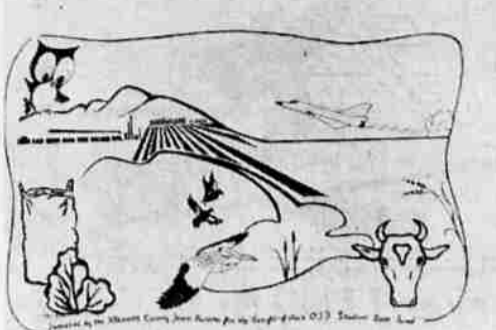

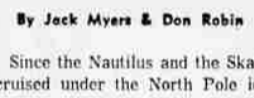

Trade Group Plans Drive

WASHINGTON (AP) — A stepped-up drive to erase some price come-ons and fictitious bargain claims from advertising was launched today by the Federal Trade Commission.

Better Business Bureaus across the country, the Advertising Federation of America and local business groups were expected to cooperate in the campaign announced by FTC Chairman John W. Gwynne.

Guidelines issued a nine-point guide list of typical abuses in price advertising and ordered FTC's force of lawyers and investigators to intensify enforcement. The commission hopes to enlighten consumers on price trickery, educate businessmen on where the law halts fictitious pricing, and enlist the voluntary cooperation of sellers, the chairman said.

For those who choose not to cooperate, he added this caution: "We are prepared to augment our hopes by taking fast adversary action against those who think these guides don't mean what they say."

Entries Asked By Spud Chief

MERRILL — Wilbur O. Brickner, parade chairman, has issued an invitation to all organizations, lodges, clubs and interested persons to enter a float in the 22nd annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival parade. The parade will be held at 11 a.m. on Saturday, October 25. Parade entries will form on Garfield Street near the grade school grounds, facing south at 10 a.m. Line of march is south to highway. East to Signal Service Station corner, north two blocks, then west to point of starting, where it will disband. Lewis S. Kandra will serve as marshal of the day and lead the line of floats and other entries on the parade route. The floats will be judged prior to the parade start on the following grading elements: (1) Theme execution — How well the float theme is presented. (2) Theme scope — Does the theme have wide community interest? (3) Eye appeal. (4) Quality and neatness — Is the truck cab covered? Is the frame work covered? Is display well built? Is lettering rough or good? The parade entries will be divided in the following sections with the named prizes for each section: Class 1 — Commercial section (implement dealers, business houses, etc.) First, \$25 or cup; second, \$15. Class 2 — Music Section. First, \$25; second, \$15. Class 3 — Organizations and lodges. Same as class 2. Class 4 — Youth organizations. First, \$25; second, \$15. Class 5 — Children's division. First, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2. Class 6 — Comic section. First, \$10; second, \$5. The best float in the parade will receive an additional \$25 or cup.
