Glowing electric candles entwined with fernery and accented with aqua colored ribbon bows lighted the aisle as Mr. DePree escorted his daughter to the altar.

The altar was banked with large baskets of shaded salmon colored gladioli and chrysanthemums, flanked with standards of lighted white candles and aqua ribbon bows.
