Inspector Fox addressed the group and commended the high priest on the accomplishments of Masonry through his members.

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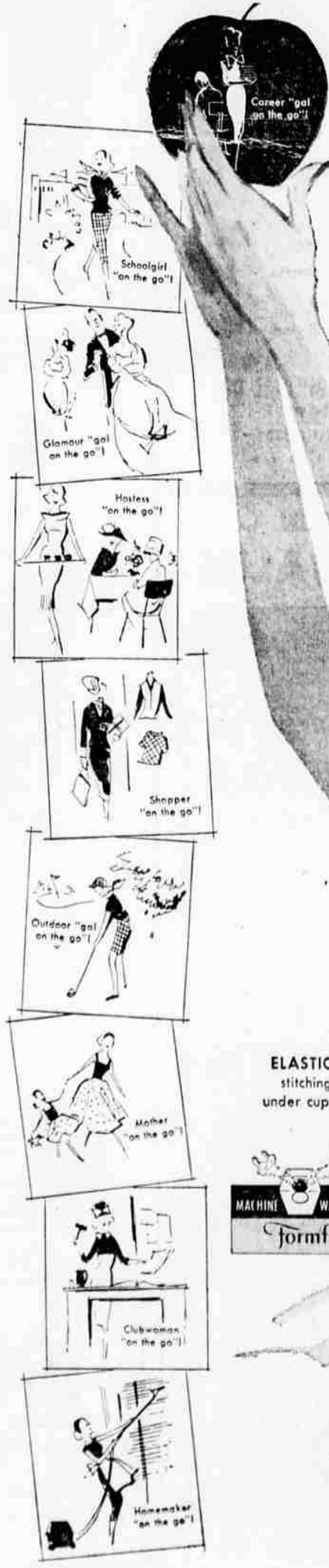
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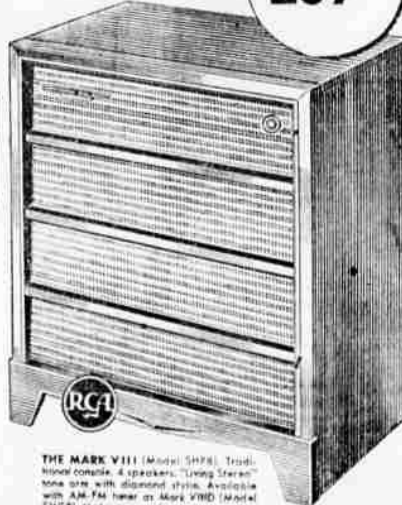
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
