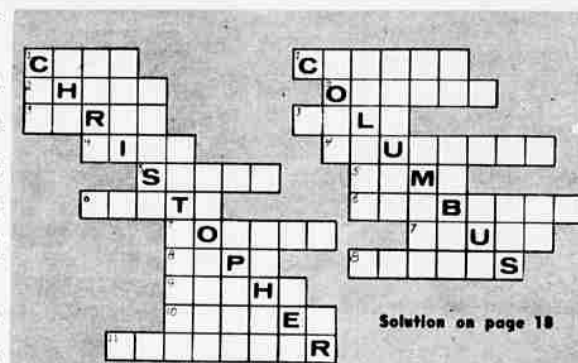

TUNING IN THE TEENS: There are some real gassers on hand for the teenagers this month. RCA's "Como's Golden Records" has some of the best tunes Perry ever put on shellac. Dot's Pat Boone continues his string of hits with "Star Dust," and, via the same label, "Billy Vaughn Plays the Million Sellers" is sure to please your listening circle. "A Guy in Love" will bring many fans back into Guy Mitchell's camp via Columbia.

COVERING THE CLASSICS: Classicists can have a wonderful time browsing through the many excellent new releases, in both monaural and stereo, now available. A pair you may want to review are "The Orchestra Sings," with Carmen Dragon conducting the Capitol Symphony, and the premiere American recording of Shostakovich's "Symphony No. 11," as played by the Houston Symphony under the baton of Leopold Stokowski, both on Capitol.

JAZZOMANIA: Andre Previn and his pals, Shelly Manne and Red Mitchell, have another blockbuster in their version of the music from "Gigi," a big one for Contemporary. For a vocal program, spin Mercury's "After Hours at the London House," an on-the-scene slicing by Sarah Vaughan. Capitol has a big bargain in "Popular Jazz Gold Album," spotlighting some of its top jazz names.

STEREO-SHOPPING: In addition to the stereo disks reviewed above, here are a few more "new-sound" releases to consider for your library—and don't forget, you can play these on a monaural system, too. London offers incidental music from Mendelssohn's "A Midsummer Night's Dream," by the London Symphony; the Paris Conservatoire Orchestra playing Chopin's "Les Sylphides" and Delibes' "La Source"; and Berlioz' "Symphonie Fantastique," with the Paris Conservatoire Orchestra.

MUSIC FOR FAMILY LISTENING: Let's roll back the rugs and dance. We'll tee off with "The New James," Capitol's showcase for the exciting Harry James and his swinging group. Now follow with RCA's "The Marvelous Miller Medleys" by the Glenn Miller orchestra. For a new sound, spin "Hits I Missed" by Ted Heath on London. It's in stereo. Decca has two strong entries in this class,

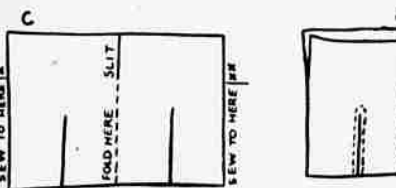

Clothespin CLOWN

DIRECTIONS: First, get wooden clothespin and piece of bright-colored cloth. To make arms for Clothespin Clown, cut strip "B" of cloth 7" long and 2" wide. Roll and tie with thread about 1/2" from both ends. Tie arms around clothespin just below head. To make "C," body of clown, cut piece of cloth 6" wide and 4" long. Fold "C" in half on dotted line (see diagram) and cut 1 1/2" slit in fold. In center of opposite side cut 1 1/2" slit. With needle and thread sew outer edge (x to xx, see diagram), leaving slit as in folded side.



As in diagram "D" sew around center slit. Place clothespin into suit, letting arms stick out through top slits. Tie suit at neck and at bottom of legs with thread. Glue small wad of cotton on top of head and paint on face. To make hat, trace diagram "G" (or make large one) on colored paper, cut out, and glue straight edges together. Trim with small piece of cotton at tip and glue hat to head. Your Clothespin Clown is ready to go to the circus.
