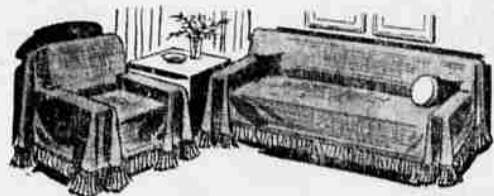
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Beta Phi Chapter Beta Sigma Phi

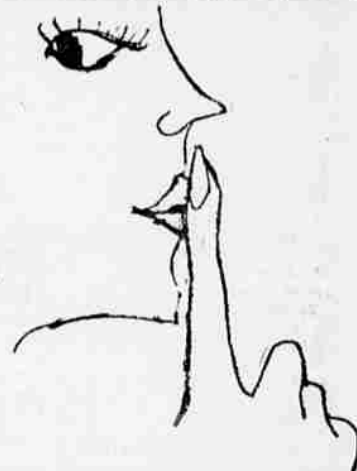
Program for the evening was a group discussion on "Self Esteem," led by Betty McAlpine.

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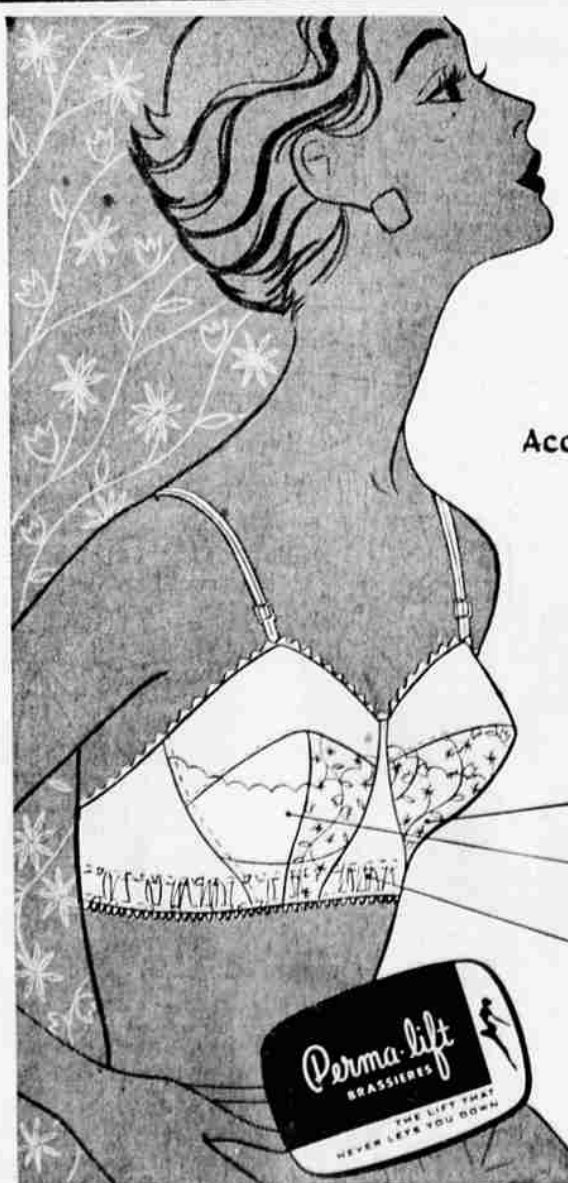


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
