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Rare Caruso, Melba Disks Lie Unheard In Paris Cave

PARIS (UPI)—Music-lovers are losing out on a golden opportunity to hear some of the "golden" voices of 50 years ago.

In a specially-constructed cave beneath the Paris Opera House, there are stashed away four dozen recordings of such artists as Enrico Caruso and Nellie Melba. The discs were donated in 1907 by Alfred Clarke, a record manufacturer, on the condition that they be hermetically sealed and not opened for 100 years.

However, a loophole in the agreement added: "Nevertheless, the donor gives the Ministry of Fine Arts the liberty of fixing the date of the opening after 50 years have passed." That was last year.

But, according to the staff at the opera, only a few requests to hear the records have been received. "The only requests I have received came from other record companies," said one official. "As far as I am concerned, the records will stay where they are until 2007. That will be time enough for opening them."

Several Ministry of Fine Arts officials expressed total ignorance of the cache of records that, theoretically, is under their care.

One record dealer who used to work with Clarke expressed doubt that the process of hermetically sealing the records in urns would

enable them to stand up especially well for a century.

"If you keep ordinary records away from heat and humidity and give them proper care they can last for years without this sealing them shut," he said.

Clarke, a native New Yorker who lived for many years in Paris, set up his gift so that "men in 2007 could learn what was then (1907) the state of the speaking machine and what progress has been made with this precious instrument."

Said one record company official when told of the recordings, "They may be of interest to some collectors. But historically, as far as showing the old-time recording methods, I don't see their value. We know today all we have to know about the early day 'talking machines.'"

However, when he heard the lineup of records, this same authority smiled appreciatively and said, "I wouldn't mind hearing them. You wouldn't even find all of these at the Flea Market and I've picked up some pretty important records there."

The lineup includes: A Caruso recording of "Celeste Aida," Melba's rendition of "Vol Che Sapete" from the "The Marriage of Figaro," and pianist Jan Paderewski playing a Chopin waltz.

Asian Flu Due Back Again But Milder Than In 1957

WASHINGTON (UPI)—New outbreaks of Asian flu are expected to hit the country again this fall—but nothing like last year's rambling epidemics.

Public Health Service officials predict that Asian influenza will be making the rounds again, but in milder form than the 1957 world-wide killer.

Whenever a new strain of flu virus breaks out, it usually stays around as an active infection for several years. "There is every indication that Asian flu will be with us for some years," a PHS official said.

The virus spread like wildfire last year, he explained, because it was "so new it ran into no resistance."

This year it will not be able to attack so freely. Persons who have already had a bout of Asian flu will have built up some immunity. The odds are against those who have had Asian flu getting it a second time within a year.

More than 70 million Americans came down with Asian flu during the 1957-58 flu season, running from early October until late February.

During the peak period of last year's epidemic—the last week in October and the first week in November—the Service reported 20 million persons were suffering from the flu.

Officials forecast an upsurge of influenza during the normal season this fall, which usually begins with wet weather.

At present, the Public Health Service is planning no campaign for mass vaccinations. However, the picture could change rapidly.

Shots still are strongly recommended for special risk groups, including the chronically ill, pregnant women and in cases where a

secondary infection could be harmful. They are advised for anyone else who wants protection against an attack of flu.

There is now plenty of vaccine on hand of the polyvalent variety which provides protection against the Asian flu strain and all other strains.

Some 79 million shots of vaccine were produced by drug firms to handle last year's big demand. Much of it still remains on drug shelves and in the hands of doctors.

The armed services are continuing to vaccinate servicemen against flu. In addition, PHS officials noted that some big industrial firms, which need to keep down absenteeism, may be giving mass inoculations.

The Service has no breakdown on flu fatalities during last year's nationwide epidemic. Such deaths have always been grouped with pneumonia mortality figures.

However, the Service believes it deserves a pat on the back for cutting down flu deaths last year by its early awareness of the impending epidemic and its vast all-out preparations to meet it.

Service officials said they are ready to man the medical ramparts again if their predictions prove to be wrong and a serious flu epidemic does sweep the country again.
