center," and paid honor to the contributing record established.

Cole also made special mention of the good work done by Amidon, who has served as a unit chairman for three years running, and said that he understood that still other pledges may be expected from Town and Country. Oscars to two merchants at Town and Country were also awarded during the meeting, Mrs. Glenn Fox accepting that of Fashion Villa, and Waggoner that of the House of Shoes.

The first year in this country that automobiles were offered to consumers, "completely equipped" was 1910. In 1957, makers of automotive parts and accessories increased their advertising in newspapers by 141 per cent over the previous year.

Others receiving Oscars at the meeting and the establishments represented were Mrs. Jean Birmingham, Howard R. Perrie, architect; Mrs. Alpha L. Phelps, Buy Low Food Center; Bill Cunningham, Cunningham and Rickey Motors; and Garry Robertson, for the high school secretaries and high school cooks.

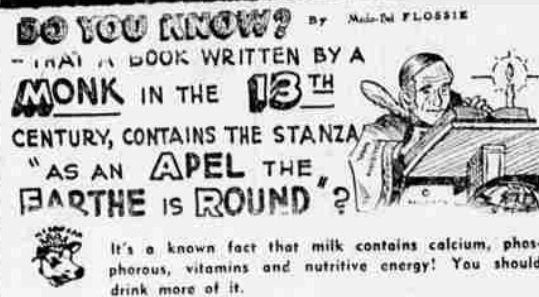

United Fund, during the meeting. Dye also said that the government division, new at the 62.4 per cent mark on its way to a goal of \$4,800, was already ahead of its total figure for last year. Wilmer Worner is head of this division in the current drive.

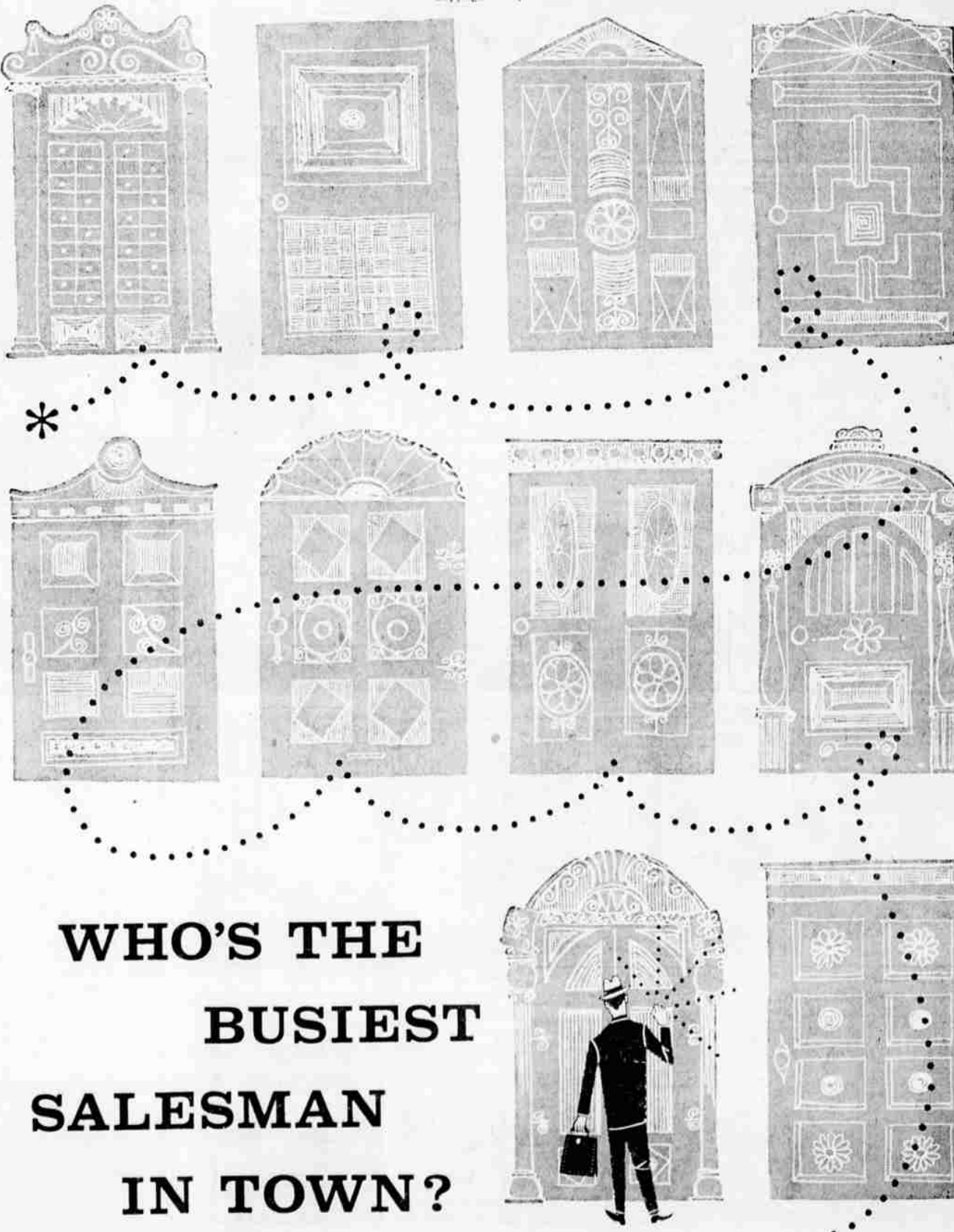
