

Sid Gillman Given New Pact By Los Angeles Rams Leaders

Sit tight, Walter O'Malley, Los Angeles must be mellowing. You might get that baseball stadium yet.

The unbelievable happened Friday in the one-time cemetery of pro football coaches, Sid Gillman, Los Angeles Rams coach, was signed to a new contract with 10 games still remaining in the NFL season. And the pact, terms and duration of which were not announced, is effective in 1959.

Back in 1945 Adam Walsh coached the Cleveland Rams to the NFL championship. The team then moved to LA and Walsh lasted one season. Bob Snyder likewise in 1947. Clark Shaughnessy was good for two years. Joe Stydahar two and Hamp Full three.

Then along came Gillman in 1955. He won a division title that year, but then finished fifth in '56

and fourth last year when he was hung in effigy.

The Rams dropped their opener this year, Gillman's last in a four-year contract, but followed that three-point loss to the Cleveland Browns with a 33-3 decision over rival San Francisco.

The Rams are currently in the toughest part of their schedule. Sunday they face defending champion Detroit and are on the road again next week against the pre-season favorites, the Chicago Bears. Then follow home games with the 49ers, Lions and Bears again.

Detroit, although winless in two games, will be no pushover. Lion Coach George Wilson is on the spot. He traded Bobby Layne, the man who quarterbacked the Lions in their greatest years, to Pittsburgh this week, and it will be up to Tobin Rote, the Lion's other signal-caller, to justify Wilson's

move.

In other Western Conference games, Baltimore plays Green Bay at Milwaukee and San Francisco is at the Bears. In the East, the Chicago Cardinals are at Cleveland, New York at Washington and Philadelphia at Pittsburgh.

Layne now is playing for his old Lion coach, Buddy Parker, and it is evident that Parker expects the blond Texan to put some into the Steelers, who have been whipped by the 49ers and the Browns. After the Browns' game, a 42-12 rout, quarterback Earl Morrall went to Detroit for Layne. Philadelphia has split a pair, losing to Washington and defeating New York.

Both Baltimore and the Browns are unbeaten, the only teams still in that class, and now rate as early favorites for the Western and Eastern crowns, respectively.

Merrill Sweeps Big Win

MERRILL — Coach Al Keck's Merrill Huskies moved into first place in the District 5B by rolling over the Bonanza Antlers, 22-7 here Friday night.

The Huskies were led by three hard-running backs, Bud Maupin, John Haskins and John Patterson. Haskins scored two touchdowns while Patterson tallied the other.

With only three minutes gone in the game, Merrill scored, as Haskins cut around right end and a crowd 20 yards to pay dirt. Merrill took nine plays to cover 71 yards in this drive. Maupin's kick split the uprights.

Halfway through the first quarter, the Huskies tallied again, this time on a safety, as senior end Charles Roller blocked Gary Daley's punt in the end zone and fell on it.

The Huskies threatened with five minutes left in the second stanza as they put together a drive which carried them to their own 24 yard line to the Bonanza 10. It was at that point where the Antlers put themselves back in the ball game.

Huskie quarterback Dennis Salvadori threw a pass which was intercepted for a fumble target, Roller. But Antler quarterback Jimmy O'Conner intercepted the ball five yards into the end zone and sprinted down the side line 105 yards to pay dirt, outrunning the entire Merrill squad. Fullback Gary Atwood plunged over for the extra point as the gun sounded and the score favored Merrill, 9-7.

As the second half opened, both teams battled on even terms. With only 38 seconds left in the third quarter, Haskins capped a 45 yard Huskie drive as he plunged over tackle from seven yards out. This time tackle Tom Morris blocked Maupin's attempted conversion.

Merrill's final scoring of the night came with 9 minutes 28 seconds left in the game. Patterson capped the 40 yard scoring drive by plunging over from 4 yards out. Maupin's kick was good to make the score 22-7.

Bonanza's speed merchants, O'Conner, Atwood, Nork, and Daley were unable to break loose for any sizable gains during the contest, as they could not penetrate the hard-charging forward wall of the Huskies.

Except for O'Conner's good run on the intercepted pass, the Antlers were held down, garnering only four or five yards per carry.

Maupin led the Huskies as he carried the ball 17 times for an average of eight and one half yards per carry. Haskins averaged 6.4 per carry and Patterson averaged 4.5 per carry.

The final statistics favored Merrill as they rushed for a total of 376 yards to Bonanza's 74 total yards. First downs also favored the Huskies and they ground out 29 to the Antlers' 3.

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Wyoming Cowboys Whip Oregon State

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) — Wyoming's Cowboys, getting flawless performance from a host of sophomores, bolted for two second quarter touchdowns that deflated Oregon State's favored Beavers and cleared the way for a 28-0 Wyoming upset football victory Saturday.

Oregon State, apparently flat after a 14-0 triumph last week over UCLA, generated only one scoring threat — a third period drive to Wyoming's 9 where the Cowboys held for downs.

The teams played a scoreless first quarter but Wyoming started moving in the second on a 56-yard drive capped by halfback Gary Jozwiak's 15-yard touchdown scamper.

OSC came back with its only penetration of Wyoming territory in the first half — to the 37 — but that fizzled when Leon Crier's fumble was recovered by Wyoming guard Frank Miknis.

That paved the way for a 40-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jim Walden to Wyoming end Neil Curtis.

Coming out from the intermission, OSC put together its longest march to Wyoming's 9 but after that failed the West Coast team crumpled.

The Oregonians wilted further when halfback Paul Lowe's attempted pass was stolen by Walden who ran 50 yards for Wyoming's third touchdown midway of the third period.

Wyoming's fourth touchdown came in the final quarter on fullback Mark Smolinski's 26-yard scoring romp over right guard on a draw play.

Smolinski found a wide hole at the line and then neatly dodged through three secondary defenders on his way to the score.

Wyoming, a top contender for the Skyline Conference crown, showed 12,584 fans it was in command by stopping OSC's offense in the first period.

Although unable to score in that quarter, the cowboys drove to the visitors' 6 as the quarter ran out. Wyoming was stopped on downs but four minutes later was back with its first scoring thrust.

Wyoming coach Bob Devaney used nearly three teams as he swept the bench in the late stages.

Beaten in its opener by Kansas State, 17-14, Wyoming now holds three straight victories. Sophomores who had been nervous and unsure in the early games came through with poise and confidence that accounted for the Cowboy dominance Saturday.

The game was marked by 19 kicks, with OSC averaging 37 yards on 10 boots and Wyoming averaging 39 on 9.

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U.S. Golfers Knot Aussies In World Tiff

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — Bill Hyndman, birdied the toughest hole in golf—the feared 17th "road hole" of St. Andrews—and finished with a brilliant 72 Saturday to put the United States into a 1,000 to 1 shot tie for the World Amateur team championship.

The tall, graying Philadelphia insurance man almost alone carried his teammates into an 18-hole playoff Monday with the Australians.

Both teams needed 918 strokes for four days of golf in high winds, temperatures in the high-thirties, rain and bad light.

Until Hyndman came storming home, the Eisenhower Trophy, the symbolic silver for the world supremacy of amateur golf, was practically crated and on the way to Sydney.

Hyndman's housing nine in the wind and cold must rank as one of golf's fine finishes. It was a clutch performance, but the big Philadelphia never realized it.

Billy Joe Patton, Moitagan, N.C., had shot a 79; Charlie Cox, Oklahoma City, a 78; and Dr. Frank Taylor, Pomona, Calif., another 78.

These scores made it look as if the United States had shot itself right out of this initial world tournament.

Australia's team of Doug Bach, Barry Devlin, Bob Stevens and Peter Toogood already was in with 918. The necessity of a playoff seemed out of the question.

Off Hyndman, playing in the final three rounds, came to the 1
